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Executive Summary

1. Introduction

The City of Visalia (City) is an entitlement jurisdiction that receives federal funds from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) under the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) and HOME Investment Partnerships (HOME) Programs, which are designed to assist low and moderate income (LMI) households, investing in Visalia's local communities/neighborhoods.

As an entitlement jurisdiction, HUD requires that the City prepare a Consolidated Plan every five years to foster a community-wide dialogue regarding the market environment and affordable housing and community development needs of the City. The Strategic Plan is a specific course of action, which builds on local assets and coordinates a response to the needs of the community. The Strategic Plan set the program goals, specific objectives, annual goals and benchmarks for measuring progress. The five-year strategy covers the period from July 1, 2015 through June 30, 2019.

As part of the Conplan, and Strategic Plan, the City is also required to prepare an Annual Action Plan to report on the distribution of federal funding for the program year, which starts annually July 1st through June 30th of the following year. The Annual Plan explains how the City of Visalia intends to use its CDBG and HOME allocations, and how the funded programs, projects and activities will address the priorities identified in the Consolidated Plan, more specifically the Strategic Plan. The Annual Plan also identifies the federal and non-federal resources that will be used meet the goals of the approved Consolidated Plan.

HUD announced Appropriations on May 1, 2018, which required only a minor amendment to finalize the allocations toward activities. See "2018 Action Plan Minor Amend Final Allocations" herein as an attachment "J".

This is the fourth year Action Plan, which reflects the goals and objectives for the period starting July 1, 2018, through June 30, 2019. CDBG shall be directed toward public services, improvements, including ADA, parks, Code Enforcement and Senior Mobile home program. CDBG Program Income shall be directed toward ADA projects. HOME funds including Program Income up to \$150k, shall be directed toward Self Help- CHDO acq/rehab, infill, construction of single and multi-family housing, any additional HOME PI, the City Manager has the authority, if deemed a minor amendment, to direct it toward either the SHE- CHDO or TBRA program.

The CDBG Target Map is for 2015, 2016, 2017 and 2018, program years, and shall be updated, if required, on an annual basis. Attached is confirmation of the eligible census tracts, which there are not additions or reductions of eligible tracts for this program year. Any notation to 2013 CDBG Target Area, based on the initial submission with the 2015 ConPlan, shall now reflect the

updated map, and applies to the 2015, 2016, 2017, and 2018. See Appendices No. 1 Minority Concentration and CDBG Target Area Maps further discussed under AP-50 Geographic Distribution.

<u>CDBG 2017 Action Plan Amendment:</u> A 2017 Action Plan Amendment is included, to redirect CDBG funds remaining from Section 108 loan payment, approximately \$88k directing the funds to ADA projects.

<u>Citizens Participation Plan Amendment:</u> The Citizens Participation Plan (CPP) is updated (minor amendment) which reflect the new location of the City Manager's office (220 N Santa Fe) and the Finance Department- Housing, managing these funds, located at (707 West Acequia), community meeting locations, and additional definitions have been added and the Council district information.

2. Summarize the objectives and outcomes identified in the Plan

The four ConPlan goals below represent high priority needs for the City of Visalia (City) and serve as the basis for the strategic actions the City will continue to take toward meeting these needs. Based on the Needs Assessment, Market Analysis, and community outreach conducted in mid-2015, in preparation of the current five-year ConPlan cycle, the 2015-2019 ConPlan efforts resulted in the following high priority needs:

- 1. Creation and preservation of decent affordable housing
- 2. Provide a suitable living environment
- 3. Promote economic opportunity
- 4. Provide program administration, planning, and management

In FY 2018, Visalia will fund activities in furtherance of the objectives and priorities identified in the Strategic Plan for the five years from 2015 to 2019, improving availability, accessibility, affordability and sustainability through programs and activities which benefit the community, focusing on low and moderate income households and areas. The activities for the 2018 FY will support at least one objective and one outcome, and includes 1) CDBG Amendment directing remaining funds from West Acequia Section 108 loan to ADA projects; and 2) Proposed 2018 CDBG and HOME Funding as identified within the 2015-2019 ConPlan priority needs. The 2018 Action Plan activities are listed in section AP-35, Projects, more specifically, AP-38 Project Summary. Attached herein is Table 1: Action Plan HOME funds, including prior balance committed.

3. Evaluation of past performance

This is an evaluation of past performance that helped lead the grantee to choose its goals or projects.

HUD approved 2016 CAPER reflecting progress of projects from 7-1-16 thru 6-30-17. Visalia's performance evaluation showed steady progress in meeting the goals and objectives (housing, code enforcement, public facility/infrastructure improvements, and public services). The City will continue with successful programs, meeting high priority needs, addressing affordable housing, a suitable living environment and economic development objectives. Performance accomplishments include Affordable Housing, Suitable Living Environment, Economic Development and Public Services, as included herein below in more detail.

<u>Affordable Housing:</u> The City provided HOME CHDO funds to SHE who acquired, rehabbed and is currently reselling one (1) single family home. SHE continues to analyze properties for acquisition to develop or rehabilitate and rent to income qualifying households.

The HOME Tenant Based Rental Assistance (TBRA) program with Family Services of Tulare County approved in November of 2016 had a challenging start due to unavailable units meeting HUD HOME rents. Staff conducted a rent analysis that met HUD's requirements which increased the rent standards for the program. We currently have 5 participants. The purpose is to provide secure, safe, decent and sanitary rental housing assistance to extremely low and very low-income persons or households that are homeless who meet the tenant selection criteria. TBRA focuses on special purposes or specific housing needs of Visalia's homeless population as indicated within the Con Plan. Program Income above \$150k may be directed toward the TBRA program or SHE CHDO projects by City Manager authorization, therefore, Pl has been referenced under the TBRA Program.

The CDBG Mobile Home Repair Program contracted with SHE, was approved November of 2016. A total of \$135,000 was allocated in CDBG funding. Currently four (4) eligible mobile home owners are addressing health, safety and rehabilitation needs. Additional applications (mobile home owners) are underway.

<u>Suitable Living Environment:</u> Staff will continue to use CDBG funding to improve public, park and accessibility that serve primarily low and moderate income residents and disabled

population. For 2018 public improvements include continued efforts toward ADA sidewalks design for south side of Houston Avenue between Santa Fe and Dinuba Boulevard. Additional funding is needed to fulfill the ADA construction scope of work for areas including Whitman village area, Emergency Aid area and 26- other curb cuts areas in CDBG targeted areas, as well as the southern side in CDBG targeted areas which provide accessibility to the neighborhoods. The Disability Advocacy Committee and members of the community have identified areas which need sidewalk, with ADA access. Engineering continues to conduct analysis within the CDBG targeted areas and moving forward with improvements thereafter. Council has also indicated that areas surrounding schools, public community buildings which provide neighborhood activities be considered.

<u>Economic Development:</u> This is the last year for the Section 108 loan repayment. The City is committed to providing adequate parking in the downtown area to further promote jobs.

<u>Public Services:</u> Staff increased efforts in CDBG funding toward public services. Fair Housing Council of Central California continues to provide fair housing education. The Annual Fair Housing workshop was held April 2017. Other public services include Continuum of Care and Family Services-Voucher Program, Case Management Programs which address the needs of our homeless population, through street outreach and case management services. This supports our high priority needs identified in the ConPlan/Strategic Plan during the 2015-2019 Plan.

Neighborhood preservation efforts continue through Code Enforcement.

4. Summary of Citizen Participation Process and consultation process

Summary from citizen participation section of plan.

Overview of 5-Year ConPlan participation:

In agreement with 24 CFR 91.115, the City of Visalia adopted a Citizens Participation Plan (CPP), as part of the five-year ConPlan process in FY 2015, describes the citizens participation requirements. The CPP is on file at the City of Visalia, Community Development Department, and on the City of Visalia's website, at: http://www.visalia.city/depts/community_development/housing_n_cdbg_services/publication_s_n_reports/consolidated_plans.asp

The Citizens Participation Plan (CPP) is updated (minor amendment) which reflect the new location of the City Manager's office (220 N Santa Fe) and the Finance Department- Housing, managing these funds, located at (707 West Acequia) and community meeting locations. Additional definitions have been added and the Council district information.

To maximize participation in the preparation of the 2015-2019 ConPlan, the City designed and administered a Community Needs Survey and held Community Forums. The Survey was distributed to residents, workers, service providers, and businesses of the City. The Plan describes the potential outreach, entities, organizations, or persons that were informed of the

ConPlan. Hardcopy surveys were distributed to public housing sites, school districts, health care providers, libraries, and community centers. The survey was also distributed via email and social media. The City sent emails to 350 different individuals or organizations notifying them of the Survey and Community and Stakeholder Forums. It was estimated that 4,559 persons on Facebook and 819 persons on Twitter were reached with information regarding the ConPlan with 214 survey responses were submitted to the City. The City also held three Community Forums, which were attended by a total of 22 individuals, and presented the Consolidated Plan to multiple organizations and advisory boards.

2018 Action Plan & 2017 Amendment Community and Council Feedback: (IDIS Attachment AP-05 No. 4 (continued - Summary of CPP consultation))

As part of the consultation process, Staff met with various committees and specifically reviewed the 5 Yr. Plan identified needs, serving as the comprehensive strategy, describing the City's priorities and multi-year goals for use of CDBG and HOME funds from July 1, 2015 through June 30, 2019. Staff then reviewed the current 2017 Action Plan activities, in preparation of the Draft 2018 Action Plan, proposed activities and 2017 amendment. Additionally, the City reached out once again via-email to the ConPlan list of agencies, presenting this same information, which included a Feedback response form, asking 1) what is their feedback on the proposed goals and activities for the 4th year (Action Plan), and 2) what other goals (high priority activities) are needed for low income housing, jobs and/or low income areas., also requesting narrative feedback and represented agency identification.

Community and City Council Meetings:

Staff provided opportunities to the community and committees to provide feedback by presenting an overview of the 5-yr Plan, high priorities, funding allocations, and proposed activities. Four (4) community meetings including a City council work session meeting were held as follows:

- Citizens Advisory Committee meeting on February 07, 2018
- North Visalia Neighborhood Advisory Committee meeting on February 08, 2018
- Disability Advocacy Committee on February 12, 2018
- City Council Work Session on February 20, 2018

The members of these groups, committees and city departments, participated in the consultation /feedback process on community development, homeless and housing needs. The committees and task groups referenced above, in addition to the City Council included representation from regional organizations, Faith based organizations, Continuum of Care Staff members, County, Workforce Investment Board, Hospital, Health and Human services, including mental health services; housing, education, domestic violence, services and non-profit providers, businesses and business owners, City of Visalia, City Council, Housing and Police Department and community at large.

Citizens Participation During 30-day Comment Period for the 2018 PY Action Plan & 2017 Amendment, and CPP Minor Amendment:

On March 16, 2018, the public notice was published in the Visalia Times Delta. The notice included a summary of the proposed activities, amendment, and Citizens Participation Plan minor Amendment. It also included the committee's and Council meeting dates, time and locations. The notice included the public comment period from March 16, 2018 through April 16, 2018. During this time, three community meetings were scheduled to attend and comment on the Plan & Amendments.

- Citizens Advisory Committee meeting on April 04, 2018
- Disability Advocacy Committee on April 09, 2018
- North Visalia Neighborhood Advisory Committee meeting on April 12, 2018

The notice also included the City Council public hearing meeting scheduled April 16, 2018, seeking comments from the community

To seek additional opportunities for comments and participation in the meetings, the notice was posted on the Continuum of Care's website, as well as emailed to list serves of the CoC's, members. The notice was also sent to Hispanic Chamber of Commerce, Turning Point, Self Help Enterprise, Community Service Employment Training, Tulare Kings Counties Habitat for Humanity, Family Health Care Network, Tulare Health and Human Services Agency, Tulare County Housing Authority, Visalia Rescue Mission, Tulare County Work Force Investment Board, and Tulare County Public Library and Post Office for posting. The notice also included opportunities to provide comments in writing. The 2018 AAP and 2017 Amendment and Citizens Participation Plan Amendment was placed on the City of Visalia's website at: http://www.visalia.city/depts/finance/housing n cdbg services/publications n reports/action_plans.asp

The City continues to work collaboratively with public officials, City departments, community residents, stakeholders, and beneficiaries of entitlement funds to address the priorities and strategies included in the ConPlan. The City facilitated a community outreach and engagement effort to further strengthen the dialogue between public and assisted housing providers and private and governmental health, mental health and service agencies that receive federal funding. The City held three community forums to prompt a discussion on the City's top community needs and approaches to address them during the development and adoption of the 2015 ConPlan. These efforts were continued with the preparation of the 2018 Action Plan CPP Amendment and 2017 CDBG Amendment, as referenced below.

For the 2018 Action Plan & Amendment, staff continued efforts by attending three community group meetings and a City Council Work session meeting. Staff specifically reviewed the 5 Year Plan identified needs, serving as a comprehensive strategy, describing the City's priorities and multi-year goals with CDBG and HOME funds from 2015 to 2019. Staff then reviewed the current 2017 Action Plan activities and balances, in preparation of the 2018 Action Plan, and amendment and requested feedback to confirm proposed activities continue meeting the identified goals, and feedback on any additional goals that should be considered.

Specifically related to public and assisted housing providers, private and governmental health, mental health and service agencies, were among the members of the following committee meetings which were held as follows:

- Citizens Advisory Committee meeting on February 07, 2018
- North Visalia Neighborhood Advisory Committee meeting on February 08, 2018
- Disability Advocacy Committee on February 12, 2018
- City Council Work Session on February 20, 2018

Through email notifications, survey's and noticing on the City and the Continuum of Care websites. Representation included businesses, faith based organizations, concerned citizens, community and regional organizations, housing providers, children, elderly persons, persons with disabilities, HIV, homeless, health, education, employment and victims of domestic violence service providers; health and child welfare agencies, publicly funded institutions, other government agencies, business and civic leaders, legal and other advisory committees.

A "Homeless Solution Group", related to homeless needs was formed in September of 2016, and has met quarterly to identify the needs of our homeless population, with representatives from Kaweah Delta Hospital, Family Health Care Network, Community Services Employment Training, Self Help Enterprises, Visalia Rescue Mission, Tulare County Health and Human Services, Family Services of Tulare County, Tulare County Housing Authority, Continuum of Care Alliance, City of Visalia City Manager, Assistant City Manager, Assistant Deputy City Manager, Police Chief and North and South Officers, Code Enforcement, Community Development, and Finance including Housing Staff.

Among responses through list serve distribution members provided additional feedback as participants in the consultation /feedback process on community development, homeless and housing needs. Results of the feedback are reflected in the community input-outreach table.

The City of Visalia is closely involved with the Kings/Tulare Homeless Alliance (Alliance), which serves as the local Continuum of Care. When possible, the City's programs are designed to serve homeless persons and are coordinated with the Alliance.

There are several ongoing efforts that the City and Alliance are involved in as collaborative partners. These collaborations include:

- Monthly Alliance Membership Meetings
- Visalia Homeless Solutions Group
- Tulare County Task Force on Homelessness
- Visalia HOPE Team Top Ten Meeting

Newly established projects, created by the City, include:

- HOME Tenant Based Rental Assistance (TBRA) Program
- CDBG Case Management/Street Outreach
- ECO jobs Program
- Rehab of properties through Non-Profit Developer

All of these projects were designed and implemented through a collaborative effort between the Alliance, its partner agencies and the City of Visalia.

The City also implemented two Case Management/Street Outreach Programs (Housing Successor funded) designed to serve people experiencing homelessness. These program designs were also a collaborative effort between the Alliance, its partner agencies and the City

of Visalia. Family Services of Tulare County and Turning Point as the Administrators of the programs.

The City did not intentionally exclude any groups from the consultation process, instead encouraged more feedback on the preparation of this Action Plan (AP), utilizing the City's contact list of agencies created during the 5 Year ConPlan. Many agencies

were represented at the various meetings. However, via-email, the City reached out and provided the recipients with information that included the ConPlan and AP process, High Priority Needs from the 5-Yr ConPlan, the 2017 AP, proposed Amendment, and 2018 AP activities, based on existing commitments and ongoing projects. The power point included a Feedback response form, asking 1) what is their feedback on the proposed goals and activities for the 4th year (AP), and 2) what other goals (high priority activities) are needed for low income housing, jobs and/or areas. The City of Visalia encourages residents, public service organizations, and other interested parties to participate in the development of the Five Year ConPlan and Annual Action Plan by attending public meetings and public hearings held at various stages of the plan development.

Four community meetings including one (1) City Council work session meeting was held to obtain feedback in the development of the Draft Action Plan and Amendment; three additional community meetings during the 30-day public comment period were held for review of the Draft Plan. Thereafter, also through public noticing and hearings was the City Council public hearing meeting.

The four (4) community meetings and one (1) City council work session meeting were:

- Citizens Advisory Committee meeting on February 07, 2018
- North Visalia Neighborhood Advisory Committee meeting on February 08, 2018
- Disability Advocacy Committee on February 12, 2018
- City Council Work Session on February 20, 2018

Three (3) additional community meetings and the City Council public hearing meeting held as follows:

- Citizens Advisory Committee meeting on April 04, 2018
- Disability Advocacy Committee on April 09, 2018
- North Visalia Neighborhood Advisory Committee meeting on April 12, 2018
- City Council Public Hearing meeting on April 16, 2018

The public notice included a summary of the proposed activities, CDBG amendment, and minor CPP amendment, and the committee's and Council meeting dates, time and locations. Outreach: It is estimated that there was a potential reach of 241 entities, organizations, or persons who were sent an email to participate in feedback. The City's Facebook, twitter, e-newsletter distribution reached or hits were approximately 36,890. The Continuum of Care list serve reached approximately318 people. Various committee members attended meetings in which the plan was presented for feedback. Staff provided an overview of the 5 year Consolidated Plan, high priorities, review of current year Action Plan, and proposed activities for 2018's Action Plan and 2017 Amendment, and Citizens Participation Plan Minor Amendment.

Expected Resources

AP-15 Expected Resources – 91.220(c) (1, 2)

Introduction

HOME funds would generally be used for multifamily new construction, scattered site acquisition/rehab of existing rental and ownership properties through the City's certified Community Housing Development Organization (CHDO), down payment assistance and tenant-based rental assistance.

The CDBG program planned priorities identified for the same term is public and park improvements, ADA walkways, public services, such as fair housing, voucher program, case management and street outreach, code enforcement, and owner occupied mobile home rehabilitation.

In FY 2018, Visalia will fund activities in furtherance of the objectives and priorities identified in the Strategic Plan with the outcome of improving availability, accessibility, affordability and sustainability through activities which benefit the community. The activities will support at least one objective and one outcome.

For Fiscal Year (FY) 2018-2019, the City anticipates receiving an estimated total of \$1,188,919, in CDBG grant funds, based upon previous year award to allocate towards activities. HUD announced on May 1, 2018, Appropriations, therefore, a Minor Amendment was prepared and approved with the 2018 Final CDBG allocation of \$1,309,353. The anticipated estimated CDBG program income to be received is \$25,000. There is approximately \$15,767.00 in 2017 PI referenced to date as of (4-13-18). The CDBG carryover balance, including program income approved through the previous year action plan and/or amendments, allocated toward existing projects is: \$1,191,960. Any increase or decrease in the actual 2018 CDBG allocations and PI were noted to be directed toward the CDBG ADA projects.

The City also anticipates receiving an estimated total of \$371,694 in HOME grant funds eligible to allocate toward activities and estimates that it will receive \$180,000 in program income. HUD announced on May 1, 2018, Appropriations, therefore a Minor Amendment was prepared and approved with the 2018 Final HOME allocation of \$546,879. There is currently approximately \$214,401 in HOME PI as of 4-10-18. The HOME carryover balance, including program income approved through the previous year action plan and/or amendments, allocated toward existing projects (SHE-CHDO Acq/Rehab of single and multi-family projects, Admin & TBRA), is: \$1,578,666, as of 4-13-18. Any increase or decrease in the actual 2018 HOME allocation and PI were noted to

be directed toward the HOME CHDO SHE Acq/Rehab SF/MF projects. Program Income above \$150,000, the City Manager has the authority to direct toward TBRA or SHE- CHDO

In the event final CDBG and HOME program income is higher or lower than expected herein, the City of Visalia may add, subtract or transfer amounts among identified projects, as noted without publishing a substantial amendment, if the amount is below 75 % change, as per the approved Citizens Participation Plan. Any difference in CDBG funding will be reflected in public infrastructure/ADA project line item; any difference in HOME funding will be reflected in SHE CHDO Acq/Rehab/new construction/reconstruction SF or MF project activities.

Currently, the City is not eligible to receive direct funding under the Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) or Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA) – also programs covered under the Consolidated Plan Regulations.

Explain how federal funds will leverage those additional resources (private, state and local funds), including a description of how matching requirements will be satisfied

The City continues to prioritize the needs of the community. This year, \$25,575 in CDBG funding will be utilized as matching and institutional delivery funds in partnership with Family Services toward voucher program. These funds will help up to 13 homeless families in the City.

Code Enforcement staff anticipates working with non-profit agencies in outreach to the homeless in our community and addressing code violations such as substandard housing. The City also contributes CDBG funds toward the Alliance and promotes increased collaboration among housing, service and faith based organizations.

Visalia's matching requirements will be satisfied again this year with the use of prior year rollover of Redevelopment Low Mod funding, now known as Housing Asset Fund. Additionally, as HOME projects are completed, the specific projects, and match, will be referenced on the HOME Match Report within the CAPER. As reflected in the HOME Match report submitted with last years (2016) CAPER, the City has substantial excess match carried over to the next fiscal year (\$5,422,138.14).

The City continues to partner with its local non-profit developers for affordable housing activities, which may provide sweat equity and non-federal sources.

Below is a list of potential financial resources considered a part of the City's overall financial plan to address priority needs and specific objectives identified in the Consolidated Plan. The number and availability of these programs to assist cities is limited, and funding for new projects is unpredictable. The following programs are local, state and federal programs. None of these are managed locally by the City through funds accessed directly from HUD.

- **HACT:** HACT is a public housing authority with jurisdiction within the City of Visalia and the County of Tulare. It administers federal and state funds for its public housing projects and government-assisted housing units such as the Section 8 Rent Subsidy.
- Low-Income Housing Tax Credit Program (LIHTC): The LIHTC program provides for federal and state tax credits for private developers and investors who agree to set aside all or an established percentage of their rental units for low-income households for no less than 30 years. Tax credits may also be utilized on rehabilitation projects, contributing to the preservation program. The program begins when developers and investors apply for an allocation of tax credits from the California Tax Credit Allocation Committee (CTCAC). Tax credits are awarded on a competitive basis at varying times. Compliance is monitored according to Internal Revenue Service (IRS) rules and regulations.
- Multi-Family Housing Program: If California's Housing and Community Development Department awards Multi-Family
 Housing Program loans to assist rental housing developments affordable to low-income households in the City of Visalia, the
 City will assist the developers with identifying local funding.

The City will also continue to look for other grant opportunities such as Strategic Growth Council's Affordable Housing and Sustainable Communities (AHSC) Program.

If appropriate, describe publically owned land or property located within the jurisdiction that may be used to address the needs identified in the plan

As the Housing Successor Agency of the former Redevelopment Agency (RDA), the City is underway with the development and disposition of the RDA's low/mod properties. The City published a request for interest which encouraged a local nonprofit to submit a proposal for the development and disposition of these properties. The Use of HOME funding is an optional use toward construction. The Housing Asset funding received shall also be utilized toward single and multi-family development.

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With the elimination of the City's Redevelopment Agency (RDA), the City has become the Successor Agency and continues to move forward on the next steps related to previously owned RDA land.

Discussion

A continued concern is HUD's move to grant based accounting through the Interim Rule of December 2, 2016. This affects CHDO and Program Income, including Subrecipient commitments for spending down funds, beginning in PY2015-2016. Currently, the City is able to manage funding and activities with its non-profit partners, including Self Help Enterprises, Inc., as a Community Housing Development Organization (CHDO). With the rule change, each year's grant funds will be tracked by the year. PJ's must commit the identified amount of funds (PI included first) in its local HOME account before committing the appropriated HOME grant. With the change of program income being required to be committed to a specific project at the time received, and drawn first, due to the success of recycling of HOME funds, and CDBG loan repayment, it may become more of a challenge to spend each year's entitlement funds fully, putting future funds in jeopardy. The City will continue, however to work with its partners and successful projects to keep funding moving to continue improving areas of need.

HOME funding shall be directed to housing projects and programs identified in the 5-Year (2015-2019/20) ConPlan, as influenced by market conditions and characteristics influencing the use of funds available, as indicated within SP-30 as referenced below:

TBRA, market characteristics indicated 21 percent of households in the City are cost burdened and paying 30-50 percent of their income toward housing costs. Eighteen percent of households in the City are cost burdened and paying more than 50% of their incomes on housing costs. Additionally, Special needs populations generally face unique housing challenges and housing affordability may be a significant issue for those relying on fixed incomes. This indicates that as a result of the high cost of housing, special needs groups may be at greater risk of experiencing cost burden and have more trouble finding housing that is affordable to them. They may require rental subsidies to meet the cost of housing.

New Unit Production market characteristics indicated that in total, there are 11,455 units affordable, as per 2007-2011 CHAS data, and reflected in Table 31, to LMI households earning 80% or less AMI, yet there are 13,480 households within this income bracket in need of housing.

Rehabilitation market characteristics as indicated through the Needs Assessment and Market Analysis conducted; there is a need for maintaining and improving existing renter and owner households, as well as senior mobile homes.

Lastly, acquisition, including preservation market characteristics as indicated through the Needs Assessment and Market Analysis, 23 percent of renter households are cost burdened and paying 30-50 percent of their income toward housing costs, while 27 percent are severely cost burdened and paying more than 50 percent of their income on housing costs. Twenty-two percent of owner households are cost burdened and spending 30-50 percent of their income on housing costs, while 13 percent are spending more than 50 percent of their income on housing costs. HACT currently has 4,751 households on the Visalia Area public housing waiting list and 16,242 on the countywide Section 8 waiting list.

Therefore, based upon the Strategic Plan results and the continued needs, HOME funds will continue to assist low, very low and extremely low-income households. The figures below represent only the number of estimated families/households Visalia's HOME projects and/or programs may assist during the 2018/19 program Year. For example, continued efforts through Self Help Enterprise, CHDO acquisition, rehabilitation and resale, and rental properties, providing gap financing, and implementing the Tenant Based Rental Assistance Program. With limited available funding, the following number of households at the 30%, 50% and 80% area median income will be assisted:

Describe the reasons for allocation priorities and any obstacles to addressing underserved needs

As opportunities arise, the City investigates grant opportunities, which assist in addressing the obstacles in meeting the needs of underserved populations. The City will continue its focus a portion of housing related funding in targeted low-income neighborhoods. However, based on the widespread need for affordable housing including at-risk of homelessness, assistance will be available citywide.

The City has provided HOME Community Housing Development Organization (CHDO) funds to Self-Help Enterprises, Inc. (SHE), the City's Certified CHDO, for an acquisition/rehabilitation Projects. The projects allow acquisition of voluntary or foreclosed including vacant and infill properties for single family homes, which will be rehabilitated and resold to income qualifying households; and acquisition, rehabilitation and rent of multi-family units. SHE has been successful in both single and multifamily properties since 2015. Therefore, funding towards SHE, as a CHDO, will continue to assist with increasing homeownership, including housing for our homeless population, and improve neighborhoods. SHE will also improve existing rental units which will be leased to low and very low income tenants. SHE partners with local non-profit service providers.

The Tenant Based Rental Assistance (TBRA) program is contracted with Family Services of Tulare County. The HOME-TBRA Program provides rental assistance for a period of eighteen months (18) and allows two-3 month extensions through a re-application process. No more than 24 months of assist is allowed. We had anticipated assisting approximately 8 to 16 households with previous year funding. We currently have four (4) participants, and two applications under review. The program continues to prove successful approximately \$30,000 has been recommended toward this program. Supportive services will also be available to the tenants through Housing Successor funding. Annually Staff will evaluate the FMR and a Rent Market Study for use as the Rent Standard.

The City also contracted with Family Services of Tulare County to provide case management/street outreach, with the use of CDBG funding. This program has been successful and will continue to provide needed services for our homeless population. Funding is recommended again this year to increase access to services for our homeless population.

Habitat for Humanity will continue to look for opportunities to acquire foreclosed homes within targeted neighborhoods, rehabilitating and reselling to income qualifying households, with the use of the remaining NSP program income funding. The City is also looking at other eligible uses of remaining NSP funding.

The City's Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice (AI) provides an overview of laws, regulations, conditions, and other possible obstacles that affect an individuals or households access to housing in the City. The City has contracted with Fair Housing Council of Central California a non-profit fair housing provider for services related to education, research analysis and other services that may assist in educating the public. Educational workshops occur annually for Fair Housing and ADA accessibility.

CDBG Funding was directed toward the Senior Mobile Home Repair Program. City Council approved the policies and contract with Self Help Enterprises for the administration of the

program in November of 2016. The program has four (4) participants with additional applications under review.



- <u>Census Tract/block No. 2009.3.</u> bound by W. Tulare Avenue, east to S. Demaree Street, south to W. Walnut Avenue, west to S. Linwood Street, north to W. Cambridge Avenue, east to S. Chinowth Street, north to W. Tulare Avenue.

Low/Mod areas are identified in Map 1 are census tracts and blocks 10.03.5; 10.04.1, 10.04.2, 10.04.3, 10.04.4; 11.00.1, 11.00.2, 11.00.3, 11.00.4; 13.01.2; 13.02.1; 17.01.1, 17.01.2; 18.00.1; 20.03.1; 20.08.1; and 20.09.3. The map, attached under Section AP-05 as Appendicles No. 1"Visalia Minority Concentration & CDBG Target Area Maps. Map 2, "CDBG Eligible Tracts" reflects census tracts with minority concentration and CDBG eligible areas. A secondary map through HUD's Mapping Tool confirms eligible tracts.

The Low Mod Census Tract Areas were verified of any changes from the 2015, 16, 17 & 18 periods. Based upon HUD data, there is no additional or reduction in the eligible tract areas. This is reflected in the maps below from the 2015-16 and new 2018 recent mapping tool confirmation.


Map1: City of Visalia Minority Concentration





Rationale for the priorities for allocating investments geographically

Discussion

Entitlement dollars will be distributed citywide as eligible. However, CDBG funds will be utilized in CDBG Target areas for Code Enforcement and Park Improvements. A presumed Benefit project, such as ADA walkway within a park or low mod residential areas in need of access, would be applicable, in addition to areas within CDBG Eligible areas. This year, less funding is directed toward the CDBG Low Mod Area, due primarily to funding being directed toward the Mobile Home Repair Program, which is within mobile home parks throughout the City. The program is focused upon seniors and households with accessibility needs. The CDBG funding directed toward public services is a citywide public service benefit.

Affordable housing will be citywide, which encompasses CDBG Target Areas. Other programs may benefit within the CDBG Target areas as well, however, are allowed citywide.

Staff worked with its non-profit partners to expand program and project policies to include additional types of acquisition, such as vacant, infill and reconstruction two years ago. As funding, through program income becomes available, they would be directed toward SHE/CHDO Acq/Rehab projects due to their success and the housing needs of our community, including housing Visalia's homeless or at-risk of homelessness population. It is anticipated that one single family property will be acquired, rehabilitated or newly constructed. It is also anticipated that 1 rental multi-family property will be acquired, rehabilitated and rented.

The Tenant Based Rental Assistance (TBRA) program policies and contract with Family Services of Tulare County, as a sub recipient were executed. The TBRA Pilot Program, Home funded, is providing rental assistance for a period of eighteen months (18) however, will allow for two-3

month extensions through a re-application process. No more than 24 months of assist is allowed. We had anticipated assisting approximately 8 to 16 households with previous year funding. We currently have four (4) participants, and two applications under review. If the program continues to prove successful and funding is available, an amendment would be prepared. Approximately \$30,000 has been recommended toward this program, which would require CM approval if the anticipated program income is received. Supportive services will also be available to the tenants through Housing Successor funding. Annually Staff will evaluate the FMR and a Rent Market Study for use as the Rent Standard.

AP-60 Public Housing – 91.220(h)

Introduction

The Housing Authority works closely with the City, Continuum of Care "Alliance" and the recently formed Homeless Resource Task Group. Actions planned by the PHA this year are referenced below.

Actions planned during the next year to address the needs to public housing

The Housing Authority of the County of Tulare (HATC) indicated that they will continue to own and manage 179 units in the City of Visalia. They stated that there is no plan to purchase additional public-housing units, nor do they plan on removing any units from their inventory. Their current projection is that there will be an investment of \$433,500 in Capital Fund improvements for the 2018 – 2019 Fiscal Year. The noted expenditures will cover maintenance and rehabilitation in public-housing units within the City of Visalia. HATC's Capital Fund expenditures will cover a large range of projects, including roofing replacement, landscaping improvements, carpet replacement along with Air Conditioning and Heating unit improvements.

Actions to encourage public housing residents to become more involved in management and participate in homeownership

The Housing Authority of Tulare County is proactive in the inclusion of public-housing residents in the policy making process. HATC indicated that an equitable and transparent policy making process is one that includes the opinions of public housing residents and is achieved through the participation of two tenant commissioners on the HATC's Board. Furthermore, HATC has installed a Resident Counsel which is made up of five residents from all of HUD funded programs (Multifamily Housing, LIHTC, HOME, Section 8 Housing Choice Vouchers and public-housing). Their Resident Counsel works with HATC staff on evaluating the effectiveness and efficiency of HATC rental assistance programs. This provides members the opportunity to provide input on necessary program modifications.

A vital driving factor in the implementation of HATC programs is the promotion of tenant self-sufficiency. Their agency views the goal of homeownership for program participants as one of the long term goals for all of their clients. HATC staff works with tenants to effectively provide them with the necessary resources to achieve homeownership. Their Annual Re-Examination Notice provides public-housing participants with an extensive referral list that provides assistance with homeownership. Their list includes programs managed by: CSET, City of Visalia, Habitat for Humanity, CalHFA, and Self Help Enterprises. HATC's program coordinator works with any interested public housing tenant in order to effectively inform them of all the different programs that are available to them. Effective collaboration between their agency and other

public and nonprofit agencies is imperative to help promote homeownership among all of HATC's tenants.

If the PHA is designated as troubled, describe the manner in which financial assistance will be provided or other assistance

The Housing Authority of the County of Tulare is a high performer and not determined to be troubled.

AP-65 Homeless and Other Special Needs Activities – 91.220(i)

Introduction

This section provides an overview of how the City will address the needs of homeless persons over the next year.

Describe the jurisdictions one-year goals and actions for reducing and ending homelessness including

Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs

In the next year, the City and its partners will continue targeted outreach efforts of unsheltered homeless persons. The Visalia Police Department has two funded Homeless Outreach and Proactive Enforcement Officers (HOPE) that work closely with the PATH Case Manager and the Alliance Housing Navigator. On a weekly basis, the team will visit hot spots, encampments and other areas that homeless persons are known to congregate. Homeless persons will be offered supportive services and given the opportunity to have a housing assessment conducted with the overarching goal of placing chronic homeless persons into housing first projects.

The HOPE team has plans to begin participating in the local Homeless Management Information System (HMIS). HMIS participation will enable the HOPE team to directly input client assessments into the Coordinated Entry System and update housing notes. This will strengthen collaborative efforts to serve those experiencing chronic homelessness and most alienated from services.

City will also continue to support the Alliance's outreach efforts to persons experiencing homelessness. On an annual basis, the Alliance conducts a Project Homeless Connect (PHC) event in conjunction with the Point in Time (PIT) census. The one-day PIT survey provides a snapshot of the adults, children in households and unaccompanied youth living in the City of Visalia who meet HUD's definition of homelessness. Information gathered through the PIT is used to understand the causes and trends over time of homelessness, as well as to determine the unmet shelter and service needs of the homeless.

PHC is a national best practice that is a one-stop-shop of comprehensive support services for people experiencing homelessness. Guests attending the event are partnered with volunteers who assist in identifying and accessing necessary resources. The 2019 event will be held on January 24' 2019.

Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

A contract for public services was awarded to Family Services of Tulare County (FSTC) to utilize Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding. Additional CDBG funding is recommended as shown in the CDBG funding activity tables. FSTC has the experience and capacity to provide public services through the program. The primary focus of this public service- is so that Family Services staff may reach approximately 24 homeless people through "street outreach efforts". The secondary focus of this public service funded activity will be providing approximately 14 people case management services that will enable them to be more self-sufficient in order to gain housing. FSTC seeks to identify at-risk and homeless clients who have not yet been linked to a formal support system in order to work with them on completing the VI-SPDAT assessment, assisting them with becoming "document ready" for potential housing opportunities (i.e. obtaining identification, homeless/disability certification), connecting them to critical supportive services such as mental health and substance abuse treatment, and providing linkages to immediate needs such as food, clothing, hygiene products, transportation assistance, emergency shelter and referrals to medical care. FSTC will also work with code enforcement, HOPE team, PATH team and Housing Navigators to reach new clients and connect them to services. This would include any housing opportunities available, through other funding sources and grant opportunities.

Additionally, Tenant Based Rental Assistance (TBRA) will continue to be used as a bridge to long term housing stability as much as possible by Family Services. HOME funded TBRA Program, in the amount of \$300,000 through previous year funding, including PI, is being utilized as rental assistance and security deposit which will assist approximately 16 households. The rental assistance will be provided for a period of eighteen months (18), however, will allow for two – 3 month extensions through a re-application process. No more than 24 months of assistance is allowed under the HOME TBRA regulations. It is anticipated that during the period of assistance clients may be receiving support and services that will enable them to be more self-sufficient in housing when the assistance ends. The TBRA Program is prohibited from requiring participation in medical or disability-related services as a condition of receiving or continuing to receive HOME-TBRA. However, it is encouraged for each individual to have a strong connection with a support service provider, which may be offered as referenced under the HOME Regulations. The City allocated City Housing Asset funding in the amount of \$80,077 which will provide case management/supportive services, street outreach for a two year period.

Furthermore, the City continues their efforts of providing CDBG funds in the amount of \$25,575, to Family Services as matching funds, for case management (public services) to support the Tulare Housing First Shelter Plus Care Program (Voucher Program). This program provides case management services to 14 people annually.

The City also provides CDBG funding this year (FY 2018/19) shall be in the amount of \$17,000 to the Alliance for public services related to Project Homeless Connect/Point In Time Survey.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

The City of Visalia supports and collaborates with local service providers, through the Alliance, to assist homeless individuals and families. Funding priorities include supporting existing high performing housing first rapid rehousing and permanent supporting housing projects.

The City plans on continuing the newly created ECO program, which is a partnership that includes the Tulare County Workforce Investment Board, Caltrans, and ABLE Industries. ECO provides employment opportunities for people experiencing homelessness. The project serves a cohort of 10 participants in a two-phase training opportunity. Through the project, participants are provided paid employment, on the job training, resume building, and employment search assistance. The goal of the project is to connect participants to permanent employment within the community.

The City also prioritizes housing opportunities, as appropriate, in new acquisition and rehab housing projects funded with HOME and other city-funding pools.

In all Continuum and City-funded projects, persons experiencing homelessness are assessed for housing opportunities and are prioritized based on their acuity. Several projects focus on subpopulations such as youth ages 18-24, veterans, and/or chronic homelessness. All projects within the Continuum- emergency, transitional and permanent housing- include supportive services for their clients. Each project designs and implements supportive services based on their target population and partnerships leveraged within the community. The overarching goal of the supportive services offered is to link individuals and/or families with mainstream benefits and income support, education and employment services, as well as health and life skills services. These linkages are a critical component to assisting clients in self-sufficiency, reducing episodes of homelessness, and preventing recidivism.

Programs that serve these vulnerable subpopulations include:

CSET, Family Services, Salvation Army, Turning Point and Tulare County HHSA provide PSH programs for chronically homeless individuals and families and/or families with children. The Veterans' Administration, in conjunction with the Housing Authority of Tulare County, operates the VASH project and Westcare operates the SSVF program that serves eligible veterans and their families. Uplifting Families operates a Transitional Housing Program for transitioning age youth.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); or, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs.

Prevention and shelter diversion are key interventions in the fight to end homelessness. Immediate screening for these possibilities at entry is an important tactic and can preserve emergency beds for households that truly have nowhere else to go. Access to rental subsidies and case management at entry is often enough to ensure the household successfully remains housed. To that end, the Alliance has implemented common eligibility standards for all ESG and HUD-funded projects. The eligibility standards are contained in the Every Door Open coordinated entry system written standards.

As households access the coordinated entry system, they are assessed using the community's common assessment tool. Households scoring between a 0-3 are automatically diverted from the system through a comprehensive referral process that includes 2-1-1 and MOUs with partner agencies.

Another important component of prevention/diversion is assisting households with income supports and connections to mainstream benefits. The SSI/SSDI Outreach, Access and Recovery (SOAR) model is designed to increase access to SSI/SSDI for eligible homeless adults who are and have a mental illness and/or a co-occurring substance use disorder. Staff from all CoCfunded agencies is required to assist clients in obtaining these mainstream benefits. Participation by these agencies provides an efficacious method of assisting households who may otherwise pursue homelessness assistance.

During the 2018/19 year, Tulare County HHSA will implement the Housing and Disability Advocacy Program (HDAP). HDAP is designed to serve people who are homeless access benefit programs that they may qualify for such as SSI, SSDI, CAPI, and veterans' benefits. The definition of homelessness, for this program, includes those who are at imminent risk of becoming homeless. HDAP will offer outreach and case management services such as conducting outreach; providing assessment screening; promoting housing stability; and coordinating linkage to health care, including behavioral health care for participants, as appropriate.

Discussion

City is not a recipient of HOPWA funding.

AP-75 Barriers to affordable housing – 91.220(j)

Introduction

The City is committed to removing barriers to affordable housing. City staff works with other departments and its non-governmental partners to coordinate efforts to eliminate barriers to affordable housing. Barriers to affordable housing include the following:

- Housing Affordability
- Housing Stock
- Policies and Programs

The efforts to eliminate each of these barriers to affordable housing share some common approaches and commitment of resources. However, the City also recognizes that each barrier has unique aspects which require more focused and specialized approaches to achieve effective and lasting solutions.

Actions it planned to remove or ameliorate the negative effects of public policies that serve as barriers to affordable housing such as land use controls, tax policies affecting land, zoning ordinances, building codes, fees and charges, growth limitations, and policies affecting the return on residential investment

As an integral component of its General Plan Housing Element Update, adopted and certified in December 2016, the City completed a critical analysis of its existing codes and policies to identify any existing codes or policies that directly or indirectly inhibit the City's ability to facilitate affordable housing for all persons. As a result of this analysis, the City eliminated, amended, or incorporated 64 Housing Element Programs that are detailed in the Policy Document (Part 3) of the adopted Housing Element Update. Pursuant to the intent and process as stated in the Housing Element, and consistent with State Housing Law, the City has committed to completing all code revisions, program implementation actions and procedures to implement these Housing Programs. These Housing Element Programs are organized into nine Goals categories, as follows:

- 1. New Construction To provide a broad range of housing types and densities to meet the needs of all Visalia residents.
- 2. Mixed Use, Infill, and Downtown Development To promote mixed use, infill, and Downtown development in Visalia.
- 3. Encourage Affordable Housing To encourage construction and maintenance of affordable housing in Visalia.
- 4. Foreclosures To prevent foreclosures, protect affected families, and stabilize neighborhoods impacted by foreclosures.
- 5. Special Needs/Homeless- To provide a range of housing types and services to meet the needs of households with special needs within the city.

- 6. Housing Rehabilitation Program To create and maintain healthy neighborhoods by improving the condition of the existing housing stock and providing for a variety of housing types, sizes, price ranges, and densities compatible with the existing character and integrity of residential neighborhoods.
- 7. Equal Opportunity Housing and Discrimination Prevention To provide decent housing and a quality of living environment for all Visalia residents regardless of age, religion, race, creed, gender, sexual orientation, marital status, ancestry, national origin, disability, economic level, and other arbitrary factors.
- 8. Energy Conservation To encourage energy efficiency in all new and existing housing.
- 9. Implementation Monitoring To ensure that Housing Element programs are implemented on a timely basis and progress of each program is monitored and evaluated annually.

Discussion

Specific Housing Element Programs that were adopted with 2016 Housing Element Update that positively impact the City's affordable and inclusive housing goals, and directly contribute to the goal of eliminating barriers to affordable housing are noted as follows:

- Affordable Housing Infill Incentive component to implement the City's overall Infill Incentive Program – Increases the Traffic Impact Fee incentive from 50% to 60% in the City's older "Core Area", and from 33% to 43% throughout the remainder of the City for projects that include at least 20% Low income category housing.
- Encourage new mobile home parks Increases densities to underlying zone district and reduces excessive setback and yard requirements.
- Streamline Special Needs Housing (transitional and supportive housing, employee housing) permit requirements Eliminates the 6-person maximum threshold for facilities requiring a Conditional Use Permit (CUP).
- Eliminate need for variance or exception where needed to accommodate reasonable accommodation for persons with disabilities.
- Amended Multi-family Residential Zones to allow multi-family dwellings up to 80 dwelling units per site to be permitted by right in the R-M-2 and RM- 3 Zones. This increases the threshold for multi-family project permitted by right from 60 units to 80 units.
- Amended multi-family Conditional Uses section to allow structures up to four stories in the R-M-3 Zone. This revision will increase the maximum multi-family structure building height in the R-M-3 Zone District by one additional story, as a means to increase densities on High Density Residential project sites.
- Added "Affordable Housing Development Incentives and Concessions to include waiver
 of CUP requirement for affordable housing projects with less than 80 units but still
 within 20 units per acre or greater in the Downtown Area. This would waive the CUP
 requirement for downtown affordable housing projects that are less than 80 units (but
 still within 20 units per acre or greater) when a CUP would otherwise be required.
- Added "Affordable Housing Development Incentives and Concessions" to include a reduction of parking requirements for downtown affordable housing projects with less

than 80 units from 1.5 parking spaces per unit to 1 parking space per unit.

Actions planned to foster and maintain affordable housing

The City will continue to work closely with non-profit housing and service providers to collaborate on improving the awareness and expansion of available resources to address the needs of the homeless population.

Staff recently obtained approval by the City Council of the Tenant Based Rental Assistance (TBRA) program policies and contract with Family Services of Tulare County, as a sub recipient. The TBRA Pilot Program, Home funded, will provide rental assistance for a period of eighteen months (18) however, will allow for two-3 month extensions through a re-application process. No more than 24 months of assist is allowed. We had anticipated assisting approximately 8 to 16 households with previous year funding. We currently have four (4) participants, and two applications under review. If the program continues to prove successful and funding is available, an amendment would be prepared. Approximately \$30,000 has been recommended toward this program, which would require CM approval if the anticipated program income is received. Supportive services will also be available to the tenants through Housing Successor funding.

The City will also continue to work with its Certified Community Housing Development Organization (CHDO) in partnership to provide affordable owner and rental housing.

Actions planned to reduce lead-based paint hazards

The Tulare County Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Program provides educational information and training for inspectors. For all of the City's housing programs, applicants are informed of the danger of lead-based paint through a brochure as part of the application process. In addition, City building inspectors are alert of the application process as well as alert to signs of this hazard as they perform their substandard housing inspections. All housing owners and occupants with which the City interacts through its various programs are required to abate this hazard as a condition of assistance from the City.

According to 2011-2015 ACS 5-year estimates, 39% of owner-occupied housing units, and 50.8% of renter occupied housing units were built before 1980 in the City. The use of lead-based paint was banned nationwide in 1970. It is estimated that 42 percent of the City's housing stock contains lead-based paint. As units continue to be repaired, rehabilitated, or replace, no lead-based paint has been used since 1978.

For all of the City's housing programs, applicants are provided information related to the dangers of lead-based paint through a brochure as part of the application process. All program participants with which the City interacts through its various programs are required to abate this hazard as a condition of assistance from the City.

The City also requires its subrecipients and/developers to conduct lead testing on pre-1978 homes and multi-family units it purchases through its affordable housing programs. The City also requires the rehabilitation contractor to utilize safe practices and obtain certification through a HUD-certified lead testing agency.

Actions planned to reduce the number of poverty-level families

The City works with Family Services through the Voucher Program to reduce the number of poverty-level families. The City will also continue to provide its non-profit partners with funding to acquire, rehabilitate, and sell homes to income-qualifying households at or below 80% AMI.

Additionally, the City has made a commitment to improve the communication and service delivery capabilities of agencies and organizations that provide programs to assist the homeless. Specifically, Staff participates in the monthly Continuum of Care (Alliance) meeting, the Visalia Homeless Connect Task Group and the recently formed Homeless Solutions Group to identify funding and opportunities to provide Visalia's homeless population with housing and service opportunities.

The City will also continue to partner with organizations to provide services and address the full range of needs of LMI families. Although there are coordinated programs and services to reduce poverty, it is recognized that many unmet needs will remain. The City will continue to work with its partners to identify and work toward meeting those needs by strategically focusing its resources and efforts.

Actions planned to develop institutional structure

The City is a charter city and is managed under a Council-manager form of government. City Council provides policy direction to the City Manager who is responsible for administering City operations. City Council members are the leaders and policymakers elected to represent the community and concentrate on policy that addresses the citizens' needs and wishes. The City Manager is appointed by the City Council to carry out policy and ensure that the entire community is served. The legislative body is the City Council and City Councilmembers are the community's decision makers.

The Community Development Department Director oversees and administers the day-to-day activities of the CDBG, CalHOME, NSP1 and HOME programs. Staff works together with various City departments to develop programs and activities that improve low-and moderate-income neighborhoods throughout the City. The administration of program activities includes housing, public services, public facility, park and infrastructure improvements, and economic development activities.

Interdepartmental communication and collaboration are two strengths of the delivery system. City staff from various departments works with local organizations and agencies that assist low-income households and individuals. High priority needs were identified during the Consolidated Plan's community engagement and public review periods.

During the Consolidated Plan public review period, these priorities were established. Additionally, Staff meets with the City Manager, Finance Director, Community Development to review the high priority needs, goals established, funding and activities. Additionally input is received by City Council during the feedback period in developing the annual plan. The Annual Action Plan is designed to address the needs and priorities identified within the Consolidated Plan and direct limited funding available toward the highest needs.

Actions planned to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies

The City continues to hold community meetings to enhance coordination between housing providers, government agencies, mental health, and other key stakeholders in the City. The purpose of these meetings is to establish a network of agencies to enhance the delivery of

services to the homeless, disabled individuals and families, and others seeking services. These meetings are conducted on a quarterly basis.

Ongoing quarterly meetings are held by the Homeless Solutions Group to continue the discussions of homeless needs, including case management, affordable housing, available rental units and increased partnerships and the creation of job opportunities. These are efforts that are being continued to enhance coordination and work with the Housing Authority of Tulare County, Alliance, Kaweah Delta District Hospital, Family Health Care Network, CSET, Self Help Enterprises, Family Services of Tulare County, Tulare County Health and Human Services, Visalia Rescue Mission, Tulare County Work Force Investment Board, Health and Human Services, City Manager, City Assistant Manager, City Deputy Assistant Manager, Community Development, including Housing and Code Enforcement and City Police Chief and officers assigned to assisting with homeless efforts, so that we may work together to identify services, housing and other needs. City representatives are also part of the Tulare County Task Force on Homelessness. This is a county wide effort to address the needs of our homeless population, city and countywide.

The City will continue to participate in monthly Alliance meetings, which are attended by various governmental departments and service providers to share information on existing programs and areas for improvement to enhance coordination and exchange knowledge of best practices to better understand and address the community's needs.

A 10 year Section 108 loan of \$4,013,000 was obtained on June 12, 2008, was taken by the City in order to help with construction of a Downtown Parking Structure adjacent the City's and Regional Hospital to provide much needed parking for hospital visitors and employees as well as the surrounding businesses. The loan is set to be paid off in August 2018.

First Time Homebuyer (FTHB), funds shall be provided as a Direct HOME subsidy- gap financing, as a second mortgage to households at or below 80% of the area median income. The property will maintain an affordability covenant as referenced under 24 CFR 92.254 (a) (4). The covenant shall remain for five (5) years when less than \$15,000 is provided in gap financing Direct Subsidy to the homebuyer, and shall be for a ten (10) year period when more than \$15,000 up to \$40,000 is provided in gap financing Direct Subsidy to the homebuyer. The "Owners Participation Agreement" (Covenant) shall begin the date the Deed of Trust is recorded. The Provision for the FTHB Program shall be "Recapture Provision" as per 24 CFR 92.254 (a) (5) (ii) (A) (1). The City may recapture the entire amount of the direct HOME assistance from the homeowner. The amount to be recaptured will not exceed the amount of net proceeds available at the time the home is sold. HOME rule limits recapture to available net proceeds, therefore, if net proceeds are insufficient for the city to recapture the full amount of the Direct HOME assistance, the City will recapture only what is available from net proceeds. This applies regardless of the nature of the sale (voluntary sales including short sales, and involuntary sales including foreclosures).

The SHE-CHDO Program utilizes the "Recapture Provision". HOME funds are invested in the acquisition, rehabilitation, and/or new construction/reconstruction and Direct Subsidy shall be up to 10% of the total HOME investment (i.e. \$196,000 acq/rehab cost X 10% = \$19,600 Direct Subsidy to homebuyer), which shall be provided as a Second Mortgage to the qualifying new homebuyer. If the property is sold below fair market value, the difference between the fair market value and the purchase price is considered to be part of the HOME subsidy and provided directly to the homebuyer as a direct subsidy. And, any additional subsidy provided to the homebuyer to enable them to purchase the property, which includes down payment assistance, closing costs, interest subsidies, or other HOME assistance including any assistance that reduced the purchase price from fair market value to an affordable price, shall be recaptured.

A 30- year covenant shall be recorded to maintain affordability. The SHE-CHDO Program covenant shall use the "Recapture Provision", as referenced under 24, CFR 92.254 (a) (5) (ii) (A) (1) and shall begin the date the Deed of Trust is recorded. In the case of the homebuyer selling the home during affordability period, the City may recapture the entire amount of the direct HOME Subsidy and the difference between the fair market value and the purchase price, if the purchase price is below the fair market value, and any additional assistance as referenced above. The amount to be recaptures will not exceed the amount of net proceeds available at the time the home is sold. HOME rule limits recapture to available net proceeds, therefore, if net proceeds are insufficient for the city to recapture the full amount of the Direct HOME assistance, the City will recapture only what is available from net proceeds. This applies regardless of the nature of the sale (voluntary sales including short sales, and involuntary sales including foreclosures).

Note: Staff works with the City Attorney in updating legal documents to comply with the funding source and type of program(s) administered.

The FTHB, SHE-CHDO Program loan documents were reviewed last year by HUD. No changes have been made to these policies. However, if HUD requests a copy for review, City Staff will again provide documents if required prior to implementing the program.

Department Recommendation: As a condition of receiving federal funds, HUD requires the City to prepare a five-year Consolidated Plan (Yrs 15/16 – 19/20 approved by Council in 2015), and a yearly Action Plan (AP). The yearly Action Plan dictates how staff is to spend the money for that year. Annually the City goes through the process of evaluating proposed Action Plan activities for the use of CDBG and HOME funds and engaging the community for feedback/input on needs (1st step). This work session is the second step, which provides Council an opportunity to review the proposed activities (projects /programs), obtain feedback from the community and add, delete, or modify the recommendations. The third step is preparing and publishing the proposed 2018/19 Action Plan and 2017/18 CDBG Amendment for a 30-day public review comment period starting on March 16, 2018. Staff will also attend community meetings to review the proposed plan and then return to Council conducting a public hearing and adoption of the plan (4st and final step) on April 16th.

Staff is requesting that City Council review and provide direction on:

- Preparation of the Draft 2018/2019 Action Plan:
 - a. FY 2018/19 estimated HOME Investment Partnership (HOME) grant of \$371,694, and up to \$150,000 in program income for proposed HOME eligible activities.
 - FY 2018/19 estimated Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) grant of \$1,188,919, and up to \$25,000 in estimated program income for proposed CDBG eligible activities; and
- Amendment to 2017/2018 CDBG Action Plan:
 - a. Reprogram up to \$144,000 in remaining CDBG funds, after final Section 108 Loan Repayment is completed toward CDBG ADA Compliance projects to assist with completing design and construction.

COUNCIL ACTION: Approved as Recommended

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Summary: This upcoming funding 2018/19 is the fourth year of the 5-year Consolidated Plan. This work session is to gain feedback from City Council in order to finalize preparation of the Draft 2018/19 Action Plan (July 1st, 2018 thru June 30, 2019) and deliver continued programs, projects, and services to the community. Staff has included as Table 1 the proposed (FY2018/19) HOME, and Table 2 CDBG projects and program activities, which includes prior year rollover balance budget with their respective project and program commitment activities. Table 3 reflects the proposed amendment to the 2017/18 CDBG Action Plan which is reprogramming the remaining funds from the Section 108 loan, after final payment, toward ADA projects (Attachments "A", "B", and "C").

The first step of the Action Plan is to engage the community and obtain feedback on high priority needs. The community and committees generally supported the proposed activities and amendment, and also identified homeless housing, mobile home repairs, park improvements and ADA compliance as primary needs. Public engagement included meeting with Citizens Advisory Committee, North Visalia Advisory Committee, and the Disability Advocacy Committee, and publishing/posting to gain feedback on the proposed 2018/19 Action Plan activities and funding, as well as an amendment to the 2017/18 CDBG Action Plan. Comments were as follows:

- Citizens Advisory Committee on February 7th:Members supported staff's proposed projects, programs, allocations and amendment. Members also noted concern of insufficient housing for homeless population.
- North Visalia Neighborhood Advisory Committee on February 8th Members submitted written feedback recommending park improvements, specifically 2 benches in the Oval playground, walkway around the Oval, security camera and storage for increased security; They also recommended funding be directed toward Economic Development, specifically a parking lot site (vacant lots on NE 3rd) for business growth in the area; list of NVAC identified vacant lots for infill opportunities.
 - After researching this comment, staff has determined that CDBG funding cannot be used toward economic development, specifically toward a parking lot not specifically tied to a business.. An agreement with a business and job creation documentation is required, as well as other CDBG requirements. In addition a new activity requires an amendment to the current Consolidated Plan, must meet a high priority need, must create a certain number of permanent full time equivalent jobs, underwriting, and other CDBG requirements.
- Disability Advocacy Committee met on February 12th: Members supported staff's proposed activities and recommended utilizing the un-programmed funding, including the recommended 2017/18 Amendment toward ADA project needs.
- Publishing information (website and email notifications) requesting feedback on the
 proposed activities from our local housing, health, service and non-profit providers, faith
 based organizations, city departments and other agencies, as required by HUD.
 Comments included directing un-programmed funds toward Senior Mobile Home
 Repair, ADA Projects, Park Improvements and funding to non-profits to support
 transitional housing for Central Valley Recovery Service clients; funding to support 2-1-

1- United Way. As noted below, projects supporting public services are nearing HUD's maximum funding allowed. ADA projects require additional funding to complete projects and the Senior Mobile home Program funding is included in the proposed 2018/19 plan.

Today, as the second step, Staff requests Council's review and direction on the following:

- Proposed 2018/19 HOME (Investment Partnership funded) activities which may be used only toward affordable housing.
 - Self Help Enterprises, Inc. (SHE) meets all of HUD's requirements as a Certified Community Housing Development Organization (CHDO). A minimum of 15% of the HOME funds is mandated to be used by a Certified CHDO. Staff recommends continuing SHE's efforts toward affordable housing efforts through property acquisition, rehabilitation, and development activities.
- Proposed 2018/19 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) continuing commitments toward Code Enforcement, Homeless Case Management, Street outreach and Voucher Programs, Fair Housing, Senior Mobile Home Repair Program, Public Improvements, specifically ADA compliance and Park projects in "CDBG Targeted Areas".
 - Approximately \$150,000 is un-programmed; however Staff recommends such funding be either provided to Parks for improvements toward Fairview Park, Public Improvements toward Senior Center or toward ADA compliance projects.
- Proposed 2017/18 CDBG Amendment which is reprogramming 2017/18 CDBG funds (up to \$144k) remaining after the final Section 108 loan payment. Staff is recommending the remaining funds, after confirmation of all Section 108 loan payments have been made, to be reprogrammed toward ADA projects.

Background Discussion:

The City has engaged in several successful projects since 2015. HOME funds provided affordable housing opportunities to nine (9) new homeowners including down payment assistance through properties acquired and rehabilitated by Self Help Enterprises, Inc. and the City. Additionally, Self Help acquired and rehabilitated a 5-unit rental project, known as Strawberry and celebrated the ribbon cutting/grand opening of the new 36-unit multi-family development on Highland, known as Highland Gardens.

During the same period, Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding assisted with completing ADA projects along Akers Street, the Lincoln Oval Park, including the playground improvements and transportation public improvement projects; continued neighborhood preservation efforts through Code Enforcement, coordinated a Fair Housing Training with the Fair Housing Council of Central California, initiated the Senior Mobile Home Repair Program (SMHRP) and contracted with Family Services for the public service programs for Visalia's homeless population for street outreach (assisting up to 24 people) and case management services (assisting approximately 14 people).

Current 2017/18 Activities & Requested 2017/18 Amendment:

Staff is currently managing 2017/18 HOME and CDBG funding as shown in Attachments A & B). The two attachments reflect all HOME and CDBG projects and programs estimated current balance commitments as of 12-26-17. Additionally, a CDBG Amendment is necessary to reprogram funding that will remain after the final CDBG Section 108 loan payment as reflected in Attachment C. Staff recommends reprogramming up to an estimate of \$144,000 toward ADA projects that are in need of additional funding.

2017/18 Current HOME Activities: Council approved HOME funding toward eligible affordable housing activities as reflected in Attachment A.). Staff provided a side-by-side comparison of HOME Action Plan (current) projects with their balance and the proposed projects for 2018 Action Plan.

HOME funds were directed and committed to Self Help Enterprise (SHE), Inc. as a HUD/City Certified Community Housing Development Organization (CHDO) to address affordable housing needs. Self Help continues efforts in identifying properties with approximately \$460k in HOME funding committed to a 6-unit multi-family project on Encina Street. SHE also has 2017 HOME-CHDO funding which is being utilized toward acquisition/construction of single family homes, which will be sold to income qualifying households.

Council also approved the HOME funded Tenant Based Rental Assistance Program (TBRA) (pilot program) which is beginning to see results and gain interest with property owner participation, helping our homeless, and/or at risk of homelessness population with rental payment assistance up to 24-months. The program struggled early in the year due to a lack of property owner's willing to rent at the HOME program standards (FMR), therefore Staff contracted for a Rent Comparability Study and gained HUD acceptance, which increased the rent standard (maximum) for 0 to 2 bedroom units - for example a 2 bedroom increased from \$873 to \$990. Family Service Staff has worked to build relationships with local property owners with four (4) participants, and four (4) underway.

Staff has not directed HOME funding toward down payment assistance due to the CalHome program providing assistance with its available balance,

2017/18 Current CDBG Activities: Council approved CDBG project/program commitments with previous year funding toward high priority needs identified through the ConPlan which is reflected in Attachment B. Staff also provided a side-by-side comparison of CDBG Action Plan (current) projects with their balance and the proposed projects for 2018/19 Action Plan.

CDBG funding has been committed toward "Housing and Neighborhood Improvements include Senior Mobile Home Repair Program, assisting four (4) seniors this year, and Code Enforcement efforts.

Public Service current commitment balance of \$124,696 is addressing Fair Housing education and assisting Visalia's homeless population needs. This includes funding to the Continuum of

Care Point in Time survey (HUD required) in conjunction with the Project Homeless Connect event and Family Services of Tulare County contracts for case management services, street outreach and case management services for the Shelter Plus Care housing voucher program. Public Services also include the \$30,000 contract for Fair Housing Education, to City staff, non-profit partners, lenders, realtors and more. In April, Fair Housing Awareness month, staff and non-profit agencies attended Fair Housing Training.

Public Improvements include CDBG funding commitment toward ADA compliance projects such as ADA sidewalk design for the south side of Houston Avenue between Santa Fe and Dinuba Boulevard, which are within the CDBG target area.

The Park & Recreation Commission provided a list of recommended projects to Park & Recreation staff which established a list of potential CDBG Projects. Current Park improvements include \$45,000 in CDBG toward Jefferson Park and \$5,000 toward the Oval security camera, which are within CDBG Targeted areas (low mod census). Code Enforcement staff also continue to address neighborhood preservation within CDBG targeted area. Attachment "D" includes the CDBG Target Map, which represents the census tracts which meet HUD's requirements, of which at least 51% of the household income, in those tracts are at or below 80% of the area median income. Current year CDBG funds are also used for the final repayment of the Section 108 loan (\$530k) West Acequia Parking Structure.

<u>Proposed 2018/19 Action Plan Activities</u>: Staff is requesting that Council review and provide feedback on proposed FY 2018/19 Action Plan activities.

Based on successful established activities which meet the 5 year priorities, feedback, and existing commitments and contracts (programmed) and un-programmed project funding, Staff has developed the proposed 2018 activity listing with HOME and CDBG allocations. Staff has provided a side-by-side comparison as previously mentioned in Attachment "A" and "B". Staff has not yet received notice of Program Year 2018/19 Action Plan funding. Typically, HUD notifies grantees between April and June. Therefore, the figures provided to the public and

notifies grantees between April and June. Therefore, the figures provided to the public and Council at this time, are estimated on the previous year figures only. The 2018/19 funding may be more or less, which the difference will be reflected within the HOME funded Self Help's CHDO Acq/Rehab Program and CDBG funding difference will be reflected within the CDBG ADA compliance program.

The 2018/19 HOME Grant estimate is \$371,694, plus estimated program income of \$150,000, totals \$521,694, which is recommended for use toward the following eligible proposed HOME activities listed below:

- Commitment funded Programs
 - HOME Administration (10% of Grant +10% of estimated PI)
 \$52,169
 - CHDO (SHE)-Acq/Rehab Projects/Programs (Single or Multifamily) \$319,525
- Un-Programmed Projects (recommended):
 - HOME- Program Income toward SHE- CHDO projects

*Total Estimated HOME 2018-19 allocation:

\$521,694

Any HOME program income received up to \$150,000 is recommended to be directed toward Self Help to continue their efforts in addressing housing needs, including housing homeless and/or at risk of homeless. Staff would also recommend that if more than \$150,000 in HOME program income is received that the City Manager be given the authority to direct it toward the TBRA program or Self Help's efforts.

The 2018/19 CDBG Grant estimate is \$1,188,919 plus estimated program income of \$25,000, totals \$1,213,919, which is recommended for use toward the following eligible proposed CDBG activities:

Staff recommends continuing the efforts of public services increasing funds to the Continuum of Care and Case Management programs in order to fulfill the needs of our community that provide necessary services to our homeless population. HUD has a 15% cap of the grant allocation toward public services (\$178k estimate). The current & new commitments, as well as expenditures towards these efforts are watched closely, not to exceed HUD's limits. A snapshot in time, including these recommended 2018/19 commitments reflects 14% (\$166k est.) toward public service activities. An additional estimate of \$12,000 would bring public services to the cap, if not exceed it. The current and recommended allocations would not exceed HUD's requirements.

Community development needs include completing an ADA project on Houston, design and construction of curb cuts, truncated domes and walkways near Wittman Center and Emergency Aid, with approximately twenty-six (26) other locations in need of ADA upgrade, which were identified by members of the DAC, CAC, and Engineering staff.

Parks and Recreation Department staff, working with the Parks and Recreation Commission, compiled a list of potential projects for the use of CDGB funds. The 2018/19 designated amount of \$50,000 for park improvements could be utilized to add picnic tables and/or benches in an eligible park. This amount could also add a walking path at Lincoln Oval as recommended by the North Visalia Advisory Committee.

Of the 2018/19 funding, there is an estimated \$150,000 in un-programmed CDBG funding which could support additional ADA compliance project, but also could support additional park project needs such as adding a picnic arbor at Fairview Park, adding a shade cover at the Senior Center Garden or replacing the exterior entryway ceramic tile at the Senior Center, alleviating a slip and fall hazard. Another potential project would add improvements to Summer's Park such as a mini skate park.

Results of recent Outreach:

Beginning January, Staff notified the public through email list serves and public noticing of the opportunity to provide feedback in preparing the Draft Plan. Staff also attended community meetings in February, provided information that related to the high priority needs approved through the ConPlan, current project information, recommended 2017/18 Amendment, and preliminary proposed 2018/19 Action activities. The meetings and feedback received to date, with additional notation of comments is included as Attachment "E".

Upon receiving Council feedback today (2nd step), the proposed report (Action Plan) will be prepared and made available for public review and comment beginning March 16, 2018 through April 16, 2018 (3rd step). During this time, Staff will also return to community committees for additional input, followed by Council's review and final approval (4th and final step), thereafter submitting to HUD for final approval in early May.

proposed FY 2018/19 Action Plan CDBG and HOME Budget and proposed FY 2017/18 CDBG Action Plan Amendment (Attachment "A") which includes use in eligible CDBG targeted areas, to benefit low income persons/households.(Attachment "B"). A full proposed FY 2018 Action Plan report is included (Attachment "C"). Council shall also approve the proposed Amendment to the Citizens Participation Plan (Attachment "D") which relates to updating the City office locations, community meeting locations, and added definitions.

Comments received to date include general support of proposed activities, support of helping our homeless with housing and support for the proposed plan and amendments. Further detailed responses to community, committee, and Council's comments since January of 2018 are included as Attachment "E". Responses to Council's questions from the February 20, 2018 Work Session meeting are referenced below.

The figures provided are estimated on the previous year funding, and will be finalized upon Congressional Budget approval and HUD's noticing. If the budget is received before May 1st the Plan will be submitted by HUD's deadline of May 15th.

Background Discussion: As a participating jurisdiction and entitlement community, the City of Visalia receives federal formula grants through the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). This provides the City with annual direct grants, to provide decent affordable housing, a suitable living environment, and to expand economic opportunities, primarily for low-income persons/households. This includes census tract areas (known as CDBG Targeted Areas) that reflect 51% of the household income at or below 80% area median income, as shown in the CDBG Target Map (Attachment "B") HUD requires public participation and comments in the development and approval of the annual plan and amendments. Staff has conducted outreach to obtain feedback in preparing the Plan and Amendments. Herein below represents further detailed comments to date, and proposed plan and amendments for Council's approval.

FY 2018/19 Action Plan:

Administracy MCD Audubit

Based on successful established activities which meet the 5 year priorities, feedback, and existing commitments and contracts, the FY 2018/19 Action Plan (July 1st, 2018 thru June 30, 2019) lists activities with HOME and CDBG allocations including program income (PI) as referenced herein below. The estimated program income (PI), is derived from repayment of existing borrower first time homebuyer and rehabilitation loans and recycling of program income derived from Self Help Enterprises (purchased, rehabilitated and resold homes).

Staff has not yet received notice of Program Year 2018 Action Plan funding. Typically, HUD notifies grantees between April and June. Therefore, the figures provided are estimated on the previous year funding received. The 2018 funding may be more or less, which the HOME funding difference will be reflected within Self Help's CHDO Acq/Rehab Program and CDBG funding difference will be reflected within ADA compliance project balance.

The FY 2018 Action Plan delivers continued programs, projects and services to the community. Further details regarding prior year rollover balances with their respective project and program commitment activities are included within Tables 1 & 2, Attachment "A".

The 2018/19 HOME Grant estimate is \$371,694, plus estimated program income of \$180,000, totals \$551,694, for use toward the following eligible proposed HOME activities:

Any HOME program income received up to \$150,000 is recommended to be directed toward Self Help to continue their efforts in addressing housing needs, including housing homeless and/or at-risk of homeless. An estimated \$30,000 in PI toward the TBRA Program has been included which would support one TBRA participant for 2 years, or two TBRA participants for the first year toward rental assistance. Staff proposes that if more than \$150,000 in HOME program income is received that the City Manager be given the authority to direct it toward the TBRA Program or Self Help's efforts, as long as the amount is deemed a minor amendment (less than 75% change as outlined in the Citizen Participation Plan).

The 2018/19 CDBG Grant estimate is \$1,188,919 plus estimated program income of \$25,000, totaling \$1,213,919, which is recommended for use toward the following eligible proposed CDBG activities:

As directed by Council, staff reviewed public service funding and increased allocations toward public service (homeless service) efforts through Family Services Case Management Program. HUD allows up to 15% cap of the grant allocation toward public services (estimated at \$178,337). A snapshot of our commitments and expenditures toward public service activities, including the proposed FY 2018/19 commitments reflect a total of 14.8% (estimated

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commitments of \$173,456), which brings the City close to HUD's 15% maximum allowed. Public Service activities include Fair Housing (required by HUD), the Continuum of Care (required by HUD) and Family Services programs (Homeless Service Programs).

Community Development needs include completing ADA Public Improvement projects. HUD's regulations indicate that when utilizing CDBG funding toward ADA improvements, eligibility must have demonstrated and documented that the proposed improvement be evident that the primary beneficiaries of the modifications are elderly and/or severely disabled adults and not the general public. The service area must also be based upon low/mod areas, surveys of senior and disabled population needs. The CDBG Target Map reflects the eligible areas (Attachment "B").

ADA projects underway using existing funding include Houston Avenue and the design and construction of curb cuts, truncated domes, and walkways near Wittman Center and Emergency Aid. An additional twenty-six (26) locations identified by members of the DAC, CAC and Engineering staff on the northern side of Visalia within CDBG Targeted areas, are in need of ADA upgrades. Engineering identified areas on the southern side of Visalia, also within the CDBG Targeted areas, which may qualify for the use of CDBG funding toward ADA improvements. The locations will be prioritized based upon Council's direction and under HUD's requirements.

Parks and Recreation staff worked with the Parks and Recreation Commission and compiled a list of potential Park improvements projects using CDGB funds. The 2018/19 \$50,000 for park improvements will assist in completing improvements in Jefferson Park and Village Park/Community Campus. If funds remain thereafter, they would be utilized to add improvements to Summer's Park.

FY 2017/18 CDBG Amendment:

Proposed 2017/18 CDBG Amendment reprograms 2017/18 CDBG funds (up to \$88k) remaining after the final Section 108 loan payment, which staff proposes reprogramming toward ADA projects.

Citizens Participation Plan (CPP) Amendment:

A minor amendment to the Citizens Participation Plan (CPP) reflects the new location of the City Manager's office (220 N Santa Fe) and the Finance Department- Housing, managing these funds, located at (707 West Acequia) and community meeting locations (Disability Advocacy Committee and Citizens Advisory Committee meetings are held at 220 N Santa Fe; and the North Visalia Advisory Committee meeting are held at 247 W Ferguson, additional definitions have been added as well as the Council district information.

Response to City Council Feb 20th Work Session comments:

Acquisition for Senior Housing: Council asked if CDBG funds may be used to acquire and rehabilitate senior housing. Generally, CDBG funding may not be used to construct housing, rather it must provide assistance toward rehabilitation of existing owner occupied housing, including senior-owned housing.

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ADA Project Prioritization: Council requested that staff prioritize ADA compliance projects in areas near schools, heavily traveled areas going to facilities, and consider areas on the south side of town. As previously referenced, eligible areas to use CDBG funding are within CDBG Targeted areas benefitting seniors and disabled, not the general public. There are 5 census tracts which are identified as eligible CDBG Targeted areas on the southern side of Visalia, which include Washington School on Bridge Street; Mt Whitney High School at Conyer/Tulare Avenue; Veva Blunt on Chinowth; Country Manor Mobile Home Park, for seniors; and The Meadows 100 senior units on Tulare Avenue.

Engineering Staff will identify ADA improvement needs including the need for accessibility to the schools and senior housing projects within the five (5) eligible CDBG Targeted area census tracts on the southern side of Visalia, as shown with the CDBG Target Map (Attachment "B").:

South Side Public Improvements

It was voiced that the south portion of the City does not receive improvements to the area surrounding Central Street, the south portion of Santa Fe, Washington School area, and Linwood Street. Areas that are under review for ADA improvements are referenced above, and include the Washington School area. Jefferson Park has a project that is starting with the design work, and will include funding from the proposed 2018 CDBG budget. The Code Enforcement Staff work within the CDBG Targeted areas and continue to address substandard housing, which include the 5 census tracts on the southern side of Visalia as referenced above.

Central Avenue, between Tulare and Walnut, and Linwood Street, between Caldwell and Whitendale Avenues do not meet the CDBG low mod income census tract/block requirements. City funding has not contributed in the last decade towards projects in these areas; however, Kaweah Management Company and the Housing Authority of Tulare County purchased four complexes along Central last year.

Areas outside of the CDBG Target areas require additional staff time to conduct surveys, which may result in not qualifying for CDBG funding, then requiring use of general funds or other grant resources.

HOME funds are used citywide for home ownership and rental housing. Examples of affordable housing programs used outside CDBG areas include Senior Mobile Home Repair Program; Self Help Enterprises CHDO acquisition, rehabilitation and resale of single-family homes and rental of multi-family properties; and the new HOME Tenant Based Rental Assistance (TBRA) program which assists our homeless population (LMI) with rental housing up to 2 years is a citywide program, allowing the tenant to locate a unit to rent within city limits.

Council recently approved the updated policies and available Cal Home Recycled funds for down payment assistance programs. Applicants are requesting information about the program which is available citywide.

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Increase Homeless Services and Case Management Load: Council requested that staff consider increasing funding toward homeless services and Family Services' (FS) budget has been increased by \$10,000, as referenced in their letter as Attachment "F". This brought the public service category to the maximum.

Council also asked how many case managers are required per tenant. Each client is assigned to one case manager. On average, a case Manager has 20 to 30 clients active at one time in various phases of support. An example is the Shelter Plus Care/Tulare Housing First project ("Voucher Program"). The City provides CDBG funds, and the Case Manager has between 25-30 cases. The clients vary in their need for services but everyone gets seen at least once per month. Some are receiving actual "case management" which takes more time, some clients just receive an "outreach" or very short-term support. These caseloads are in line with best practices for intensive supportive housing.

Community Meetings (April) Comments:

Staff met with the Citizens Advisory and Disability Advocacy Committee to obtain comments. Both committees supported the proposed plan and amendments. The North Visalia Advisory Committee did not have a quorum, but commented that no funding was directed toward benches in the Oval Park.

Fiscal Impact: Once approved, 2017 CDBG Amendment would authorize directing the balance remaining, after the final Section 108 loan payment, estimated up to \$88,000 to the ADA projects; and authorize FY 2018/19 CDBG, HOME and Program Income appropriations.

Prior Council Action: February 20, 2018, Work Session, City Council provided direction on proposed 2017 CDBG Amendment and proposed 2018 Action Plan (HOME & CDBG) activities in order to prepare and finalize the Plan.

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Citizen Participation Plan

Minor Amended Updated (April 16, 2018)

The City of Visalia (City) is an entitlement jurisdiction that receives grant funding from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

The federal entitlement grant funds include:

- Community Development Block Grants (CDBG)
- HOME Investment Partnerships Program (HOME)

The HUD Code of Final Regulations for the Consolidated Plan (24 CFR Part 91 Sec. 91.105) requires that the City adopt a Citizen Participation Plan (CPP) that sets forth the City's policies and procedures for citizen participation in the planning, execution, and evaluation of the Consolidated Plan, Annual Action Plans, and Consolidated Annual Performance Evaluation Reports (CAPER).

This Citizens Participation Plan shall be effective until amended or superseded.

This CPP provides guidelines for the City to provide and encourage public participation to residents, community stakeholders, and grant beneficiaries in the process of drafting, implementing, and evaluating the Consolidated Plan and related documents. The citizen participation process includes outreach, public hearings, community forums, and opportunities for comment.

Definitions

Amendment, Minor: A change to a previously adopted Five Year Consolidated Plan or Annual Action Plan that does not meet the thresholds to qualify as a Substantial Amendment. A minor amendment may include monetary changes or shifts, regardless of size that are both:

- 1. Necessary for substantially preserving all the programs and activities identified in a Plan.
- Necessitated by significant changes in the funding levels between HUD's initial estimates of funding amounts and HUD's final allocation notification to the City.

Amendment, Substantial: A change to a previously adopted Five Year Plan or Annual Plan that:

- Increases or decreases the amount allocated to a category of funding within the City's entitlement grant programs (as listed below) by 75 percent.
- · Significantly changes an activity's proposed beneficiaries or persons served
- · Allocates funding for a new activity not previously described in the Action Plan

Analysis of Impediments (AI) to Fair Housing Choice: The AI is being replaced by the Assessment for Fair Housing. Until program participants are required to submit an AFH under the AFFH rule, the program participant must continue to conduct an analysis of impediments (AI) in accordance with existing HUD regulations. Once the AFH is approved, future AFH Plans will occur every five years with the Consolidated Plan.

On May 1, 2018, HUD posted the 2018 CDBG and HOME jurisdiction allocations. Based upon the actual CDBG grant of \$1,309,353 funding represented an increase of \$120,434 more than the estimated \$1,188,919. This is considered a minor amendment increase. The actual HOME Grant of \$546,879, represented \$175,185 more than the estimated \$371,694. This is also considered a minor amendment increase. See Attachment "B" final actual tables for all CDBG and HOME projects/programs. Table 1 below reflects the estimated figures, actuals and percentage of change to the specific projects affected, resulting in only a Minor Amendment memo.
