Summary/background:

The City of Visalia currently maintains approximately 491 centerline street miles within its jurisdictional limits. While being one of the City's largest assets, the maintenance associated with the pavement in this street network is a significant ongoing cost to the City. Over the past 10 years there have been many advances in pavement condition assessment technology, pavement management software systems, and compatibility with Geographic Information Systems (GIS). The Visalia Public Works Division would like to follow the lead of many other California municipalities and develop a Pavement Management Program (PMP) to direct maintenance activities and extend the life of street pavements while optimizing the use of maintenance tax dollars.

Developing a complete Pavement Management Program will consist of hiring an outside consultant to perform the following tasks:

- Evaluate the existing pavement management and asset management software systems available and determine which system is the most appropriate to meet the City's needs/requirements. The selected software will be as user friendly as possible, highly compatible with the City's GIS Mapping Software, and will be a module of a suite of enterprise asset management tools. This will give the city the flexibility to expand the software system to other asset management activities to more efficiently manage signs, sidewalks, curb ramps, utilities, and other items.
- 2) Perform a City-Wide Pavement Condition Assessment of the entire street network. This typically involves the consultant utilizing a vehicle equipped with laser enhanced road surface testing devices to travel the city roads and collect pavement condition data which will then be processed and loaded into the City's pavement management software. Visual inspection may also be used as part of the pavement condition assessment.
- 3) Using the information above and coordinating with City staff to determine the appropriate maintenance strategies and develop a complete Pavement Management Program.
- 4) Train City Staff to use the software program to perform pavement database updates, create pavement condition maps, run various pavement management funding scenarios, and perform other tasks.

The final result will be a fully functioning pavement management software system and a 5 year Pavement Management Program to direct street maintenance and improvement activities for the most effective use of tax dollars.

As part of a continuously functioning Pavement Management Program it is understood that many Cities are performing pavement data collection and assessment for one quarter to one third of their street network each year to keep the plan up to date. Approximate costs associated with this annual assessment will be determined with the consultant and presented to Council with the completion of the Pavement Management Program.

A good roadway inventory and pavement management program will help the City to get the best cost-to-benefit ratio for the money invested in pavement repairs. Pavement management software is an important tool that assists staff in assessing existing pavement conditions and scheduling work at the appropriate time before the condition of the pavement deteriorates to a level that requires reconstruction. With proper maintenance, many local streets can last 30 years or more, if traffic is light. Arterial and Collector streets, with heavy traffic, can last over 20 years with proper maintenance. Without maintenance the asphalt dries out and cracks develop. These cracks reduce the strength of the road section and allow water to infiltrate under the pavement significantly decreasing the life of the roadway. Without maintenance, streets with heavy traffic will usually last less than ten or fifteen years. Preventive maintenance programs include applying rejuvenating oil, slurry seals, rubberized cape seals, chip seals, crack filling, overlays and other strategies. A proactive maintenance program can double the life of the pavement and result in significant long term savings.

Pavement management and maintenance are eligible uses for Gas Tax funds. There is \$365,000 allocated for a chip seal capital project in the 11/12 Fiscal Year Budget. Staff recommends reducing this amount to \$165,000 and establishing a new capital project for Pavement Management and Inventory for \$200,000. Any funds that are not required will go back into the Gas Tax Fund and be used for pavement maintenance.

Summary/background: In 1995, the City entered into a lease agreement with Golden State YMCA for the use of certain property located at Whitendale Park for the purpose of providing pre-school and child care programs. This lease allowed the YMCA to locate two modular structures on the premises to serve as classrooms for programs. In addition, the YMCA installed a playground and surrounded their program area with fencing.

The YMCA plans to continue to provide full time child care while providing kindergarten readiness and development of social skills in a fun, safe and nurturing environment. Activities at this location have included literature, music, science, art and motor skill development.

Unfortunately, in 2009, the YMCA went several months without receiving reimbursements from the State for their child care programs. This caused the closing of a few of the YMCA's facilities, including the program at Whitendale. Once the State passed a budget and resumed payments to the YMCA, the program could not re-build enrollment at that time, families had simply found other child care options. The YMCA's goal was to re-open the program at Whitendale in 2011 but has yet to reach the number of students to re-open. The facility can accomodate a maximum of 43 participants. The current waiting list has 10 participants with a requirement of 28 participants to be able to financially justify re-opening the facility. Although the facility is not currently operating, the YMCA has continued to pay the City of Visalia the

annual lease payment and will continue to pay that payment even if the facility is not operating. The YMCA continues to accept children on a wait list and hope to have enough students to open soon.

The original agreement with the YMCA was executed in 1995 for a term of four (4) years, or until rescinded. The original agreement called for an annual lease payment of \$336.00 per year with an annual inflator based on the Consumer Price Index (CPI). In addition to the annual lease amount, the YMCA was responsible for all facility and ground maintenance related to their program area. The City was responsible for maintenance and upkeep of the irrigation system in and around the facility.

In 2009, the City Amended the Lease Agreement with the YMCA to include language requiring the YMCA to conduct state mandated Playground Safety Certification Inspections and requiring documentation and retention of records required by the state.

The new agreement replaces the original agreement and reflects a five (5) year term with changes as follows:

- Added Playground Certification Inspection Language
- The annual lease shall be \$500 beginning in 2012 and shall be adjusted annual by the CPI. This is consistent with the current payment amount.
- The YMCA shall reimburse annually to the City the direct cost for irrigation maintenance and repair in an amount not to exceed \$1,000 per year.

The maintenance cost has been included in this agreement to recover City resources expended in and around the YMCA facility related to the irrigation system. After reviewing prior year allocations from the Park Maintenance Division, City staff discovered that the City was expending more in maintenance costs than was received in Lease revenues. The new agreement corrects this.

Department Recommendation:

Staff recommends authorizing the City Manager to execute a Pipeline Crossing Agreement with Union Pacific Railroad to allow the City to install a 42-inch diameter pipeline under Union Pacific's tracks that will supply recycled water (upgraded from secondary to tertiary treatment) from the Water Conservation Plant on the west side of Highway 99 to Valley Oaks Golf Course and Plaza Park.

Summary/background:

The City is working on a project to upgrade the Water Conservation Plant so that all effluent will be treated to extremely clean tertiary levels. The project also includes installation of a pipeline to deliver recycled water wastewater to Plaza Park and

Valley Oak Golf Course for irrigation of landscaped areas. The pipeline will start at the Water Conservation Plant, near Road 68 and Avenue 288, and pass under State Route 99 and the Union Pacific Railroad tracks and then through City-owned farmland, south of the airport. The line then follows Plaza Drive to reach the park and golf course. The Pipeline Crossing Agreement with Union Pacific must be executed to allow the pipeline to be installed under the tracks.

The terms of the Agreement are typical of Railroad Crossing agreements that the City has entered into in the past. The terms have been reviewed by the Public Utilities Commission, City Attorney and City Staff and found to be acceptable. There is not a requirement for the City to make annual payments to the Railroad or maintain insurance except when working within Union Pacific's right-of-way. In addition to train "flagging" fees during the installation of pipe at the railroad crossing, the City will be required to pay \$2,986 to cover Union Pacific's staff time to process the agreement.

This pipeline agreement is necessary for the City to reach its objectives regarding beneficial reuse of tertiary-treated water to be available following the future upgrade of the City's Water Conservation Plant. The upgrade will increase the level of wastewater treatment at the plant to enable treated water to be used for irrigation of landscaped areas through a "purple pipe" system. Staff recommends that Council authorize this agreement to enable the pipeline to be constructed as part of the upcoming Water Conservation Plant upgrade.

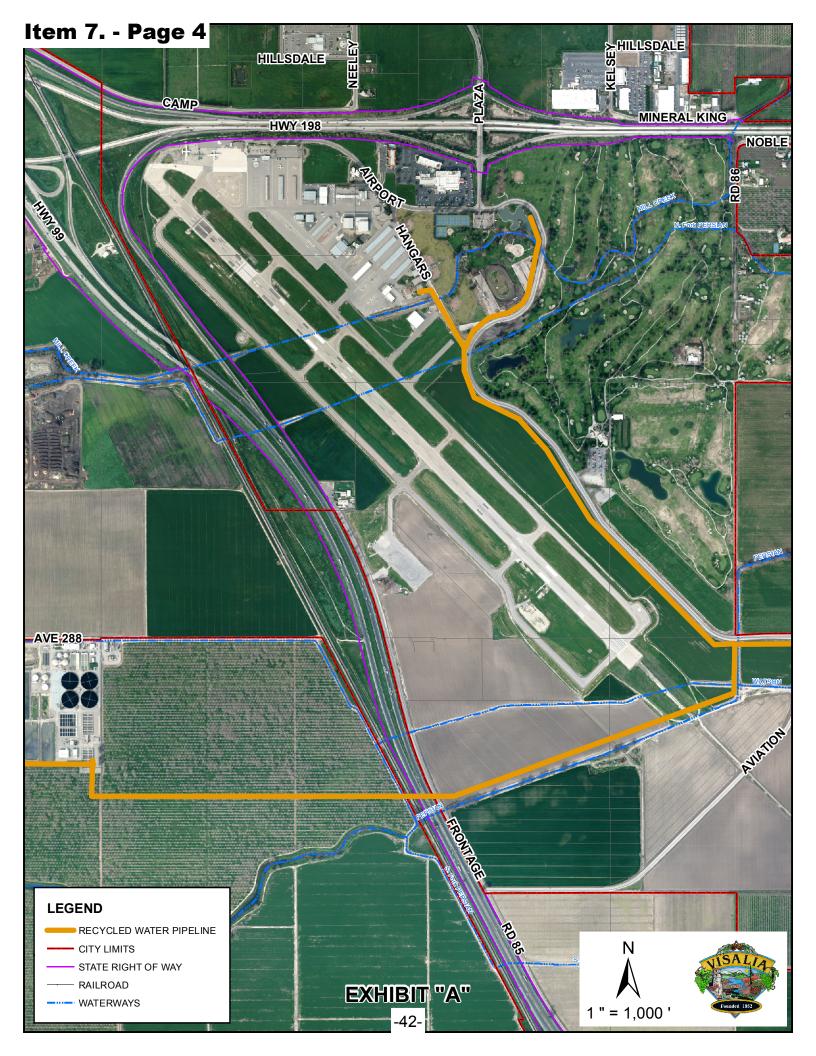

In October 2010, the City issued a Request for Proposals (RFP) seeking fuel suppliers for the airport's retail fuel operation. The City published the RFP and mailed copies to the 4 fuel providers on the West coast. The City received only one response to the Aviation Fuel RFP, due mainly to the fact that the airport has experienced a sharp decline in fuel sales over the past few years. The decline mirrors that of the industry as a whole and is a direct result of the downturn in the economy and corporations and individuals choosing to fly less. However, the industry appears to finally be turning around and fuel sales at the airport are up 20% so far in FY 11/12 over the previous year.

The sole respondent was Air Petro, which had already taken over for Chevron and was already providing the airport with its fuel, in the interim, until a contract could be negotiated with a fuel provider. In addition to the standard provisions to provide fuel, their proposal also provided some extra incentives not included in the previous contract with Chevron, including funding for improvements to the fueling equipment, which will result in lower maintenance costs for the airport. The new contract also provides for reimbursement to the airport for marketing expenses. With the cost of fuel so high everywhere, pilots have begun using the internet to

The co-op marketing money provided in this new contract will allow the airport to market our products and services on several aviation web sites, which up until now we haven't had the funding to do. The hope is that the online marketing will show pilots flying up and down the valley that the Visalia Airport has competitive fuel pricing and the ability to provide fast refueling operations, which could help to increase aircraft operations and ultimately increase fuel sales and revenue for the airport enterprise fund.

As part of the proposal, Air Petro provided the City with a history of fuel pricing for other comparable airport retail vendors. Staff analyzed the proposal and pricing history and had some questions about what appeared to be pricing structure changes. All of the pricing comparisons that were provided were for similar airport operations, which were run by municipalities. After reviewing a 6 month history for those vendors, it became apparent that they were being charged on a different pricing structure than Visalia was. Air Petro worked with the airport to identify the difference, which turned out to be a problem with the formula used to calculate the shipping charges for deliveries to Visalia. The City was overcharged on four (4) deliveries, until the error was discovered. Upon being notified of the discrepancy, Air Petro immediately reduced the shipping charges of subsequent loads to compensate the Airport fund for the error.

The City of Visalia has operated the retail fueling operation, at the airport, since the late 70's when the private operator went out of business. Since that time, the airport has always provided fuel to both based tenants and transient aircraft and the fueling operation has become one of the most significant revenue sources for the airport.

The airport enterprise fund is a \$2 million per year operation and the fueling operation accounts for approximately 50% of the total revenue for the airport operation. Less the cost of goods sold, the fueling operation provided approximately \$220,529 in net resources for the airport in FY 10/11. The revenue generated from the fuel sales is a large part of the money used as the matching funds to accept those FAA grants necessary to ensure the growth and continued safe operation of the airport. The Airport enterprise fund relies heavily on the revenue derived from the fueling operation to keep the fund self-sufficient. Faced with operating without the fueling revenue, the airport would be forced to make up the lost revenue in the form of increased hangar rents, ground lease rates, fuel flowage fees to tenants, landing fees and other airport fees that would only serve to drive users away from the Visalia Airport

Staff requests that Council authorize an additional appropriation of \$27,000 from the Gas Tax Fund (1111). This additional funding will cover costs for funding processing, design of the project, right-of-way and the required match for construction of the project.

Background: This project will greatly enhance the experience of transit users and the downtown business community as well. It will be a corridor that is simultaneously safer (sidewalks and lighting), more attractive (trees, benches, sidewalks, streetlights), and more user-friendly (ADA-compliant sidewalks, shade from the trees, and benches on which to rest). It will promote a cleaner downtown by providing convenient trash receptacles. It also encourages multimodal transportation by making it pleasant to walk to and from the new Transit Center.

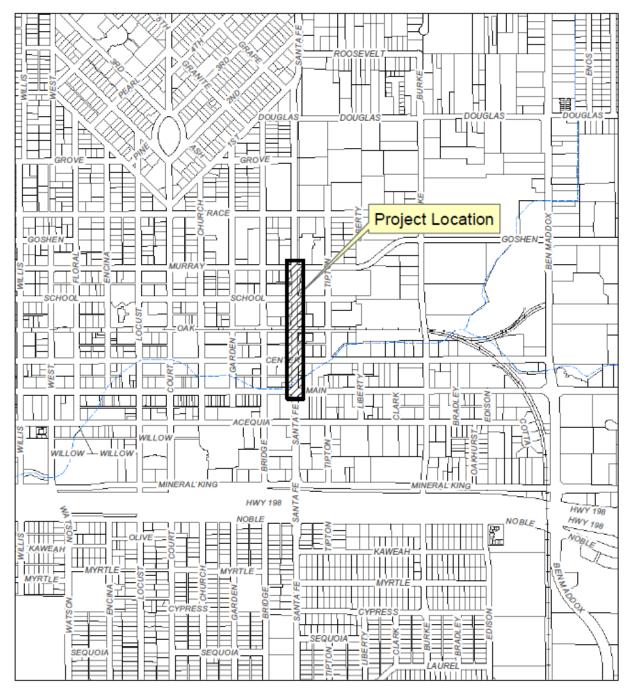

While this project is eligible for 100% funding with CMAQ funds of \$1,350,000, the total cost exceeds the federal amount available; therefore, approximately \$88,000 will be required from the Local Transportation Fund (LTF) which is derived from state sales tax revenues and can only be used for transportation purposes. Current FTA guidelines require City transit staff to keep federally funded buses for a minimum of 12 years.

Discussion:

These expansion buses will provide needed capacity generated by recent ridership increases of 10-20%. This purchase is another major step toward making the City bus fleet 100%

alternative fuel. With this purchase, the City will have an alternative fuel fleet of twenty-seven (27) fixed route buses, twelve (12) Dial-A-Ride buses and three (3) CNG trolleys or a total of 42 out of 48 transit vehicles. This is consistent with current City policy to utilize alternative fuel wherever possible. Fueling the buses is performed via the CNG fueling facility, located on Cain Street between the Corporation Yard, and the bus operations facility, at a savings of over 30% compared with the cost of diesel or gasoline fuel. The Governor's Office of Traffic Safety is sponsoring the AVOID grant, which provides participating agencies the overtime funds, equipment, and resources necessary to operate complete DUI enforcement programs. With various strategies, DUI enforcement is aggressively targeted through checkpoints, saturation details, warrant details, court stings, and task force operations. The AVOID campaign is dedicated to reducing the number of alcohol related collisions, increase the number of DUI related arrests, and raise general public awareness regarding the problems associated with drinking and driving.

The AVOID grant is a regional DUI effort in Tulare and Kings County. Based upon its size and prior history with grants, the Visalia Police

Department is serving, at the request of OTS, as the host agency for this campaign. Various formulas are used to determine the percentage of service provided to the County and then this percentage is applied to the entire VTT budget to determine the County's share. The formulas were developed the first year of the annual agreement in 1981 and updated each year since. The formulas are based on a percentage of the ridership who reside in the County (5% for Fixed Route & 8% for Dial-A-Ride), a multiplier factor adjusting for the distance to get to and from the County (1.3), and the number of service hours expended within the County areas (8%). The funds are taken from the County's share of the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Section 5307, County Local Transportation Fund and farebox revenues.

schedule, the City of Visalia is using Local Transportation Funds (LTF) that will be reimbursed once Prop 1B funds are available. The City of Visalia programmed its 2009/10 (\$706,231) and 2010/11 (2,752,200) Prop 1B Public Transportation Modernization, Improvement and Service Enhancement Account (PTMISEA) allocations for funding of the Transit Operations & Maintenance Facility. A delay in the project's construction would not allow it to be completed as planned.

Assembly Bill 672, signed by the Governor on October 11, 2009, authorizes the California Transportation Commission (CTC) to approve a Letter of No Prejudice, which allows local agencies to proceed with their eligible projects using other sources of revenue prior to an allocation of funds with the expectation, but no guarantee, the CTC will approve a Prop 1B PTMISEA fund allocation when bond funds become available. In the event that the allocation of Prop 1B PTMISEA funds for this project are not made available in time for project construction completion, having a LONP would give the City of Visalia the flexibility to use LTF

and potentially be reimbursed at a later date. The funds approved by voters through Prop 1B are guaranteed; however, delayed due to the State's difficulty in selling the required bonds. In an effort to address this issue, and allow agencies to benefit from the competitive construction market, the Legislature passed a law allowing agencies to use local funds up front and be reimbursed later when bond funds are available. This Letter of No Prejudice is required and is specific to the Bus Operations and Maintenance Facility Expansion project in the amount of \$3,458,431. Staff has managed these funds in a way that the Prop 1B and LTF funds are both available for this project and can be used for future projects once all the Prop 1B funds have been received. It is expected that this will occur anytime within the next 1-3 years.

Background:

The Public Transportation Modernization, Improvement, and Service Enhancement Account Program (PTMISEA) was created by Proposition 1B, the Highway Safety, Traffic Reduction, Air Quality, and Port Security Bond Act of 2006. Of the \$19.925 billion available to Transportation, \$3.6 billion dollars was allocated to PTMISEA to be available to transit operators over a ten-year period. PTMISEA funds may be used for transit rehabilitation, safety or modernization improvements, capital service enhancements or expansions, new capital projects, bus rapid transit improvements, or rolling stock (buses and rail cars) procurement, rehabilitation or replacement. Funds in this account are appropriated annually by the Legislature to the State Controllers Office (SCO) for allocation in accordance with Public Utilities Code formula distributions. TCAG receives the regional apportionment of these funds, which are distributed to agencies based upon population. Only agencies that are transit operators are eligible for an allocation of funds under State Transit Assistance per Public Utilities Code (PUC), Section 99314. TCAG serves as the project sponsor for any agencies that cannot directly receive funds under Section 99314, but are eligible for an allocation of funds under the State Transit Assistance per PUC, Section 99313.

WHEREAS, the Highway Safety, Traffic Reduction, Air Quality, and Port Security bond Act of 2006, approved by the voters as Proposition 1B on November 7, 2006, authorized the issuance of \$19.925 billion in State general obligation bonds for specific transportation programs intended to relieve congestion, facilitate goods movement, improve air quality, and enhance the safety of the states transportation system, and

WHEREAS, the State's current economic condition has placed these programs at risk due to the difficulty in selling bonds and the lack of bond funds; and

WHEREAS, the authority and scope for a Letter of No Prejudice come from Government Code Section 8879.501, added by Chapter 463 (Assembly Bill 672) of the Statutes of 2009. The Bill was signed by the Governor on October 11, 2009, and establishes guidelines for approval of Letters of No Prejudice (LONP) for projects or project components approved for funding from the Public Transportation Modernization, Improvement and Service Enhancement Account (PTMISEA); and

WHEREAS, a project sponsor under PTMISEA may apply to Caltrans for a LONP for an approved PTMISEA project.

WHEREAS, the LONP allows the City of Visalia to expend its own Local Transportation Fund (LTF) and incur reimbursable expense for any component of a program project prior to actual allocation of Proposition 1B funds; and

WHEREAS, the Local Transportation Fund advance will be repaid throughout the upcoming fiscal years with Prop 1B PTMISEA funds; and

WHEREAS, it is understood by the City of Visalia that proceeding is done so at City of Visalia's own risk, as project expense reimbursement under the LONP depends on the availability of Proposition 1B bond funds.

Summary: The Plaza Drive Interchange Modification and Widening Project will widen Plaza Drive from Airport Drive to Goshen Avenue. Modifications to the interchange at State Route 198 include bridge and ramp widening. Auxiliary lanes will be added to State Route 198 connecting the ramps at Plaza Drive to the ramps at State Route 99.

On November 1st, 2011 the City received proposals from four firms to provide Construction Management (CM) and Resident Engineer (RE) services for the Plaza Drive Interchange Modification and Widening Project. Mendoza & Associates was chosen as the most qualified firm and will perform the services on a time and material basis with a not to exceed limit of \$1,861,871.25.

Background: The City of Visalia entered into a cooperative agreement with the State Department of Transportation (Caltrans) for the construction of the Plaza Drive Interchange Modification and Widening Project. The City agreed to complete the interchange modifications, bridge widening, and auxiliary lanes according to Caltrans specifications and with Caltrans oversight. The cooperative agreement requires the City to provide a field site representative, who is a California licensed Civil Engineer, to perform the functions of the Resident Engineer. The cooperative agreement directs the City to provide qualified support staff to assist the Resident Engineer in, but not limited to, structural representative, construction surveys, soils and foundation tests, measurement and computation of quantities, testing of construction materials, checking shop drawings, preparation of estimates and reports, preparation of "AsBuilt" drawings, and other inspection and staff services necessary to assure the construction is being performed in accordance with the plans and specifications.

Since 2005 the City has constructed several large projects including the Acequia Parking Structure, the Sports Park, the Transit Maintenance Facility, the Santa Fe Overcrossing, and the Ben Maddox Bridge Widening. Construction management firms were hired by the city to review plans and specifications, provide constructability reviews, conduct the bid process, and provide contract administration, coordination, planning, and contractor oversight. Construction managers also reviewed, tracked, and processed construction schedules, requests for information, submittals, potential change orders, and potential claims. The project management firms were able to commit their staff as needed to provide these specialized services and to meet the requirements of the various funding sources.

This project has many special needs and requirements. The CM/RE or his designate will be present at all times during construction. Challenges include demolition and disposal of portions of the existing bridge, state highway closures, California Highway Patrol coordination, and construction of the temporary support for the bridge widening. Throughout the project the construction manager will coordinate highway lane closures and full highway closures with detours, and multiple stages of traffic control. Night work will be required. Construction of the concrete drilled pile footings, erection of the bridge false work, and construction of the bridge deck are all strictly regulated by Caltrans. Caltrans has detailed requirements for inspection, testing, traffic control, and record keeping. Caltrans construction projects often combine the responsibilities of the Resident Engineer and Construction Manager, with one firm hired to provide both services. By combining the Resident Engineer and Construction Manager in one firm, the coordination and record keeping are less redundant and more uniform and consistent. Because of the need for qualified personnel and the specialized structural requirements of State Highway bridge construction, city staff believes that the combined Construction Management and Resident Engineer Firm is the best method of managing the construction of the Plaza Drive Interchange Modification and Widening Project

On October 4, 2011 the City Purchasing Department issued a Request for Proposals (RFP) for the Construction Management (CM) & Resident Engineer (RE) Services for the Plaza Drive Interchange Modification and Widening Project. Four firms submitted proposals. The proposals were rated by a committee of City and Caltrans staff. Mendoza & Associates was chosen for their qualifications, the similar projects they have managed, and their familiarity with Caltrans District 6 personnel and procedures.

The four firms responding to the RFP were:

Caltrop Harris & Associates Mendoza & Associates Omni Means

Mendoza & Associates successfully managed two Highway 198 overcrossing projects for the City of Visalia, the Santa Fe Overcrossing and the Ben Maddox Widening. The projects were completed on time with minimal change orders. The construction contracts were \$5.5 million for the Santa Fe Overcrossing and \$4.8 million for the Ben Maddox project. Both projects included bridge structures with Caltrans oversight.

Fees for the Construction Management and Resident Engineer Services for the Santa Fe Overcrossing and the Ben Maddox Widening Projects were between thirteen percent (13%) and eighteen percent (18%) of the construction contract amounts.

The fee for the Plaza Drive Interchange Modifications and Widening Project are twelve percent (12%) of the construction contract amount. A pre-award audit of Mendoza & Associates' accounting system and procedures is required by the project's funding sources due to the dollar amount of the contract.

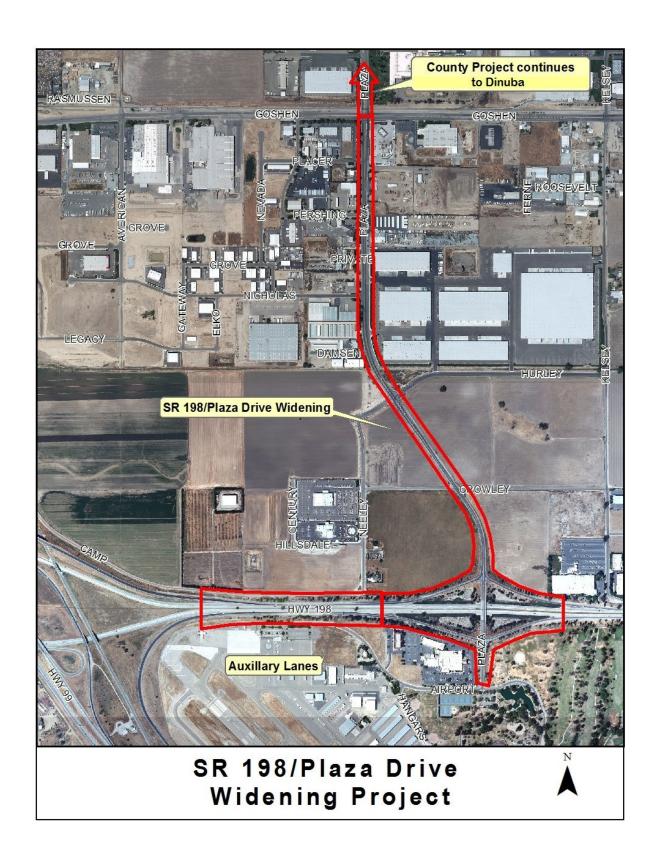

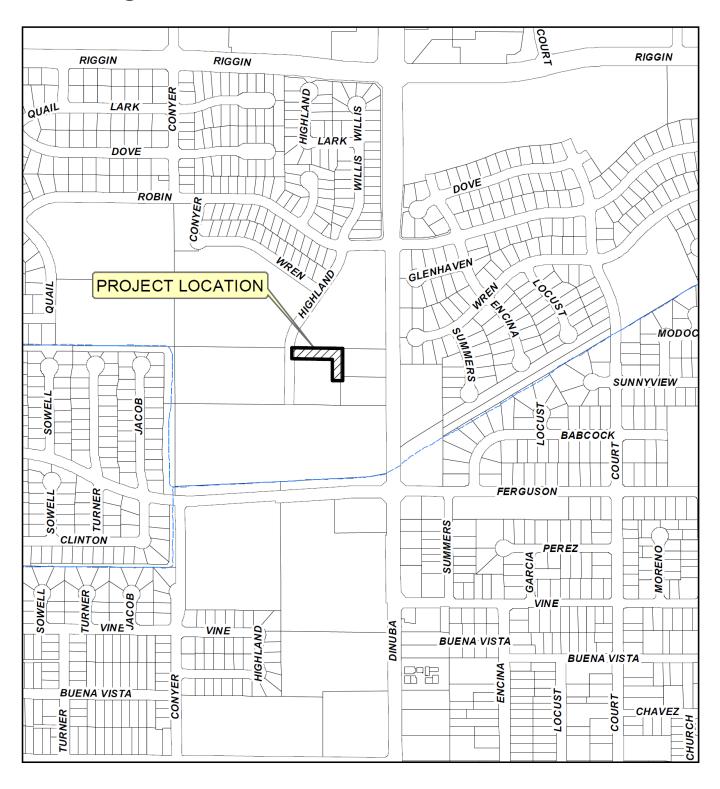

- The City hereby states its intention and reasonably expects to reimburse Project costs incurred prior to the incurrence of the Obligations with proceeds of the Obligations.
- 2. The reasonably expected maximum principal amount of the Obligations is \$7,975,000.
- 3. This resolution is being adopted on or prior to the date (the "Expenditures Date or Dates") that the City will expend monies for the portion of the Project costs to be reimbursed from the proceeds of the Obligations.
- 4. The expected date of incurrence of the Obligations will be within one year of the Expenditures Date or Dates to the date the Project is placed in service, whichever occurs last.
- 5. Proceeds of the Obligations to be used to reimburse for Project costs are not expected to be used directly or indirectly to pay debt service with respect to any obligation (other than to pay current debt service coming due within the next succeeding one year period on any tax-exempt obligation of the City (other than the Obligation)) or to be held as a reasonably required reserve or replacement fund with respect to an obligation of the City or any entity related in any manner to the City, or to reimburse any expenditure that was originally paid with the proceeds of any obligation, or to place funds that are or will be used in such manner.

- 6. The resolution is consistent with the budgetary and financial circumstances of the City, as of the date hereof. No monies from sources other than the Obligation are, or are reasonably expected to be reserved, allocated on a long-term basis, or otherwise set aside by the City (or any related party) pursuant to its budget or financial statement.
- 7. The resolution is adopted as official action of the Issuer in order to comply with Treasury Regulation 1.103-18 and any other regulations of the Internal Revenue Service relating to the qualifications for reimbursement of City expenditures incurred prior to the date of incurrence of the Obligations, is part of the City's office proceedings, and will be available for inspection by the general public at the main administrative office of the City.

All the recitals in this Resolution are true and correct and the City Council of the City of Visalia so finds, determines and represents.
