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Executive Summary

AP-05 Executive Summary - 24 CFR 91.200(c), 91.220(b)

1. Introduction

The City of Visalia (City) is an entitlement jurisdiction that receives federal funds from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) under the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) and HOME Investment Partnerships (HOME) Programs, which are designed to assist low and moderate income (LMI) households, investing in Visalia's local communities/neighborhoods.

As an entitlement jurisdiction, HUD requires that the City prepare a Consolidated Plan every five years to foster a community-wide dialogue regarding the market environment and affordable housing and community development needs of the City. The Strategic Plan is a specific course of action, which builds on local assets and coordinates a response to the needs of the community. The Strategic Plan set the program goals, specific objectives, annual goals and benchmarks for measuring progress. The five-year strategy covers the period from July 1, 2015 through June 30, 2019.

As part of the Conplan, and Strategic Plan, the City is also required to prepare an Annual Action Plan to report on the distribution of federal funding for the program year, which starts annually July 1st through June 30th of the following year. The Annual Plan explains how the City of Visalia intends to use its CDBG and HOME allocations, and how the funded programs, projects and activities will address the priorities identified in the Consolidated Plan, more specifically the Strategic Plan. The Annual Plan also identifies the federal and non-federal resources that will be used meet the goals of the approved Consolidated Plan.

This is the third year Action Plan, which reflects the goals and objectives for the period starting July 1, 2017, through June 30, 2018, and 2016 Action Plan Amendment to redirect HOME funds, Program Income funds up to an additional \$200,000 toward Self Help CHDO acquisition, rehabilitation and resell or rent projects.

The CDBG Target Map is for 2015, 2016 and 2017, program years, and shall be updated, if required, on an annual basis. Attached is confirmation of the eligible census tracts, which there are not additions or reductions of eligible tracts for this program year. Any notation to 2013 CDBG Target Area, based on the initial submission with the 2015 ConPlan, shall now reflect the updated map, and applies to the 2015, 2016, and 2017 years.

2. Summarize the objectives and outcomes identified in the Plan

The four Consolidated Plan goals below represent high priority needs for the City of Visalia (City) and serve as the basis for the strategic actions the City will continue to take toward meeting these needs. Based on the Needs Assessment, Market Analysis, and community outreach conducted in mid-2015, in preparation of the current five-year Consolidated Plan cycle, the 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan efforts resulted in the following high priority needs:

- 1. Creation and preservation of decent affordable housing
- 2. Provide a suitable living environment
- 3. Promote economic opportunity
- 4. Provide program administration, planning, and management

In FY 2017, Visalia will fund activities in furtherance of the objectives and priorities identified in the Strategic Plan for the five years from 2015 to 2019, improving availability, accessibility, affordability and sustainability through programs and activities which benefit the community. The activities for the 2017 FY will support at least one objective and one outcome, and includes 1) 2016 Substantial Amendment to direct additional HOME Program Income funding up to \$200,000 to Self Help (SHE) CHDO Acq/rehab/New construction or Reconstruction Projects; and 2) Proposed 2017 CDBG and HOME Funding as identified within the 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan (ConPlan) priority needs. The 2017 Action Plan activities are listed in section AP-35, Projects, more specifically, AP-38 Project Summary. 3. Evaluation of past performance

This is an evaluation of past performance that helped lead the grantee to choose its goals or projects.

HUD approved Visalia's 2015 FY Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation Report (CAPER) which reflected the progress of projects and programs from July 1, 2015 thru June 30, 2016. Visalia's grant performance conveyed through the evaluation showed steady progress in meeting the goals and objectives for both HOME and CDBG (housing, code enforcement, public facility/infrastructure improvements, public services and homeless services). The City will continue with successful programs, meeting high priority needs, addressing affordable housing, a suitable living environment and economic development objectives. Performance accomplishments include Affordable Housing, Suitable Living Environment, Economic Development and Public Services, as included herein below in more detail. (IDIS Attachment AP-05. No.3 1 & 2)

<u>Affordable Housing</u>: A big success was celebrating the grand opening with our non-profit partner Self Help Enterprises, Inc. (SHE), in November of 2016, of the NEW 36-unit multi-family rental development, Highland Gardens, located at Highland Avenue, west of State 63, between Riggin and Ferguson Streets. All units are occupied by extremely and very low income households, including units for at-risk or homeless population.

The City provided HOME Community Housing Development Organization (CHDO) funds to SHE who acquired, rehabbed and resold (4) single family homes, and acquired, rehabbed and renting a 5-unit multi-family Strawberry property, including two units for at-risk or homeless.

Continuing the success of the HOME SHE-CHDO Acq/Rehab projects, a FY2016 AP HOME Amendment is included with this AP, which will allow additional HOME Program Income recently received and anticipated up to \$200k toward SHE's successful projects. This allows SHE to investigate both single and multi-family dwelling type projects with approximately \$775k committed from 2015-2016 and recycled funding, plus the Amendment.

The new HOME pilot program, Tenant Based Rental Assistance (TBRA) policies and contract with Family Services of Tulare County were approved by City Council in November of 2016. The purpose is to provide secure, safe, decent and sanitary rental housing assistance to extremely low and very low-income persons or households that are homeless who meets the tenant selection criteria. TBRA focuses on special purposes or specific housing needs of Visalia's homeless population as indicated within the Con Plan.

The CDBG Mobile Home Repair Program is underway through SHE, with the policies and contract for services approved in November of 2016, by City Council. A total of \$135,000 in CDBG funding is available to eligible mobile home owners for health, safety and rehabilitation needs.

<u>Suitable Living Environment:</u> Staff will continue to use CDBG funding to improve public, park and accessibility that serve primarily low and moderate income residents and disabled population. For 2017 public improvements include continued efforts toward ADA sidewalks

design for south side of Houston Avenue between Santa Fe and Dinuba Boulevard and west side of Akers Streets from Tulare Avenue to Judy, southwest corner of Akers Street and Tulare Avenue, and eastside of Akers Street, south of Goshen Avenue; however, additional funding, is needed to fulfill the ADA construction scope of work for some of these areas. Additionally, the Disability Advocacy Committee and members of the community have identified areas which need sidewalk, with ADA access, therefore Engineering is conducting an analysis beginning within the CDBG targeted areas and will move forward with improvements thereafter.

<u>Economic Development:</u> Staff will continue to use CDBG funds for the Section 108 loan repayment through the year 2018. The City is committed to providing adequate parking in the downtown area to further promote jobs.

<u>Public Services:</u> Staff increased its efforts in allocating CDBG funding toward public services and education. A contract with the Fair Housing Council of Central California will provide fair housing education to the community. The first education workshop was held in November of 2016, related to fair housing and accessibility. Other public service programs include Continuum of Care and Family Services-Voucher Programs. A new public service program was approved in November of 2016 with Family Services to address the needs of our homeless population, through street outreach (assisting up to 24 people) and case management services (assisting up to 14 people). This supports our high priority needs identified in the ConPlan/Strategic Plan during the 2015-2019 Plan.

The City has engaged in several successful projects since 2015. The City completed the oval park and transportation public improvement projects utilizing Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding, continued neighborhood preservation efforts through Code Enforcement, repayment of the Section 108 loan, and ADA accessibility projects.

4. Summary of Citizen Participation Process and consultation process

Summary from citizen participation section of plan.

Overview of 5Year ConPlan participation:

In agreement with 24 CFR 91.115, the City of Visalia adopted a Citizens Participation Plan (CPP), as part of the five-year Consolidated Planning (ConPlan) process in FY 2015, describes the citizens participation requirements. The CPP is on file at the City of Visalia, Community Development Department, and on the City of Visalia's website, at http://www.visalia.city/civicax/filebank/blobdload.aspx?BlobID=30298

To maximize participation in the preparation of the 2015-2019 ConPlan, the City designed and administered a Community Needs Survey and held Community Forums. The Survey was distributed to residents, workers, service providers, and businesses of the City. The Plan describes the potential outreach, entities, organizations, or persons that were informed of the ConPlan. Hardcopy surveys were distributed to public housing sites, school districts, health care providers, libraries, and community centers. The survey was also distributed via email and

social media. The City sent emails to 350 different individuals or organizations notifying them of the Survey and Community and Stakeholder Forums. It was estimated that 4,559 persons on Facebook and 819 persons on Twitter were reached with information regarding the ConPlan with 214 survey responses were submitted to the City. The City also held three Community Forums, which were attended by a total of 22 individuals, and presented the Consolidated Plan to multiple organizations and advisory boards.

2017 Action Plan & 2016 Amendment Community and Council Feedback: (IDIS Attachment AP-05 No. 4 (1 & 2))

As part of the consultation process, Staff met with various committees and specifically reviewed the 5 Year Plan identified needs, which serves as a comprehensive strategy, describing the City's community development priorities and multi-year goals for use of CDBG and HOME funds from July 1, 2015 through June 30, 2019. Staff then reviewed the current 2016 Action Plan, in preparation of the Draft 2017 Action Plan, along with proposed activities for the 2017 year and 2016 amendment. Additionally, the City reached out once again viaemail to the ConPlan list of agencies, presenting this same information, which included a Feedback response form, asking 1) what is their feedback on the proposed goals and activities for the third year (Action Plan), and 2) what other goals (high priority activities) are needed for low income housing, jobs and/or low income areas. Then requested narrative feedback and identification of agency they represent.

Community and City Council Meetings:

Staff expanded the opportunity to the community and committees to provide feedback by presenting an overview of the 5-year Plan, high priorities, funding allocations, and proposed 2017 activities. Five (5) community meetings including a City council work session meeting was held as follows:

- Citizens Advisory Committee meeting on December 07, 2016
- North Visalia Neighborhood Advisory Committee meeting on December 08, 2016
- Disability Advocacy Committee on December 12, 2016
- City Council Work Session on January 17, 2017
- Continuum of Care Member Meeting on January 19, 2017

The members of these groups and committees and city departments, participated in the consultation /feedback process on community development, homeless and housing needs. The committees and task groups referenced above, in addition to the City Council included representation from regional organizations, Faith based organizations, Continuum of Care Staff members, County, Hospital, Health and Human services, including mental health services; housing, education, domestic violence, services and non-profit providers, businesses and business owners, City of Visalia, City Council, Housing and Police Department and community at large.

Citizens Participation During 30-day Comment Period for the 2017 PY Action Plan & 2016 Amendment:

On January 17, 2017, February 01, 2017, and March 02, 2017, the public notice was published in the Visalia Times Delta. The notice included a summary of the proposed activities, amendment, the committee's and Council meeting dates, time and locations. The notice included the opportunity to attend the City Council work session on January17, 2017, where staff was seeking feedback in preparation of the Draft Action Plan & Amendment. The notice was also published in the weekly paper on January 19, 2017, and February 02, 2017.

The notice then included the public comment period from February 01, 2017 through March 02, 2017. During this time, three community meetings were scheduled to attend and obtain feedback on the Draft Plan & Amendment.

- Citizens Advisory Committee meeting on February 01, 2017
- North Visalia Neighborhood Advisory Committee meeting on February 09, 2017
- Disability Advocacy Committee on February 13, 2017

The notice also included the City Council regular meeting scheduled March 20, 2017, seeking comments from the community related to the DRAFT 2017 Action Plan and 2016 Amendment. Thereafter, the final public hearing was included within the notice, which was scheduled to be held by City Council on April 03, 2017.

To seek additional opportunities for comments and participation in the meetings, the notice was posted on the Continuum of Care's website, as well as emailed to list serves of the CoC's, and Hispanic Chamber of Commerce members. The notice was sent to Self Help Enterprise, Community Service Employment Training, Habitat for Humanity, Family Health Care Network, Tulare County Public Library and Post Office for posting. The notice also included opportunities to provide comments in writing. The Draft FY 2017 AAP and 2016 Amendment was placed on the City of Visalia's website at: http://www.ci.visalia.ca.us/depts/community_development/housing_n_cdbg_services/default_asp

The Plan was available in the Community Development office, located at 315 East Acequia; and City Manager Administrative office, located at 220 North Santa Fe Street, Visalia and Tulare County public library in Visalia.

The City continues to work collaboratively with public officials, City departments, community residents, stakeholders, and beneficiaries of entitlement funds to craft the priorities and strategies included in the ConPlan. The City facilitated a community outreach and engagement effort to further strengthen the dialogue between public and assisted housing providers and private and governmental health, mental health and service agencies that receive federal funding. The City held three community forums to prompt a discussion on the City's top community needs and approaches to address them during the development and adoption of the 2015 ConPlan. These efforts were continued with the preparation of the 2016 Action Plan Amendment and 2017 Action Plan, as referenced below.

For the 2016 Action Plan Amendment and the 2017 Action Plan, staff continued efforts by attending four community group meetings and a City Council Work session meeting. Staff specifically reviewed the 5 Year Plan identified needs, serving as a comprehensive strategy, describing the City's community development priorities and multi-year goals with CDBG and HOME funds from July 1, 2015, through June 30, 2019. Staff then reviewed the current 2016 Action Plan and balances, in preparation of the Draft 2017 Action Plan, along with proposed activities for the 2017 year and recommended 2016 amendment, and requested feedback to confirm proposed activities continue meeting the identified goals, and also requested they provide feedback on any additional goals that should be considered.

Specifically related to public and assisted housing providers, private and governmental health, mental health and service agencies, were among the members of the following committee meetings which were held as follows:

- Citizens Advisory Committee meeting on December 07, 2016
- North Visalia Neighborhood Advisory Committee meeting on December 08, 2016
- Disability Advocacy Committee meeting on December 12, 2016
- City Council Work Session meeting on January 17, 2017; and
- Continuum of Care Member meeting on January 19, 2017

Through the Continuum of Care representation includes businesses, faith based organizations, such as Visalia Rescue Mission., concerned citizens, community and regional organizations, Central California Family Crises Center and United Way of Tulare and Kings Counties. Also Proteus, Community Services Employment Training, Inc. (CSET), Kaweah Delta District Hospital, Pro Youth, Kings Community Action Organization, Westcare-Veteran advocates, VA of Central California, The Salvation Army, Tulare County Housing Authority (TCHA), Tulare County Public

Health Emergency Prep (HHSA), Tulare County Public Relations, Child Support, Turning Point of Central California, Inc., COC-Alliance Staff, City and community at large.

A "Homeless Solution Group", related to homeless needs was formed in September of 2016, and has met quarterly to identify the needs of our homeless population, with representatives from Kaweah Delta Hospital, Family Health Care Network, Community Services Employment Training, Self Help Enterprises, Visalia Rescue Mission, Tulare County Health and Human Services, Family Services of Tulare County, Tulare County Housing Authority, Continuum of Care Alliance, City of Visalia City Manager, Assistant City Manager, Assistant Deputy City Manager, Police Chief and North and South Officers, Code Enforcement, and Community Development, including Housing Staff.

Among responses through list serve distribution members provided additional feedback as participants in the consultation /feedback process on community development, homeless and housing needs. Results of the feedback are reflected in the community input-outreach table.

Describe coordination with the Continuum of Care and efforts to address the needs of homeless persons (particularly chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans, and unaccompanied youth) and persons at risk of homelessness.

The City of Visalia is closely involved with the Kings/Tulare Homeless Alliance (Alliance), which serves as the local Continuum of Care. When possible, the City's programs are designed to serve homeless persons and are coordinated with the Alliance.

The City attends monthly Alliance membership meetings and provides feedback and support on key initiatives. In 2016, the City implemented a Tenant Based Rental Assistance program (HOME funded) and two Case Management/Street Outreach Programs (CDBG and Housing Successor funded) designed to serve people experiencing homelessness. These program designs were a collaborative effort between the Alliance, its partner agencies and the City of Visalia. Family Services of Tulare County as the Subrecipient of these three programs.

However, via-email, the City reached out and provided the recipients with information that included the ConPlan and AP process, High Priority Needs from the 5-Yr ConPlan, the 2016 AP, proposed 2016 HOME Amendment, and 2017 AP activities, based on existing commitments and ongoing projects. The power point included a Feedback response form, asking 1) what is their feedback on the proposed goals and activities for the 3rd year (AP), and 2) what other goals (high priority activities) are needed for low income housing, jobs and/or areas. They were encouraged to complete the feedback survey, include name, agency and narrative feedback and return to incorporate their feedback for Council to review and consider at the March meeting, including the review of the draft and final public hearing meeting in April 2017.

1. Summary of citizen participation process/Efforts made to broaden citizen participation Summarize citizen participation process and how it impacted goal-setting

The City of Visalia encourages residents, public service organizations, and other interested parties to participate in the development of the Five Year ConPlan and Annual Action Plan by attending public meetings and public hearings held at various stages of the plan development.

Five community meetings including one (1) City Council work session meeting was held to obtain feedback in the development of the Draft Action Plan and Amendment; three additional community meetings during the 30-day public comment period were held for review of the Draft Plan. Thereafter, also through public noticing and hearings were two City Council meetings.

The five (5) community meetings and one (1) City council work session meeting were:

- Citizens Advisory Committee meeting on December 07, 2016
- North Visalia Neighborhood Advisory Committee meeting on December 08, 2016
- Disability Advocacy Committee meeting on December 12, 2016
- City Council Work Session meeting on January 17, 2017; and
- Continuum of Care Member meeting on January 19, 2017

Three (3) additional community meetings and two (2) City Council meetings were held as follows:

- Citizens Advisory Committee meeting on February 01, 2017
- North Visalia Neighborhood Advisory Committee meeting on February 09, 2017
- Disability Advocacy Committee on February 13, 2017
- City Council Regular meeting on March 20, 2017
- City Council Public Hearing meeting on April 03, 2017

The public notice included a summary of the proposed activities, amendment, the committee's and Council meeting dates, time and locations. The notice included the opportunity to attend the City Council work session on January17, 2017, where staff was seeking feedback in preparation of the Draft Action Plan & Amendment. The notice was also published on January 17, 2017, February 01, 2017 and March 02, 2017 in English and Spanish. It was also posted in the weekly non-subscriber paper on January 19, 2017, and February 02, 2017.

To seek additional opportunities for comments and participation in the meetings, the notice was posted as referenced in this report earlier under Citizen Participation and consultation, and included list serve, email of the power point information and notices posted on the City's website, Facebook and Twitter, as well as non-profit distribution on the notice.

The Plan was available in the Community Development office, located at 315 East Acequia; and City Manager Administrative office, located at 220 North Santa Fe Street, Visalia and Tulare County public library in Visalia.

Outreach: It is estimated that there was a potential reach of 479 entities, organizations, or persons who were sent an email to participate in feedback. The City's Facebook, twitter, e-newsletter distribution reaches or hits were approximately 70,254. The Continuum of Care list serve reached approximately 274 people. Various committee members attended meetings in which the plan was presented for feedback. Staff provided an overview of the 5 year Consolidated Plan, high priorities, review of current year Action Plan, and proposed activities for 2017's Action Plan and 2016 Amendment.

Expected Resources

AP-15 Expected Resources – 91.220(c) (1, 2)

Introduction

HOME funds would generally be used for multifamily new construction, scattered site acquisition/rehab of existing rental and ownership properties through the City's certified Community Housing Development Organization (CHDO), down payment assistance and tenant-based rental assistance.

The CDBG program planned priorities identified for the same term is public and park improvements, ADA walkways, parking accessibility, public services, such as fair housing, voucher program, case management and street outreach, code enforcement, owner occupied housing rehabilitation, and economic development, specifically repayment of the Section 108 loan.

In FY 2017, Visalia will fund activities in furtherance of the objectives and priorities identified in the Strategic Plan with the outcome of improving availability, accessibility, affordability and sustainability through activities which benefit the community. The activities for the 2017 FY will support at least one objective and one outcome.

For Fiscal Year (FY) 2017-2018, the City will receive a total of \$1,188,919 in CDBG grant funds, based upon previous year award to allocate towards activities. The anticipated estimated CDBG program income to be received is \$25,000. The 2017 allocation is approximately \$72k more than the 2016 PY. There is approximately \$14,440 in 2016 PI referenced to date as of (6-20-17). The CDBG carryover balance, including program income approved through the previous year action plan and/or amendments, allocated toward existing projects is: \$1,087,519. Any increase or decrease in the actual 2017 CDBG allocations and PI were noted to be directed toward the CDBG ADA projects.

The City will also receive a total of \$371,694 in HOME grant funds eligible to allocate toward activities and estimates that it will receive \$150,000 in program income. The 2017 allocation is approximately \$1,700 more than the 2016 PY allocation. A 2016 HOME Amendment represents program income, up to \$200,000 to be directed toward SHE CHDO acq/rehab SF or MF activities. This includes the \$129,324.78 posted to date under 2016 PI. There is a carryover balance of approximately \$514k that has been approved through previous actions, toward the SHE CHDO and Tenant Based Rental Assistance projects/programs. The HOME carryover balance, including program income approved through the previous year action plan and/or amendments, allocated toward existing projects is: \$1,063,189. Any increase or decrease in the actual 2017 HOME allocation and PI were noted to be directed toward the HOME CHDO SHE Acq/Rehab SF/MF projects.

In the event final CDBG and HOME program income is higher or lower than expected herein, the City of Visalia may add, subtract or transfer amounts among identified projects, as noted without publishing a substantial amendment, if the amount is below 75 % change, as per the approved Citizens Participation Plan. Any difference in CDBG funding will be reflected in public infrastructure/ADA project line item; any difference in HOME funding will be reflected in SHE CHDO Acq/Rehab/new construction/reconstruction SF or MF project activities.

Currently, the City is not eligible to receive direct funding under the Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) or Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA) – also programs covered under the Consolidated Plan Regulations.

Explain how federal funds will leverage those additional resources (private, state and local funds), including a description of how matching requirements will be satisfied

The City continues to prioritize the needs of the community. This year, \$25,575 in CDBG funding will be utilized as matching and institutional delivery funds in partnership with Family Services toward voucher program. These funds will help up to 11 plus 3 (total with amendment 14) homeless families in the City.

Code Enforcement staff anticipates working with non-profit agencies in outreach to the homeless in our community and addressing code violations such as substandard housing. The City also contributes CDBG funds toward the Alliance and promotes increased collaboration among housing, service and faith based organizations.

Visalia's matching requirements will be satisfied again this year with the use of prior year rollover of Redevelopment Low Mod funding. Additionally, as HOME projects are completed, the specific projects, and match, will be referenced on the HOME Match Report within the CAPER. As reflected in the HOME Match report submitted with last years (2015) CAPER, the City has a substantial exceed match of \$5,594,092.

The City is working to partner with its local non-profit partners for affordable housing activities, which may provide sweat equity and non-federal sources.

Below is a list of potential financial resources considered a part of the City's overall financial plan to address priority needs and specific objectives identified in the Consolidated Plan. The number and availability of these programs to assist cities is limited, and funding for new projects is unpredictable. The following programs are local, state and federal programs. None of these are managed locally by the City through funds accessed directly from HUD.

- **HACT:** HACT is a public housing authority with jurisdiction within the City of Visalia and the County of Tulare. It administers federal and state funds for its public housing projects and government-assisted housing units such as the Section 8 Rent Subsidy.
- Low-Income Housing Tax Credit Program (LIHTC): The LIHTC program provides for federal and state tax credits for private developers and investors who agree to set aside all or an established percentage of their rental units for low-income households for no less than 30 years. Tax credits may also be utilized on rehabilitation projects, contributing to the preservation program. The program begins when developers and investors apply for an allocation of tax credits from the California Tax Credit Allocation Committee (CTCAC). Tax credits are awarded on a competitive basis at varying times. Compliance is monitored according to Internal Revenue Service (IRS) rules and regulations.
- Multi-Family Housing Program: If California's Housing and Community Development Department awards Multi-Family
 Housing Program loans to assist rental housing developments affordable to low-income households in the City of Visalia, the
 City will assist the developers with identifying local funding.

This is the last year to apply for the Department of Housing and Community Development Housing-Related Parks (HRP) Program incentive grant, funded through Proposition 1C, the Housing and Emergency Shelter Trust Fund Act of 2006 for funding improvements at HCD Qualifying Disadvantaged Parks. Awarding of these funds will assist with the improvement efforts within low mod census tract areas.

The City will also continue to look for other grant opportunities such as Strategic Growth Council's Affordable Housing and Sustainable Communities (AHSC) Program.

If appropriate, describe publically owned land or property located within the jurisdiction that may be used to address the needs identified in the plan

As the Housing Successor Agency of the former Redevelopment Agency (RDA), the City is working on a plan for the development and disposition of the RDA's low/mod properties. The City will publish request for interest and/or RFP's to encourage local nonprofits to submit proposals for the development and disposition of these properties.

With the elimination of the City's Redevelopment Agency (RDA), the City has become the Successor Agency and will be moving forward on the next steps related to previously owned RDA land.

Discussion

A continued concern is HUD's move to grant based accounting through the Interim Rule of December 2, 2016. This affects CHDO and Program Income, including Subrecipient commitments for spending down funds, beginning in PY2015-2016. Currently, the City is able to manage funding and activities with its non-profit partners, including Self Help Enterprises, Inc., as a Community Housing Development Organization (CHDO). With the rule change, each year's grant funds will be tracked by the year. PJ's must commit the identified amount of funds (PI included first) in its local HOME account before committing the appropriated HOME grant. With the change of program income being required to be committed to a specific project at the time received, and drawn first, due to the success of recycling of HOME funds, and CDBG loan repayment, it may become more of a challenge to spend each year's entitlement funds fully, putting future funds in jeopardy. The City will continue, however to work with its partners and successful projects to keep funding moving to continue improving areas of need.

HOME funding shall be directed to housing projects and programs identified in the 5-Year (2015-2019/20) ConPlan, as influenced by market conditions and characteristics influencing the use of funds available, as indicated within SP-30 as referenced below:

TBRA, market characteristics indicated 21 percent of households in the City are cost burdened and paying 30-50 percent of their income toward housing costs. Eighteen percent of households in the City are cost burdened and paying more than 50% of their incomes on housing costs. Additionally, Special needs populations generally face unique housing challenges and housing affordability may be a significant issue for those relying on fixed incomes. This indicates that as a result of the high cost of housing,

special needs groups may be at greater risk of experiencing cost burden and have more trouble finding housing that is affordable to them. They may require rental subsidies to meet the cost of housing.

New Unit Production market characteristics indicated that in total, there are 11,455 units affordable, as per 2007-2011 CHAS data, and reflected in Table 31, to LMI households earning 80% or less AMI, yet there are 13,480 households within this income bracket in need of housing.

Rehabilitation market characteristics as indicated through the Needs Assessment and Market Analysis conducted, there is a need for maintaining and improving existing renter and owner households, as well as senior mobile homes.

Lastly, acquisition, including preservation market characteristics as indicated through the Needs Assessment and Market Analysis, 23 percent of renter households are cost burdened and paying 30-50 percent of their income toward housing costs, while 27 percent are severely cost burdened and paying more than 50 percent of their income on housing costs. Twenty-two percent of owner households are cost burdened and spending 30-50 percent of their income on housing costs, while 13 percent are spending more than 50 percent of their income on housing costs. HACT currently has 4,751 households on the Visalia Area public housing waiting list and 16,242 on the countywide Section 8 waiting list.

Therefore, HOME funds will assist low, very low and extremely low-income households. The figures below represent only the number of estimated families/households Visalia's HOME projects and/or programs may assist during the 2017/18 program Year. For example, continued efforts through Self Help Enterprise, CHDO acquisition, rehabilitation and resale, and rental properties, providing gap financing, and implementing the Tenant Based Rental Assistance Program. With limited available funding, the following number of households at the 30%, 50% and 80% area median income will be assisted:

Describe the reasons for allocation priorities and any obstacles to addressing underserved needs

As opportunities arise, the City investigates grant opportunities, which assist in addressing the obstacles in meeting the needs of underserved populations. As indicated in the Strategic Plan, the City will continue its focus a portion of housing related funding in targeted low-income neighborhoods. However, based on the widespread need for affordable housing including atrisk of homelessness, assistance will be available citywide.

Last two years, the City has provided HOME Community Housing Development Organization (CHDO) funds to Self-Help Enterprises, Inc. (SHE), the City's Certified CHDO, for an acquisition/rehabilitation Projects. The projects allow acquisition of voluntary or foreclosed including vacant and infill properties for single family homes, which will be rehabilitated and resold to income qualifying households. The project also allows acquisition, rehabilitation and rent of multi-family units. SHE was successful in acquiring four homes and one-5 unit multi-family development during the 2015 PY and successfully constructed 36 affordable rental units, with the grand opening occurrence in November of 2016. Therefore, funding towards SHE, as a CHDO, will continue to assist with increasing homeownership, including housing for our homeless population, and improve neighborhoods. SHE will also improve existing rental units which will be leased to low and very low income tenants. SHE also partners with local non-profit service providers.

The City has executed an agreement with Family Services of Tulare County to provide services related to the pilot program, known as Tenant Based Rental Assistance (TBRA), with the use of HOME funds. City Council approved the policies and contract with Family Services in November of 2016. The program is underway with two applicants. Additional funding is recommended toward this activity.

The City also executed an agreement with Family Services of Tulare County to provide case management/street outreach, with the use of CDBG funding. This will provide needed services for our homeless population. Again, additional funding is recommended to increase access to services for our homeless population.

Habitat for Humanity will continue to acquire foreclosed homes within targeted neighborhoods, rehabilitating and reselling to households at or below 120% of the area median income, with the use of the remaining NSP program income funding. However, Habitat's mission is to work with households at or below 80% of the area median income. Habitat is in the process of acquiring an additional foreclosed home to rehabilitate and resell.

The City's Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice (AI) provides an overview of laws, regulations, conditions, and other possible obstacles that affect an individuals or households access to housing in the City. The City has contracted with Fair Housing Council of Central California a non-profit fair housing provider for services related to education, research analysis and other services that may assist in educating the public. Our first educational workshop occurred in November of 2016 for Fair Housing and ADA accessibility.

CDBG Funding was directed toward the Senior Mobile Home Repair Program. City Council approved the policies and contract with Self Help Enterprises for the administration of the program in November of 2016. The program is underway.



Map1: City of Visalia Minority Concentration





Rationale for the priorities for allocating investments geographically

Discussion

Entitlement dollars will be distributed citywide as eligible. However, CDBG funds will be utilized in CDBG Target areas for Code Enforcement and Park Improvements. A presumed Benefit project, such as ADA walkway within a park or low mod residential areas in need of access, would be applicable, in addition to areas within CDBG Eligible areas. This year, less funding is directed toward the CDBG Low Mod Area, due primarily to funding being directed toward the Mobile Home Repair Program, which is within mobile home parks throughout the City. The program is focused upon seniors and households with accessibility needs. The CDBG funding directed toward public services is a citywide public service benefit.

Affordable housing will be citywide, which encompasses CDBG Target Areas. Other programs may benefit within the CDBG Target areas as well, however, are allowed citywide. Tenant Based Rental Assistance Program may fall within the targeted area, only due primarily to the fact services are primarily in the downtown area, which lies within the CDBG low/mod area.

Staff worked with its non-profit partners to expand program and project policies to include additional types of acquisition, such as vacant, infill and reconstruction last year. As funding, through program income becomes available, they would be directed toward SHE/CHDO Acq/Rehab projects due to their success and the housing needs of our community. It is anticipated that two single family properties will be acquired and rehabilitated. It is also anticipated that 1 rental multi-family property will be acquired, rehabilitated and rented.

Staff contracted with Family Services of Tulare County who is working with our homeless population through the new pilot program, known as the Tenant Based Rental Assistance (TBRA). The program provides up to 24 months of rental assistance to qualifying households/persons.

AP-60 Public Housing - 91.220(h)

Introduction

The Housing Authority works closely with the City, Continuum of Care "Alliance" and the recently formed Homeless Resource Task Group. Actions planned by the PHA this year are referenced below.

Actions planned during the next year to address the needs to public housing

The Housing Authority of the County of Tulare (HATC) indicated that they will continue to own and manage 179 units in the City of Visalia. They stated that there is no plan to purchase additional public-housing units, nor do they plan on removing any units from their inventory. Their current projection is that there will be an investment of \$427,500 in Capital Fund improvements for the 2017 – 2018 Fiscal Year. The noted expenditures will cover maintenance and rehabilitation in public-housing units within the City of Visalia. HATC's Capital Fund expenditures will cover a large range of projects, including roofing replacement, landscaping improvements, carpet replacement along with Air Conditioning and Heating unit improvements.

Actions to encourage public housing residents to become more involved in management and participate in homeownership

The Housing Authority of Tulare County is proactive in the inclusion of public-housing residents in the policy making process. HATC indicated that an equitable and transparent policy making process tis one that includes the opinions of public housing residents and is achieved through the participation of two tenant commissioners on HATC's Board. Furthermore, HATC has installed a Resident Counsel which is made up of five residents from all of HUD funded programs (Multifamily Housing, LIHTC, HOME, Section 8 Housing Choice Vouchers and public-housing). Their Resident Counsel works with HATC staff on evaluating the effectiveness and efficiency of HATC rental assistance programs. This provides members the opportunity to provide input on necessary program modifications.

A vital driving factor in the implementation of HATC programs is the promotion of tenant self-sufficiency. Their agency views the goal of homeownership for program participants as one of the long term goals for all of their clients. HATC staff works with tenants to effectively provide them with the necessary resources to achieve homeownership. Their Annual Re-Examination Notice provides public-housing participants with an extensive referral list that provides assistance with homeownership. Their list includes programs managed by: CSET, City of Visalia, Habitat for Humanity, CalHFA, and Self Help Enterprises. HATC's program coordinator works with any interested public housing tenant in order to effectively inform them of all the different programs that are available to them. Effective collaboration between their agency and other

public and nonprofit agencies is imperative to help promote homeownership among all of HATC's tenants.

If the PHA is designated as troubled, describe the manner in which financial assistance will be provided or other assistance

The Housing Authority of the County of Tulare is a high performer and not determined to be troubled.

AP-65 Homeless and Other Special Needs Activities – 91.220(i)

Introduction

This section provides an overview of how the City will address the needs of homeless persons over the next year.

Describe the jurisdictions one-year goals and actions for reducing and ending homelessness including

Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs

In the next year, the City and its partners will continue targeted outreach efforts of unsheltered homeless persons. The Visalia Police Department has two funded Homeless Liaison Officers that work closely with the PATH Case Manager and the Alliance Housing Navigator. On a weekly basis, the team will visit hot spots, encampments and other areas that homeless persons are known to congregate. Homeless persons will be offered supportive services and given the opportunity to have a housing assessment conducted with the overarching goal of placing chronic homeless persons into housing first programs.

The City will also continue to support the Alliance's outreach efforts to persons experiencing homelessness. On an annual basis, the Alliance conducts a Project Homeless Connect (PHC) event in conjunction with the Point in Time (PIT) census. The one-day PIT survey provides a snapshot of the adults, children in households and unaccompanied youth living in the City of Visalia who meet HUD's definition of homelessness. Information gathered through the PIT is used to understand the causes and trends over time of homelessness, as well as to determine the unmet shelter and service needs of the homeless.

PHC is a national best practice that is a one-stop-shop of comprehensive support services for people experiencing homelessness. Guests attending the event are partnered with volunteers who assist in identifying and accessing necessary resources. The 2017 event is held on January 26, 2017.

Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

A contract for public services was awarded to Family Services of Tulare County (FSTC) to utilize \$70,000 in Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding up to two years. FSTC has the experience and capacity to provide public services through the program. The primary focus of this public service- is so that Family Services staff may reach approximately 24 homeless people through "street outreach efforts". The secondary focus of this public service funded activity will be providing approximately 14 people case management services that will enable them to be more self-sufficient in order to gain housing. FSTC seeks to identify at-risk and homeless clients

2017 Annual Action Plan (July 1, 2017 – June 30, 2018) City of Visalia who have not yet been linked to a formal support system in order to work with them on completing the VI-SPDAT assessment, assisting them with becoming "document ready" for potential housing opportunities (i.e. obtaining identification, homeless/disability certification), connecting them to critical supportive services such as mental health and substance abuse treatment, and providing linkages to immediate needs such as food, clothing, hygiene products, transportation assistance, emergency shelter and referrals to medical care. FSTC will also work with code enforcement and police staff to reach new clients and connect them to services. This would include any housing opportunities available, through other funding sources and grant opportunities.

Additionally, Tenant Based Rental Assistance (TBRA) will be used as a bridge to long term housing stability as much as possible by Family Services. HOME funded TBRA Program, in the amount of \$175,000 through previous year funding, including PI, shall be utilized as rental assistance and security deposit which will assist approximately 16 households. The rental assistance will be provided for a period of eighteen months (18), however, will allow for two – 3 month extensions through a re-application process. No more than 24 months of assistance is allowed under the HOME TBRA regulations. It is anticipated that during the period of assistance clients may be receiving support and services that will enable them to be more self-sufficient in housing when the assistance ends. The TBRA Program is prohibited from requiring participation in medical or disability-related services as a condition of receiving or continuing to receive HOME-TBRA. However, it is encouraged for each individual to have a strong connection with a support service provider, which may be offered as referenced under the HOME Regulations. The City has allocated Housing Successor funding in the amount of \$80,077 which will provide case management/supportive services, street outreach for a two year period.

Furthermore, the City continues their efforts of providing CDBG funds in the amount of \$25,575, to Family Services as matching funds, for case management (public services) to support the Tulare Housing First Shelter Plus Care Program (Voucher Program). This program provides case management services to 14 people annually.

The City also provides \$15,000 annually to the Continuum of Care for public services related to Project Homeless Connect/Point In Time Survey.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

The City of Visalia supports and collaborates with local service providers, through the Alliance, to assist homeless individuals and families. Funding priorities include supporting existing high performing housing first rapid rehousing and permanent supporting housing projects.

Use of the coordinated entry system ensures that chronic homeless individuals and families, veterans and other special need populations are prioritized for housing opportunities based on their acuity. All programs within the Continuum- emergency, transitional and permanent housing- include supportive services for their clients.

Each program designs and implements supportive services based on their target population and partnerships leveraged within the community. The overarching goal of the supportive services offered is to link individuals and/or families with mainstream benefits and income support, education and employment services, as well as health and life skills services. These linkages are a critical component to assisting clients in self-sufficiency, reducing episodes of homelessness, and preventing recidivism.

Programs that serve these vulnerable subpopulations include:

CSET, Family Services, Turning Point and Tulare County HHSA provide PSH programs for chronically homeless individuals and families and/or families with children.

The Veterans' Administration, in conjunction with the Housing Authority of Tulare County, operates the VASH program, which HATC noted they have 58 VASH Vouchers that they are currently administering in Tulare County. Westcare operates the SSVF program that serves eligible veterans and their families. Uplifting Families operates a Transitional Housing Program for transitioning age youth.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); or, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs.

Prevention and shelter diversion are key interventions in the fight to end homelessness. Hearing from the housing and service provider experts, immediate screening for these possibilities at entry is an important tactic and can preserve emergency beds for households that truly have nowhere else to go. Access to rental subsidies and case management at entry is often enough to ensure the household successfully remains housed. To that end, the Alliance has implemented common eligibility standards for all ESG and HUD funded programs. The eligibility standards are contained in the Every Door Open coordinated entry system written standards.

As households access the coordinated entry system, they are assessed using the community's common assessment tool. Households scoring between a 0-3 are automatically diverted from the system through a comprehensive referral process that includes 2-1-1 and MOUs with partner agencies.

Another important component of prevention/diversion is assisting households with income supports and connections to mainstream benefits. The SSI/SSDI Outreach, Access and Recovery (SOAR) model is designed to increase access to SSI/SSDI for eligible homeless adults who are and have a mental illness and/or a co-occurring substance use disorder. Staff from all CoC-funded agencies is required to assist clients in obtaining these mainstream benefits. Participation by these agencies provides an efficacious method of assisting households who may otherwise pursue homelessness assistance.

AP-75 Barriers to affordable housing - 91.220(j)

Introduction

The City is committed to removing barriers to affordable housing. City staff works with other departments and its non-governmental partners to coordinate efforts to eliminate barriers to affordable housing. Barriers to affordable housing include the following:

- Housing Affordability
- Housing Stock
- Policies and Programs

The efforts to eliminate each of these barriers to affordable housing share some common approaches and commitment of resources. However, the City also recognizes that each barrier has unique aspects which require more focused and specialized approaches to achieve effective and lasting solutions.

Actions it planned to remove or ameliorate the negative effects of public policies that serve as barriers to affordable housing such as land use controls, tax policies affecting land, zoning ordinances, building codes, fees and charges, growth limitations, and policies affecting the return on residential investment

As an integral component of its General Plan Housing Element Update, adopted and certified in December 2016, the City completed a critical analysis of its existing codes and policies to identify any existing codes or policies that directly or indirectly inhibit the City's ability to facilitate affordable housing for all persons. As a result of this analysis, the City eliminated, amended, or incorporated 64 Housing Element Programs that are detailed in the Policy Document (Part 3) of the adopted Housing Element Update. Pursuant to the intent and process as stated in the Housing Element, and consistent with State Housing Law, the City has committed to completing all code revisions, program implementation actions and procedures to implement these Housing Programs. These Housing Element Programs are organized into nine Goals categories, as follows:

- 1. New Construction- To provide a broad range of housing types and densities to meet the needs of all Visalia residents
- 2. Mixed Use, Infill, and Downtown Development- To promote mixed use, infill, and Downtown development in Visalia
- 3. Encourage Affordable Housing- To encourage construction and maintenance of affordable housing in Visalia
- 4. Foreclosures- To prevent foreclosures, protect affected families, and stabilize neighborhoods impacted by foreclosures
- 5. Special Needs/Homeless- To provide a range of housing types and services to meet the needs of households with special needs within the city

2017 Annual Action Plan (July 1, 2017 – June 30, 2018) City of Visalia

- 6. Housing Rehabilitation Program- To create and maintain healthy neighborhoods by improving the condition of the existing housing stock and providing for a variety of housing types, sizes, price ranges, and densities compatible with the existing character and integrity of residential neighborhoods
- 7. Equal Opportunity Housing and Discrimination Prevention- To provide decent housing and a quality of living environment for all Visalia residents regardless of age, religion, race, creed, gender, sexual orientation, marital status, ancestry, national origin, disability, economic level, and other arbitrary factors
- 8. Energy Conservation- To encourage energy efficiency in all new and existing housing
- 9. Implementation Monitoring- To ensure that Housing Element programs are implemented on a timely basis, and progress of each program is monitored and evaluated annually

Discussion

Specific Housing Element Programs that were adopted with 2016 Housing Element Update that positively impact the City's affordable and inclusive housing goals, and directly contribute to the goal of eliminating barriers to affordable housing are noted as follows:

- Affordable Housing Infill Incentive component to implement the City's overall Infill Incentive Program – Adds 10% Traffic Impact Fee reduction to projects that include Low income category housing.
- Encourage new mobile home parks- Increases densities to underlying zone district and reduces excessive setback and yard requirements.
- Streamline Special Needs Housing (transitional and supportive housing, employee housing) permit requirements- Eliminates the 6-person maximum threshold for facilities requiring a Conditional Use Permit (CUP).
- Eliminate need for variance or exception where needed to accommodate reasonable accommodation for persons with disabilities.

Actions planned to foster and maintain affordable housing

The City will continue to work closely with non-profit housing and service providers to collaborate on improving the awareness and expansion of available resources to address the needs of the homeless population.

Staff recently obtained approval by the City Council of the Tenant Based Rental Assistance (TBRA) program policies and contract with Family Services of Tulare County, as a sub recipient. The TBRA Pilot Program, Home funded, will provide rental assistance for a period of eighteen months (18) however, will allow for two-3 month extensions through a re-application process. No more than 24 months of assist is allowed. We anticipate assisting approximately 8 to 16 households. Supportive services will also be available to the tenants through Housing Successor funding.

Actions planned to reduce lead-based paint hazards

The Tulare County Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Program provides educational information and training for inspectors. For all of the City's housing programs, applicants are

informed of the danger of lead-based paint through a brochure as part of the application process. In addition, City building inspectors are alert of the application process as well as alert to signs of this hazard as they perform their substandard housing inspections. All housing owners and occupants with which the City interacts through its various programs are required to abate this hazard as a condition of assistance from the City.

According to 2011-2015 ACS 5-year estimates, 39% of owner-occupied housing units, and 50.8% of renter occupied housing units were built before 1980 in the City. The use of lead-based paint was banned nationwide in 1970. It is estimated that 42 percent of the City's housing stock contains lead-based paint. As units continue to be repaired, rehabilitated, or replace, no lead-based paint has been used since 1978.

For all of the City's housing programs, applicants are provided information related to the dangers of lead-based paint through a brochure as part of the application process. All program participants with which the City interacts through its various programs are required to abate this hazard as a condition of assistance from the City.

The City also requires its subrecipients and/developers to conduct lead testing on pre-1978 homes and multi-family units it purchases through its affordable housing programs. The City also requires the rehabilitation contractor to utilize safe practices and obtain certification through a HUD-certified lead testing agency.

Actions planned to reduce the number of poverty-level families

The City works with Family Services through the Voucher Program to reduce the number of poverty-level families. The City will also continue to provide its non-profit partners with funding to acquire, rehabilitate, and sell homes to income-qualifying households at or below 80% AMI.

Additionally, the City has made a commitment to improve the communication and service delivery capabilities of agencies and organizations that provide programs to assist the homeless. Specifically, Staff participates in the monthly Continuum of Care (Alliance) meeting, the Visalia Homeless Connect Task Group and the recently formed Homeless Solutions Group to identify funding and opportunities to provide Visalia's homeless population with housing and service opportunities.

The City will also continue to partner with organizations to provide services and address the full range of needs of LMI families. Although there are coordinated programs and services to reduce poverty, it is recognized that many unmet needs will remain. The City will continue to work with its partners to identify and work toward meeting those needs by strategically focusing its resources and efforts.

2017 Annual Action Plan (July 1, 2017 – June 30, 2018) City of Visalia

Actions planned to develop institutional structure

The City is a charter city and is managed under a Council-manager form of government. City Council provides policy direction to the City Manager who is responsible for administering City operations. City Council members are the leaders and policymakers elected to represent the community and concentrate on policy that addresses the citizens' needs and wishes. The City Manager is appointed by the City Council to carry out policy and ensure that the entire community is served. The legislative body is the City Council and City Councilmembers are the community's decision makers.

The Community Development Department Director oversees and administers the day-to-day activities of the CDBG, CalHOME, NSP1 and HOME programs. Staff works together with various City departments to develop programs and activities that improve low-and moderate-income neighborhoods throughout the City. The administration of program activities includes housing, public services, public facility, park and infrastructure improvements, and economic development activities.

Interdepartmental communication and collaboration are two strengths of the delivery system. City staff from various departments works with local organizations and agencies that assist low-income households and individuals. High priority needs were identified during the Consolidated Plan's community engagement and public review periods.

During the Consolidated Plan public review period, these priorities were established. Additionally, Staff meets with the City Manager, Assistant City Manager, Assistant Finance Director, Community Development Director and Community Development Administrative Services Manager to review the high priority needs, goals established, funding and activities. The Annual Action Plan is designed to address the needs and priorities identified within the Consolidated Plan and direct limited funding available toward the highest needs.

Actions planned to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies

The City continues to hold community meetings to enhance coordination between housing providers, government agencies, mental health, and other key stakeholders in the City. The purpose of these meetings is to establish a network of agencies to enhance the delivery of services to the homeless, disabled individuals and families, and others seeking services. These meetings are conducted on a quarterly basis.

With the most recent meeting held by the Homeless Solutions Group was January 23, 2017, to continue the discussions of homeless needs, including case management, affordable housing, available rental units and increased partnerships. In the event final CDBG and HOME program entitlement and program income is higher or lower than expected herein, the City of Visalia may add, subtract or transfer amounts among identified projects, as noted without publishing substantial amendment, if the amount is below 75 % change, as per the approved Citizens Participation Plan. The amount to be recaptured will not exceed the amount of net proceeds available at the time the home is sold. HOME rule limits recapture to available net proceeds, therefore, if net proceeds are insufficient for the city to recapture the full amount of the Direct HOME assistance, the City will recapture only what is available from net proceeds. This applies regardless of the nature of the sale (voluntary sales including short sales, and involuntary sales including foreclosures).

The SHE-CHDO Program utilizes the "Recapture Provision". HOME funds are invested in the acquisition, rehabilitation, and/or new construction/reconstruction and Direct Subsidy shall be up to 10% of the total HOME investment (i.e. \$196,000 acq/rehab cost X 10% = \$19,600 Direct Subsidy to homebuyer), which shall be provided as a Second Mortgage to the qualifying new homebuyer. If the property is sold below fair market value, the difference between the fair market value and the purchase price is considered to be part of the HOME subsidy and provided directly to the homebuyer as a direct subsidy. And, any additional subsidy provided to the homebuyer to enable them to purchase the property, which includes down payment assistance, closing costs, interest subsidies, or other HOME assistance including any assistance that reduced the purchase price from fair market value to an affordable price, shall be recaptured.

A 30- year covenant shall be recorded to maintain affordability. The SHE-CHDO Program covenant shall use the "Recapture Provision", as referenced under 24, CFR 92.254 (a) (5) (ii) (A) (1) and shall begin the date the Deed of Trust is recorded. In the case of the homebuyer selling the home during affordability period, the City may recapture the entire amount of the direct HOME Subsidy and the difference between the fair market value and the purchase price, if the purchase price is below the fair market value, and any additional assistance as referenced above. The amount to be recaptures will not exceed the amount of net proceeds available at the time the home is sold. HOME rule limits recapture to available net proceeds, therefore, if net proceeds are insufficient for the city to recapture the full amount of the Direct HOME assistance, the City will recapture only what is available from net proceeds. This applies regardless of the nature of the sale (voluntary sales including short sales, and involuntary sales including foreclosures).

Note: Staff works with the City Attorney in updating legal documents to comply with the funding source and type of program(s) administered.

The FTHB, SHE-CHDO Program loan documents were reviewed last year by HUD. No changes have been made to these policies. However, if HUD requests a copy for review, City Staff will again provide documents if required prior to implementing the program.

For the 2017Action Plan, the allocations for Visalia is estimated at \$1,116,868 in CDBG grant funds, with estimated \$25,000 in program income; and, \$369,985 HOME grant funds, with an estimated 150,000 in program income. The 2017 grant award may be more or less than last years' figures. This is an estimate- range.

In FY 2017, Visalia will fund act ivies in furtherance of the objectives and priorities identified in the Strategic Plan with the outcome of improving availability, accessibility, affordability and sustainability through activities which benefit the community. The activities for the 2017 FY will support at least one objective and one outcome.

Proposed 2016 Action Plan Amendment activities: The 2016 HOME Amendment is due to additional program income received, and anticipated in total up to \$200k, which is proposed for additional funding to Self Help as a designated CHDO toward Acq/Rehab or new construction of housing.

Department Recommendation: On March 20, 2017, City Council and the public will be asked to comment on the Draft 2016 HOME Action Plan amendment and the Draft 2017 Action Plan. No decisions regarding the 2016 Action Plan Amendment and 2017 Action Plan need to be made by Council at this time.

At the meeting of January 17, 2017, Staff requested Council's direction in preparation of the proposed 2016 amendment and proposed 2017 activities. The March 20th meeting provides City Council and the public an additional opportunity to comment on the Draft amendment and plan, as well as share public comments received during the 30-day public comment period (February 01, 2017 through March 02, 2017). This item will be brought back to the Council on April 03, 2017 for approval of the 2016 HOME Amendment of \$200,000, increasing Self Help Enterprises (SHE-CHDO Acq/Rehab Project) funding and the 2017 Action Plan activities with the use of available Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) and HOME Investment Partnership (HOME) funds.

Summary: HUD encourages Council and citizen participation and encourages commenting upon the recommendations presented in the Draft Plan. On January 17, 2017, staff published notice of the City Council meeting and requested feedback in the preparation of the 2016 Amendment and 2017 Action Plan. The public notice also included opportunities in February 2017 to attend community meetings and March and April to attend Council meetings to review the draft and final plan.

This is the final review of the DRAFT 2016 Amendment and 2017 Action Plan prior to the public hearing, scheduled for April 3, 2017, which City Council is anticipated to approve and thereafter be submitted to HUD by May 1st in order to meet the submission deadline of May 15th.

Community meetings and comments received to date, during the public noticing period (February 01, 2017 – March 02, 2017), includes, presentations of the 2016 Draft Action Plan Amendment and 2017 Draft Action Plan to the Citizens Advisory Committee (CAC) on February 1, 2017; the North Visalia Neighborhood Advisory Committee (NVNAC) on February 9, 2017; the Disability Advocacy Committee (DAC) on February 13, 2017, and the Continuum of Care "The Alliance", which supported the recommended Draft 2016 Amendment and 2017 Draft Action Plan projects and programs. Additional details regarding comments received from the various committees are included within Attachment "D", and follow in this report.

This report also includes Council's request to follow up on the January 17, 2017, work session related to utilizing CDBG funding outside of the CDBG low/mod income eligible census tracts, and dollars invested to date.

Background Discussion: As a participating jurisdiction and entitlement community, the City of Visalia receives federal formula grants through the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). This entitlement provides the City with annual direct grants, to provide decent affordable housing, a suitable living environment and to expand economic opportunities, primarily for low-income persons/households.

The 2016 Action Plan Amendment includes directing \$200,000 in additional HOME program income to Self Help Enterprises, Community Housing Development Organization (SHE-CHDO) Acquisition-Rehab Projects to acquire, rehabilitate and resell single family homes which will be sold to income qualifying families and acquire, rehabilitate multi-family dwelling type projects, which will be rented after rehabilitation to income qualifying tenants/households. Table 1 (Attachment A), reflects the 2016 HOME Amendment.

The estimated 2017 Action Plan grant allocation is \$1,116,868 CDBG grant funds plus \$25,000 in estimated CDBG program income and \$369,985 HOME grant funds plus \$150,000 in estimated program income, to be directed toward eligible activities as reflected in Table 2 (Attachment "B") as, "2017 Action Plan Estimated Budget". Table 2 includes the estimated program income (PI), derived from repayment of existing borrower first time homebuyer and rehabilitation loans and recycling program income derived from the resell of a SHE CHDO property.

The full DRAFT 2017 Action Plan report is included as Attachment "C", with an overview of the CDBG and HOME activities listed below.

Review of comments received:

January 17, 2017, Council Work Session follow up on comments:

Investigate Underground Districts "Rule 20a" when evaluating ADA projects

In response to Council's comment on utilizing undergrounding district funding to help with improving accessibility by undergrounding utilities, the Underground Utility District, "Rule 20A", is funding projects financed by utility rate monies collected by the local electricity provider (for Visalia, Southern California Edison). It sets policies and procedures for the conversion of overhead facilities to underground facilities. High costs associated with major arterials take multiple years to fund and construct. Southern California Edison controls the funding and also completes the scope of work; however, the City is able to decide what projects to complete, with City Council's approval through a resolution which approves the underground district formed. Projects are selected based on their association with other projects. Council prioritized the top 5 projects in 2010, which Engineering is currently working on Project "UD21" on Burke Street,

extension of School to Tipton and Goshen to Center, which is related to the Visalia Emergency Communication Center and road improvements in that area.

Possible future undergrounding projects identified Houston Avenue and many other prospective projects. Building sufficient funding will take many years and residential areas are a lower priority for Rule 20A. Utilizing CDBG funding for this type of work is not recommended as it involves right of way acquisition and utility coordination which is problematic and in some instances not allowed. It is also very expensive work.

Expansion of Wittman Village

Council noted the property at the community campus, would be a potential location for the expansion of recreational activities, such as soccer fields for the Wittman Village. Council authorized the submission of a Housing and Community Development (HCD) State Housing Related Park Grant (HRP) application in February of 2017 for this project. The HRP Grant submittal included the eligible location at the Wittman Village for such improvements. Dependent upon the grant allocation, the HCD-HRP funding will be directed toward the Wittman Village Park, then any remainder toward the Oval Park.

South City Advocacy

It was voiced that the south portion of the City does not have a committee representing their needs, such as improvements to the area surrounding Central Street and the south side of Santa Fe. There was discussion that after Council Districts are fully implemented in 2018, each Council member could consider formation of a committee for his/her respective district.

Senior Mobile Home Repair

Self Help Enterprises is administering the Senior Mobile Home Repair Program, which allows income eligible owners of mobile homes to request a forgivable loan to address health and safety issues, including replacement of roofs, flooring, plumbing and electrical up to \$11,000.

CDBG Funding used outside of targeted areas, including Santa Fe, Central Avenue and Linwood Street.

Per HUD regulations, CDBG funding is primarily used within the CDBG Targeted Areas, which meet the low mod income requirements. Other funding sources have contributed to improvements along Santa Fe, toward Caldwell, with the construction of the Santa Fe Trail, which invested approximately \$1.25 million in Measure R Trail funds.

Central Avenue, between Tulare and Walnut do not meet the CDBG low mod income census tract/block requirements. City funding has not contributed in the last decade towards projects in the area; however, Kaweah Management Company and the Housing Authority of Tulare County now own four complexes along Central.

Linwood Street, between Caldwell and Whitendale Avenues does not meet the CDBG low mod income census tract/block requirements. However, use of Safe Route to School funds and

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Measure R Local funding in the amount of \$400,000 contributed to the improvements in the area.

HOME funds may be used citywide for homeownership and rental housing. Examples of affordable housing programs used outside CDBG areas include Senior Mobile Home Repair Program; Self Help Enterprises CHDO acquisition, rehabilitation and resell of single-family homes and rental of multi-family properties; and the new HOME Tenant Based Rental Assistance (TBRA) program which assists our homeless population (LMI) with rental housing up to 2 years is a citywide program, allowing the tenant to locate a unit to rent within city limits.

Additionally, Cal Home (State funded) down payment assistance programs are available, allowing the borrower to locate a home anywhere within city limits, which, Staff will be returning to Council soon with available funding from repayment of loans and policy revisions.

Community Meetings (February) Comments:

Community meetings and comments received to date, during the public noticing period (February 01, 2017 – March 02, 2017), includes, presentations of the 2016 Draft Action Plan Amendment and 2017 Draft Action Plan to the Citizens Advisory Committee (CAC) on February 1, 2017, where the CAC supported the recommended projects and programs.

Staff met with the North Visalia Neighborhood Advisory Committee (NVNAC) on February 9, 2017, where the committee submitted a list of 5 recommendations, which include a request to construct an ADA approved "meandering" walking/travel path, half-court basketball court, and install a bench within the children only in the Oval Park. They also requested the City aggressively seek a tenant for the Oval Park Service Center to bring new energy to the park as well as consider moving power-lines underground on Houston Avenue between Mooney Boulevard and Dinuba Boulevard to allow sidewalks.

Lastly, staff met with the Disability Advocacy Committee (DAC) on February 13, 2017, which asked about the type of services that may be available to the recipients of the homeless programs. Staff informed the committee that Family Services is the administrator of the new programs, which is working closely with the Continuum of Care, non-profit service and housing providers, including city policy and code enforcement staff.

Comments were also received from the Continuum of Care (CoC) "The Alliance", which supported the recommended 2016 Amendment and 2017 Action Plan projects and programs. However, they also requested that the City consider adding a program to establish a landlord mitigation fund, which would be used to offset damages and/or potential risk undertaken as a result of leasing to persons experiencing homelessness. In response to CoC's request, the use of CDBG and/or HOME funding does not allow for this type of program. There is approximately \$169,000 in Housing Successor funds that are currently available, which staff, along with the homeless task group are currently investigating funding, partnerships and various programs and their success. The suggested program is among those being researched.

Fiscal Impact: Once approved in April, the 2016 Amendment would authorize directing up to \$200,000 of HOME funding to Self Help CHDO Acquisition-Rehab Program and authorize 2017 CDBG including estimated PI and HOME including estimated PI allocations toward projects, programs and their activities.

Prior Council Action: January 17, 2017, Council provided direction on proposed 2016 Amendment and proposed 2017 Action Plan activities in order to finalize preparation of the Draft Plan.

Committee/Commission Review and Action: Community meetings were help in preparing the plan and also held during the public noticing 30-day period. Community meetings included the Citizens Advisory Committee, Disability Advocacy Committee, North Visalia Neighborhood Advisory Committee, Continuum of Care.

Summary: As a condition of receiving federal funds, HUD requires the City to prepare a fiveyear Consolidated Plan (ConPlan) (prepared and approved 2015), and a yearly Action Plan (AP). Each year the City goes through the process of evaluating proposed Action Plan activities for the use of Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) and HOME Investment Partnership (HOME) funds. This is the third year of the five year ConPlan.

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As required by HUD, Staff conducted outreach, reviewed the 5 Year strategic Plan and proposed 2016 HOME Amendment, proposed 2017 Action Plan CDBG and HOME activities with various community committees and City Council between December 2016 and January of 2017. The Draft Plan and Amendment was prepared and then made available for public review and comment on February 1, 2017 through March 02, 2017. During this time, Staff presented the Draft Plan to various committees and made available to the community through noticing and outreach efforts to obtain feedback. Staff then presented the Draft 2016 HOME Amendment (Attachment "A") and CDBG and HOME Budget (Attachment "B"), to City Council on March 20, 201. This report includes the 2017 Action Plan report (Attachment "C").

Comments received to date include general support of proposed activities, support of working with our local non-profit agencies on acquisition of properties, which will assist in improving neighborhoods and homeless program efforts. This report includes responses to community and Council's comments since December of 2016 (Attachment "D").

This is the final review and approval of the 2016 HOME Amendment and 2017 Action Plan. The figures provided are estimated on the previous year funding, and will be finalized upon Congressional Budget approval and HUD's noticing. The Plan will be submitted to HUD for review and approval by May 5th in order to meet the submission/response deadline of May 15th.

Background Discussion: As a participating jurisdiction and entitlement community, the City of Visalia receives federal formula grants through the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). This entitlement provides the City with annual direct grants, to provide decent affordable housing, a suitable living environment and to expand economic opportunities, primarily for low-income persons/households. This includes census tract areas that reflect 51% of the household income at or below 80% area median income.

HOME 2016 Amendment:

The 2016 Action Plan HOME Amendment directs up to \$200,000 in additional HOME Program Income (PI) received funds to continue the success of the Self Help Enterprises, Inc. Community Housing Development Organization (SHE-CHDO) Acq/Rehab projects. Additional HOME Program Income in the amount of \$130,000 was recently received from Self Help's resell of a SHE-CHDO Project home, with additional funding anticipated from loan payments through our loan portfolio; therefore, the amendment reflects an amount up to \$200,000 in HOME funds toward Self Help's successful projects, allowing them to implement both single family and multifamily dwelling type projects. Table 1 (Attachment A), reflects the 2016 HOME Amendment.

2017 Action Plan:

Based on successful established activities which meet the 5 year priorities, feedback, and existing commitments and contracts (non-discretionary) and discretionary project funding, Staff has developed the proposed 2017 activity listing with HOME and CDBG allocations including program income (PI). The estimated program income (PI), is derived from repayment of existing borrower first time homebuyer and rehabilitation loans and recycling program income

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derived from Self Help Enterprises (purchased, rehabilitated and resold homes). Staff has provided a side-by-side comparison, in Table 2, (Attachment B) including prior year rollover balance budgets with their respective project and program commitment activities along with the proposed projects for the 2017 Action Plan. The 2017 Action Plan (Fiscal Year 2017/18, which is July 1st, 2017 thru June 30, 2018) funding will deliver continued programs, projects and services to the community.

Staff has not yet received notice of Program Year 2017 Action Plan funding. Typically, HUD notifies grantees between April and June. Therefore, the figures provided to the public and Council at this time, are estimated on the previous year funding received only. The 2017 funding may be more or less, which the difference will be reflected within the CDBG ADA compliance program and HOME funding difference will be reflected within Self Help's CHDO Acq/Rehab Program.

The 2017 CDBG Grant estimate is \$1,116,868 plus estimated program income of \$25,000, totals \$1,141,868, which is recommended for use toward the following eligible proposed CDBG activities:

Re: Minor amendment to 2017-2018 Action Plan

On April 03, 2017, City Council approved the 2017-2018 Annual Action Plan (and Amendment). The Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) and projects submitted and HOME Investment Partnership Funds (HOME) were estimates based upon the 20176 program year. Within the Action Plan, it was noted with an asterisk, stating, "*HOME SHE CHDO Acq/Rehab & CDBG Public Infrastructure/ADA projects may increase or decrease dependent upon program income received and actual grant allocation". See Attachment "A" estimated tables for all CDBG and HOME projects/programs.

On June 16, 2017, HUD posted the 2017 CDBG and HOME jurisdiction allocations. Based upon the actual CDBG grant of \$1,188,919 funding represented an increase of \$72,051 more than the estimated \$1,116,868. This is considered a minor amendment increase. The actual HOME Grant of \$371,694, represented \$1,709 more than the estimated \$369,985. This is also considered a minor amendment increase. See Attachment "B" final actual tables for all CDBG and HOME projects/programs. Table 1 below reflects the estimated figures, actuals and percentage of change to the specific projects affected, resulting in only a Minor Amendment memo.
