FOUR OFFICERS RECEIVE MEDAL OF VALOR: Visalia Police Captain Perry Phipps, Detective Nate Flaws, Detective Blake McEwen and Officer Josh Pena were awarded the Medal of Valor at the Sept. 6 Visalia City Council meeting by Visalia Police Chief Colleen Mestas. The four officers received this prestigious award for their exceptional courage, extraordinary decisiveness and swift action in confronting and neutralizing an armed suspect who had shot Lay Bishop Clay Sannar at the Church of Latter Day Saints earlier on August 29, 2010. Sannar ultimately succumbed to his injuries.

COUNCIL NAMES 10 TO ELECTION TASK FORCE: At its Sept. 6 meeting at the Visalia Convention Center, the Visalia City Council appointed the following Visalia residents to the Election Process Task Force: Robert Aguilar, Brody Blain, Phil Bourdette, Jennifer Gomez, Nathan Hernandez, Tom Johnson, Darlene Mata, Glenn Morris, Stephen Peck and Harry Wood. Vice Mayor Amy Shuklian and Council member Warren Gubler, who served as the Council's Election Process Subcommittee, will recommend the final three members of the Task Force to the Council at its September 19 meeting. The task force will be responsible for considering several areas, including:

- Reviewing the types of City Council election formats being used in other cities that comply with federal and state election law; - Considering whether the Council should consider changing how it is elected, including the
- implementation of a by-district election process, and;
- Considering the current demographic and voter makeup statistics in the 2010 Census and recent election data, and how these statistics relate to whether and how the City's election process should be changed. Based on the research, the Task Force will then make a recommendation on if an at-large election is still appropriate for the City, how many districts would be included if a by-district election is recommended. and other changes to the election process.

HISTORIC RECOGNITION PROGRAM APPROVED: The City Council approved a Historic Recognition Program (HRP) that allows interested building owners an opportunity to be considered for a plaque to identify buildings with local historical significance to the community. To qualify for an interpretive marker, the building must be at least 75 years old, researched for its authenticity, and at a minimum, the date of construction must be reasonably determined. The research and documentation must be conducted by qualified historical research personnel approved by the City of Visalia Historic Preservation Advisory Committee, and submitted with the application. Once mounted, all plaques become the property and responsibility of the building owner. The structure does not need to be within the City of Visalia Historic District or on the Local Register of Historic Structures. The estimated cost of each plaque, with installation, is \$750, and funding is currently available through a \$10,500 grant from Kaweah Kollectors. For more information, click here.

OTHER COUNCIL NEWS: The City Council authorized the City Manager to sign a contract for \$30,000 with the Arts Consortium to coordinate the implementation of the City's Cultural Plan. Half of that amount, or \$15,000, is used to fund Cultural arts grants throughout the community. The total amount is equal to the funds the City contributed in the last budget, and has enabled the Arts Consortium to receive additional funds through the State's arts program.

HEALTHIER CHOICES AT VISALIA COMMUNITY CENTERS: The City's Community Centers are now healthier places to grab a quick snack or beverage. The Visalia Parks and Recreation Department has established a Healthy Beverage and Snack Standard for vending machines at its four community centers. The standards call for at least half of the drinks and snacks inside vending machines to meet certain nutrition standards. The new standards are an effort to help improve health and prevent Type 2 diabetes, becoming overweight and obesity. For more information, click here.

TRANSIT CALL CENTER HITS 6,000: The Green Line, a toll-free call center for public transit systems in Tulare and Kings Counties, hit a milestone in August with over 6,000 calls. With a combined population of over 460,000 potential bus riders, the Green Line has proven to be a successful service that has seen its call volume increase from 244 calls in its first month in June 2009 to over 6,000 calls in August, the highest month ever. Citizens of both counties can travel regionally using only public transit systems. The Green Line is a way to bring transit information on all systems into a "one-stop shop." Numbers were coming in stronger than budgeted but the final revenues for June sent the totals way over the top. Smith Concert, 2,000 expected. **TASTE THE ARTS SEPT. 29-OCT. 1:** Visalia's Taste the Arts, a festival held September

29 through October 1 celebrates the richness and diversity of the arts in Tulare County and gives artists, musicians, performers, and art organizations from throughout the county an opportunity to show off the best of their work through performances, exhibits, and demonstrations. Taste the Arts is part of the Arts Consortium's Cultural Arts Plan, and debuted as an opportunity for residents and visitors to experience, or "taste", the area's arts first-hand. This year's event is kicked off by the 18th Annual Waiters Race, and a free street concert with the up and coming "Free Energy". Friday features the Creative Center's Art Xposed Hair and Fashion show and the renowned "Blind Boys of Alabama". Garden Street will be lined with festive tents on Oct. 1, with more than 35 artists displaying their work. An Urban Art Show, Visalia Farmer's Market food sculpture contest, and clay wheel will give the public an opportunity to move from spectator to participant. Bands and musicians, including *Phil Walker* and *Occasional Brass*, will entertain the crowd as they stop for a drink or food at local favorite gathering spot - the Garden Street Plaza. Around the corner, youth from Kids Edition, YMCA, Dance Arts, the Ruby Slipper Performing Arts Academy and SoundNVision will take the stage with song and dance. At 6 pm, the newly formed Visalia Opera Company presents "Saints and Sinners" at the 210. At 7 pm, the Enchanted Playhouse Theatre Company presents "James & the Giant Peach", featuring local actors of all ages. And at 8 pm, the night ends with a free performance by the Tulare County Symphony performing crowd pleasing selections from their Pops in the Park collection at the beautiful Visalia Fox Theatre.
