RECRUITMENT

The Visalia Police Department is continuously recruiting:

- Police Officer (California P.O.S.T. Academy Graduate)
- Police Officer Lateral (California Certified)
- Communications Operator (with one year experience)

Currently, sworn personnel of the Visalia Police Department are eligible for the following benefits:

- 1. Uniform allowance (\$975) annually
- 2. Standby pay (\$1,000) annually
- 3. Transfer & specialty incentive for SWAT, FTO, Youth Services, Bomb Squad, Certified Bilingual, and Investigations (\$750) annually
- 4. Through participation in the Disability Avoidance Program and meeting specified criteria, up to 3% of annual income reimbursement
- 5. Use of physical fitness facility
- 6. Holiday hours (88) 44-hours comp time and 44 hours vacation pay

Other career opportunities include CSI (Crime Scene Investigations), Community Service Officers, Records Management, and Criminal Investigations positions.

A Word from the Chief

The year 2004 was the year that Measure "T" began to show results. Measure "T" was a local proposition that increased Visalia's sales tax by one-quarter percent to help fund public safety needs.

From these funds, we hired five new uniformed officers at the beginning of the fiscal year and will hire five additional officers in July of 2005. A small amount of Measure "T" funds is also being directed towards the two precinct buildings that will be under construction soon; one in north Visalia and one in south Visalia. Additional Measure "T" funds will offset the construction costs of the new 9-1-1 Communications Center/Administrative building that will be constructed in 2008 or 2009.

Continued Department growth of five officers per year will soon staff your Police Department at a level that will produce a difference that citizens can see and feel. We owe the voters who supported Measure "T" a vote of thanks from all of us.

It has been a pleasure to both serve this community and the dedicated men and women of this agency. Thank you to our entire community for continuing to support this Department so strongly.




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Police Officer

Lt. Rick Haskill - a 15-year law enforcement veteran is the District 1 Commander.

District 1 officers worked with community members to address complaints of arson, drugs, gang issues, and graffiti. Increased patrol presence affected crime in the area.

An example of a successful saturation detail occurred after officers and citizens met regarding the problems. The Special Enforcement Unit assisted with gang and graffiti related issues. The Visalia Fire Department addressed the arson problem. The Narcotics Unit assisted by focusing their attention on drug enforcement in the area.

Lt. Glen Newsom – a 25-year law enforcement veteran is the District 2 Commander.

In 2004, the officers assigned to District 2 worked with members of the community to resolve issues in their sectors and neighborhoods. The issues included gang problems, graffiti, abandoned vehicles, and other blight.

An example of cooperation between police and citizens occurred after a drive by shooting on May 1st . Chief Barker, Lt. Newsom, concerned residents and property owners met and learned that a number of gang members occupied an apartment complex nearby. Opposing gang members were driving by the location and shooting weapons.

Because of the meeting, officers put into action an aggressive tactical plan to stop the criminal gang activity in this neighborhood. During the operation, officers made thirteen felony arrests. The arrests were for felony warrants, possession of drugs, selling drugs, and being under the influence of a controlled substance. The enforcement plan resulted in decreased gang activity in the area.

April 14, a day of chases, gunfight, and workplace violence.

POLICE RESOURCES TAPPED

Officers responded to two high-stress situations simultaneously.

Avenue 304

Cesario Rodriguez is shot by a fellow employee, Orlando Quinones, at the Pactiv plant on Elowin Court. The shooter flees the plant and goes home to a residence on Rinaldi Street.

Visalia police officers and SWAT team members surround the Rinaldi address.

Santa Cruz County police wanted Donald Bochet for shooting a California Highway Patrol officer, for a hit-and-run accident where he hit a woman and a child, and in connection with a string of commercial burglaries. When we found that he was in the area, Bochet led officers in a chase that began in Farmersville and ended in Visalia. More than 20 officers, detectives, and SWAT members responded.

SWAT members and other officers leave Rinaldi address

to join chase.

Suspect in high-speed chase crashes his Ford Taurus on Mooney Blvd, escapes on foot, and then steals a second vehicle. The chase resumes.

SWAT team members entered the house on Rinaldi and found Quinones dead of

a self-inflicted gunshot wound. Officers

found the .38-caliber handgun used in the

Pactiv plant shooting.

The chase ended at the corner of Giddings and Tulare where Bochat crashed. Bochat got out of the car carrying an AK-47 assault rifle. Police found body armor, a bulletproof vest, and a handgun in Bochat's car after the pursuit ended.




