Visalia Parkway was paved on September 5th and opened for traffic on September 6th. The contractor is continuing to work on completing the paving and the other street improvements. This project also includes asphalt curbing and sidewalk on the north side of the Visalia Parkway and a traffic signal at the Demaree intersection. The sidewalk is scheduled for installation during the week of September 18th. The traffic signal poles have been installed but the signal is not operable. The contractor has indicated that he expects the signal to be operational by October 20th.



Re: East Downtown Strategic Plan Implementation Update



East Downtown Strategic Plan

The East Downtown Strategic Plan is a high priority panning effort to revitalize the east downtown area by creating a regulatory framework to allow uses that complement and expand downtown Visalia. The plan was developed with the assistance of urban design consultant Bruce Race, was accepted by City Council in October 2005 and implementation began in December of 2005. This planning document can be accessed on the City website. The Strategic Plan reinforces the community's sustained efforts to keep downtown as the physical and economic center of the city by complementing its retail and commercial function with mixed residential, office and civic uses. Recommended planning strategies and a supporting action plan provide a roadmap to accomplish these aspirations. A map showing the plan area is attached. The following studies and planning efforts are underway or completed in this first phase of implementation:

- Adopted <u>Interim Zoning Ordinances</u> in the Strategic Plan Area and a smaller contiguous zone to the
 north, to allow denser and more pedestrian friendly residential office and civic uses in an area presently
 primarily designated as Service Commercial, to restrict new uses that are incompatible, and to modify
 parking requirements to encourage more urban development patterns
- Second part of Strategic Plan contract with Bruce Race will produce documentation for future development of the <u>Civic Center blocks</u> within the larger east downtown area, including a public safety building, City Hall and related uses on Oak Street west of Burke.
 Completion- 4 months
- Contracted with Bruce Race of RACESTUDIO to develop a <u>Framework Plan</u> for the larger area to the
 east and north of the Strategic Plan Area, to anticipate and plan for synergistic effects of the East
 Downtown redevelopment.
 Completion- 18 months
- Contracted with Provost and Pritchard to do a hydrology study for maintaining flow in Mill Creek in the Civic Center park area Completion- Next week
- Contracted with TPG Consulting, Live Oak Associates, Inc. and Crawford, Multari and Clark Associates
 for <u>General Plan and zoning amendments</u> needed to implement the Strategic Plan, including a
 biological resources survey.
 Completion in phases- next week through 6 months
- Contract pending with EDAW Inc. for a <u>Master Plan for the East Downtown Strategic Area</u>, including landscape and streetscape design, three linked parks with water features and civil engineering for the required infrastructure. This process will include substantial public input and the Master Plan will determine the boundaries of the first phase of development in the area designated for the Civic Center. Subject: Southeast Area Specific Plan

The Southeast Area Specific Plan is approximately 850 acres located in the southeast quadrant of the city, bounded by Caldwell Avenue, Avenue 272, Santa Fe Street, and Lovers Lane. The site is within the current Urban Development Boundary (126,000 UDB), and is approximately 25, ranging in size from ½ acre to 100 acres.

The City has hired the consulting firm of <u>Moule and Polyzoides Architects and Urbanists</u>, for the development of a New Urbanist plan for the area. New Urbanist planning centers on creating livable neighborhoods with a priority on <u>Traditional Neighborhood Developments</u> including the following:

- Walkable spaces a priority on pedestrian paths and five minute walks to neighborhood services
- ➤ Open space, pocket parks, plazas, formal and informal public spaces for neighborhoods, along with the use of Cameron Creek as a focal point for the plan area.
- > Sustainability in design for storm water management and related infrastructure
- Grid or fully interconnected street systems to give drivers more choices for access, while narrowing the streets to slow traffic and create the pedestrian friendly streetscape
- > Sustainable neighborhoods including shopping, schools, parks, recreation/open spaces and other neighborhood components


The consultants are joined in the effort by a <u>Task Force</u> comprised of the primary property owners, a representative of the Visalia Unified School District, Kaweah Delta District Hospital, the Building Industry Association, two Planning Commissioners, and two City Council members.

<u>Current Process</u>: The Specific Plan is currently in progress with the following tentative timeline:

- Administrative Draft by September 25th 2006, with Staff/Task Force review approximately two weeks
- Final Draft for review by the public,
 Planning Commission, and City Council approximately two weeks to culminate in City Council approval to move forward with the enabling portion of the project
- ➤ Enabling actions include identifying all needed amendments to the Municipal Code and preparation of the associated Environmental Impact Report
- Final adoption by the Planning Commission and City Council of the Specific Plan, Form Based Code, General Plan Amendments, Zoning Ordinance Amendments, Circulation Element Amendments, and amendments to other City elements and/or master plans

<u>Form Based Code</u>: This plan will use form based code rather than traditional zoning. The form based code is currently planned to have only four Districts within the plan area to promote mixed use and a variety of housing types as a permitted action. The code establishes the physical development envelope for development with required build-to lines rather than setbacks, along with a required architectural styles of a traditional nature such as Bungalow, Victorian, Mission Revival, and Craftsman styles.



School Location for the Plan Area

The plan area contains one elementary school as directed by the VSUD representative on the Task Force. The school site is located on the north side of Cameron Creek, adjacent to an open space extension of the Neighborhood Park, which is located on the south side of the Creek. The general characteristics of the school site were developed based upon information from VUSD. The school layout is intended for illustrative purposes only and would be subject to the typical school development processes.

- The Specific Plan area is approximately 850 acres, with an expected 15 to 25 year build out timeline.
- ➤ Under current City development trends, approximately 3,200 dwelling units could be accommodated in the Plan area. The Specific Plan allows for up to 5,000 dwelling units to be developed in the Plan area, though it is anticipate that the actual number will be closer to 4,200 to 4,500 dwelling units.
- Development would typically happen in phases with the first phase being most of the properties along the south side of Caldwell Avenue, which includes the school site.
- The open space adjacent to the school site on the east is intended for the use of the neighborhood and the school as needed.
- The overall Plan area circulation and local street pattern adjacent to the school is intended to encourage pedestrian access to the school by students. This is reinforced by front—on residential units along the streets for "eyes-on" the sidewalks, and no streets with block walls within the plan area.

Department Recommendation:

Recommendation to finalize the members of the Hoc Committee To Study The Feasibility of a Joint Venture to Establish a Year-Round Aquatic Center in Visalia. The committee will study the feasibility of a joint venture to establish an aquatic facility at a future school and/or City-owned site, and bring back ideas and alternatives for a new aquatic facility at a future joint meeting between the City and the School District.

Background Information:

On May 2, 2006, City staff presented a proposal to the Visalia City Council and the Visalia Unified School District Board of Trustees to establish an Ad Hoc Committee to study the feasibility of a joint venture to establish a year-round aquatic center in Visalia.

At that meeting, City staff proposed a committee of seven (7) members --- but also pointed out a number of other potential committee members for consideration.

The discussion on potential committee members generated a number of ideas and recommendations. To assist in the process of sorting out the best potential committee members, the City Council designated Greg Collins and the School Board designated Robert Stephenson to meet with City and School staff members to outline a proposed committee for consideration at the next joint meeting.

On June 28, Mr. Collins, Mr. Stephenson, Dr. Mark Fulmer, and Vincent Elizondo met to discuss the committee membership. After a lengthy discussion, the following groups and/or individuals are being recommended:

COS Tulare County Office of Education YMCA Kaweah Delta Health Care District

As outlined at the February 27, 2006 joint meeting, the El Diamante swimming pool is projected to open to students in the Spring or Fall of 2007. The pool will be available as part of the City's summer recreation program in the summer of 2007.

As Visalia continues to grow, City staff is suggesting that a comprehensive analysis be given to the future aquatic programming needs of a growing community. It is projected that if planning efforts begin now, the next major community aquatic facility could open in four or five years, providing a funding strategy is implemented.

Some of the points made in the last few reports:

- A 50 meter pool has been mentioned as a desired amenity in the community to accommodate the wishes of the competitive swimming community as well as the potential to attract regional and statewide swim meet competitions. These large swim meets have the potential to provide a positive economic impact to the local business community.
- City staff suggested that discussions should begin regarding the feasibility of locating a new aquatic center at the proposed new middle school or high school campuses in northwest Visalia --- or perhaps another location in the community?
- One of the drawbacks of the current community recreation swim program is that it is a summertime only program --- with the general public having access to the high school pools for 9-10 weeks during the busy summer season. Access to an outdoor community pool on a year-round basis is something that is desirable by youth competitive swim programs, water polo teams, lap swimmers, citizens wishing to take swim lessons, and other potential special interest swim classes.

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- The opportunities for increased attendance and revenue go up significantly if you
 consider moving an aquatic program indoors. In essence, you have a summer time
 program on a year-round basis. A "warm-water" pool can also be considered with an
 indoor facility which creates many more programming opportunities for small children,
 seniors, and the disabled.
- Other opportunities for increasing revenues, and minimizing expenses, can include zerodepth entry pools, playground equipment with water elements, and small water slides.
- According to school district officials, the additional construction costs associated with a 50 meter pool vs a 25 meter x 33 yard pool (El Diamante) would be an additional \$5 million in capital costs and roughly \$100,000 to \$150,000 in additional annual operation and maintenance costs. School district officials have indicated they do not have the funding for the additional costs associated with expanding a pool from a 25 meter x 33 yard pool to a 50 meter pool.
- These topics and other ideas should be more thoroughly explored as we plan for the next community pool(s).

Staff support will be provided by the City's Director of Parks and Recreation and the District's Assistant Superintendent of Administrative Services, or his designee. The plan would be to invite a few consulting firms that could provide some initial thoughts and/or recommendations to the committee on the issues surrounding the development of a new aquatic center.

At some point, if there is project support, a consulting firm should be hired to work with the Ad Hoc Committee to develop some schematic designs for a new pool complex and develop some initial cost estimates.

Department Summary:

The Visalia Riverway Sports Park, located on north Dinuba Boulevard and Riverway Avenue, is still on schedule to open to the general public in the Fall of 2007.

The initial phase of the project will include the development of 48 acres on the eastern side of the park adjacent to Dinuba Boulevard. The total park acreage is 83 acres. The initial phase will include the development of ten (10) soccer fields, of which three (3) fields will have state-of-the-art athletic lighting.

Other Phase I park amenities include a unique one-of-a-kind playground modeled under the nationally recognized Leathers Playground concept; three sheltered group picnic facilities; an interactive water playground; another smaller children's playground; a BMX (bicycle) racing track; concession and restroom facilities; off street parking for 300+ vehicles; a Heritage Courtyard; and many other unique park features.

Most of the park amenities should be completed and in place by late spring 2007 --- but the turf will still need several months to mature to the point that athletic play can be initiated. The City is currently working with the Visalia AYSO in developing facility use schedules for the Fall 2007 season. The City will also be utilizing the fields for adult soccer league play and a variety of different weekend tournaments and community-wide special events.

The City is also working with a local BMX organization to establish a track and organized competitive bicycle racing program that should also begin in the Fall of 2007.

The project landscape architect is the HLA Group from Sacramento, CA. The general contractor is Lewis C. Nelson & Sons from Selma, CA. The construction costs for the initial phase was \$9,010,000 as awarded by the City Council on December 19, 2005.
