




College of the Sequoias PE & Disabled Program Facilities





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

NAMING RIGHTS AND SPONSORSHIP AGREEMENT

This Naming Rights and Sponsorship Agreement ("Agreement") is effective as of January 9, 2009, by and between COLLEGE OF THE SEQUOIAS ("COS"), and JOSEPH and MARYBETH HIGUERA, as trustees of the HIGUERA LIVING TRUST, dated September 26, 2005, as amended ("Sponsor") (Individually referred to as "Party" and collectively as "Parties").

RECITALS

WHEREAS, Sponsor is seeking to make a contribution to the COS Foundation to secure naming rights to the new Fieldhouse to be completed in 2010.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and conditions contained herein, the Parties hereby agree as follows:

- 1. **CONTRIBUTION**. Sponsor agrees to make a contribution of Two Million and No/100 Dollars (\$2,000,000.00), payable in four (4) equal annual installments of Five Hundred Thousand and No/100 Dollars (\$500,000.00), with the first payment due on March 31, 2009, the second payment due on March 31, 2010, the third payment due on March 31, 2011, and the fourth payment due on March 31, 2012.
- 2. NAMING RIGHTS. In exchange for the contribution depicted in Section 1 of this Agreement, COS agrees that the Fieldhouse shall henceforth be known as the "Dr. S. Thomas Porter Fieldhouse" ("Name").
- 3. NAME PLACEMENT AND USE. Parties agree that the placement(s), size(s), location(s) and use(s) of the Name shall be at the sole discretion of COS as set forth in the letter dated January 9, 2009, to sponsor; however both Parties acknowledge that COS will act in good faith and use its best effort to insure that the Fieldhouse is called by the Name. Parties agree that no other name shall be used in conjunction with the Fieldhouse.
- 4. USE OF CONTRIBUTION. Parties agree that of the contribution depicted in Section 1 of this Agreement, One Million Three Hundred Thousand and No/100 Dollars (\$1,300,000.00) shall be allocated to the COS Foundation. Parties agree that the remaining Seven Hundred Thousand and No/100 Dollars (\$700,000.00) shall be allocated to a trust fund to be created and named the "Porter Community Use Fund," the income and corpus from which shall be allocated to projects within the City of Visalia deemed appropriate by College of the Sequoias Foundation.
- 5. MERGER. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the Parties with respect to any matter referenced herein and supersedes any and all other prior writings and oral negotiations. This agreement may be modified only in writing, and signed by the parties in interest at the time of such modification.
- 6. **JURISDICTION.** This Agreement shall be governed by and constructed under the laws of the State of California. In the event of any legal action to enforce or interpret this Agreement,

Parties agree that the sole and exclusive venue shall be a court of competent jurisdiction located in Tulare County, California.

- 7. ATTORNEYS' FEES. In the event that litigation is brought by either Party in connection with this Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover from the opposing party all costs and expenses, including reasonable attorneys' fees incurred by the prevailing party in the exercise of any of its rights or remedies hereunder or the enforcement of any terms, conditions or provision of this Agreement.
- **8. HEADINGS.** Section headings included in this Agreement are included solely for convenience and are not intended to modify, explain, or affect the interpretation of this Agreement.
- **9. AUTHORITY.** The persons executing this Agreement on behalf of the Parties hereto warrant that they are duly authorized to execute this Agreement on behalf of said Parties and that by doing so, the Parties are formally bound to the provisions of this Agreement.

Dear Ms. Higuera:

On behalf of the College of the Sequoias Foundation and the students that it serves, we would like to take this opportunity to thank you for your generous gift in the amount of \$2 million to be paid over the next four years. This gift means many things to the students of COS and the residents of Visalia and your generosity will have an impact on many generations to come. In addition, the memory and work of your late husband, Dr. S. Thomas Porter, and your family will forever be remembered in our community.

Porter Community Use Fund

It is the understanding of the leadership of the College of the Sequoias Foundation and the College of the Sequoias District, that the gift, in the amount of \$700,000, will be used to establish the Porter Community Use Fund within the COS Foundation. This Fund will be used to begin cooperative projects which benefit the residents of Visalia.

There are three ways in which the College of the Sequoias Foundation operates on projects like this. First, projects could be identified from the outset of the fund and be funded strictly on that basis. Second, an Oversight Committee could be created and be comprised of one Foundation Board member who resides in Visalia, the COS President, one Visalia Community member, and either you or a representative which you designate. Each January – March, these individuals will meet to discuss upcoming needs of Visalia residents based on established guidelines. We will have a list of possible projects for you when we see each other the week of January 5. Third, projects may be identified which require additional mini-campaigns for the specific needs. These campaigns to fund specific projects could attract matching donations based on challenge grants from the fund.

While we are currently working on a full menu of projects which may be included in the funding opportunities for the Porter Community Use Fund, some examples are included on the attachment to this letter.

Recognizing that there will be others who support the Porter Community Use Fund on an annual basis, a donor recognition piece in the new gymnasium will be established and maintained by the College of the Sequoias Foundation. This plaque will identify Founding Members of the fund for a time period specified up until December 31, 2009. In addition, there will be a section for sustaining members of the fund which will be recognized on an annual basis.

Perpetual Naming Rights of the COS Fieldhouse

Your gift will provide naming rights of the new fieldhouse, which will begin construction in January 2009. Anticipated completion of this project is Fall of 2010. Of the \$2 million gift, should the \$1.3 million not be needed for the current capital needs of the fieldhouse, these funds would remain in the Foundation to be available for other potential unfunded needs as they arise.

Recognizing the significance of the gift, which establishes naming rights of the Porter Fieldhouse, including all exterior naming, including the fascia over the main entrance shall bear the name "Dr. S. Thomas Porter Fieldhouse," a portion of the abovementioned donor wall will be dedicated to Dr. S. Thomas Porter and discuss his commitment to and significant involvement with the College of the Sequoias and the City of Visalia.

Pledge

It is the understanding of the College of the Sequoias that the pledge of the \$2 million gift will be made in annual payments of \$500,000 starting in 2009 and continue until 2012. These annual pledge payments will be applied proportionately between the Porter Community Use Fund and the College of the Sequoias Foundation Undesignated Fund, 35% and 65% respectively. In addition, any funds above this initial pledge may be applied at the donor's request to the Porter Community Use Fund.

Based on your representation of this pledge in the amount of \$2 million, the College of the Sequoias will name the fieldhouse in perpetuity. Because of the permanent naming, it is understood that provisions in your estate plan have been made by you to insure that the gift is completed. Should you need additional information from us, we would be happy to work directly with your professionals, should that be appropriate.

Should the above outline of your gift be agreeable to you, we will put this in a more formal agreement spelling out the expectations--from the naming opportunity and donor wall to the guidelines for the Porter Community Use Fund. We look forward to any input that you have regarding such, and we would be happy to answer any questions that you may have.

Again, on behalf of the College of the Sequoias Foundation, our students, and the residents of Visalia—thank you! We realize that it is your desire to forever remember Tom, your family, and our community, and we cannot think of a more fitting tribute than the legacy which you will be establishing with this generous gift.

Possible Projects for Consideration by the Porter Community Use Fund

All funded programs and projects would prominently display the donor as the Porter Community Use Fund.

Fresno State Center in Visalia: The operating costs for the Fresno State Center in Visalia are approximately \$100,000 annually. From an operational standpoint, an annual gift in this amount would be exceedingly helpful to relieve the City's current expenditure. With the budget situation the way that it is, the long term viability of operational funds of this type might be in jeopardy from the City.

Paramedic Program: Desperately needed and requested by the City of Visalia is really struggling with fulfilling these needs of Firefighter Training. Currently, the city is hiring firefighters who need paramedic training —with the closest program an hour program with an expensive tuition bill—or paramedics who the City has to train as firefighters. Because of the accreditation requirements, it is an expensive program to implement. For a permanent naming opportunity, a gift from the Porter Community Use Fund would provide for many opportunities for Visalia residents—and fulfill a huge need for the City of Visalia. The need is estimated to be approximately \$500,000.

Supervisory Academy: A project seen as a priority for the City of Visalia, this project would be beneficial to many large employers in the City—and help with economic development of the area. Initial start-up funds in the amount of \$250,000 would provide the ability for the College to provide the necessary curriculum and provide for an initial 2 years of the program. A Naming Opportunity of the Marybeth Porter Higuera Supervisory Academy would be a long-term, branded program which would be known throughout the Central Valley and benefit thousands of individuals and companies over the life of the program. This program which would include ongoing advertising of the program and thereby significant recognition of the gift with employers would serve a critical need for Visalia.

University Preparatory High School: A joint project between the Tulare County Office of Education and the College of the Sequoias, this program will serve students in grades 9-12 that links academic preparation, leadership training, community services, substance abuse prevention, and character education to higher education. A high school established within an "Early College" setting and serving a blend of high achieving students, English learning students, and other under-served and non-traditional students would provide a unique high school experience leading to school engagement and college readiness. UPHS will open in Fall of 2009 with approximately 125 students (75 ninth graders and 50 tenth graders). Eleventh grade students will be added in year 2 and twelfth graders will be added in year 3. Total enrollment will not exceed 400 students. For a long term, permanent naming opportunity, a gift in an agreed upon amount would provide a naming opportunity for the Porter Community Use Fund.

CTE Charter High School: Through a partnership with Visalia Unified School District and COS, plans are underway for a Career Technical Education Charter High School to open in the Fall of 2010. By combining high school and college classes, at a facility designed for career technical education, this program will serve thousands of high school students as they enter the workforce. The current proposed facility needs an additional wing of classrooms to make the project successful. For \$200,000, this wing could be added to the facility and make the program a reality.

Joint Meeting Visalia City Council and College of the Sequoias Board of Trustees

Background Information:

Proposal/Vision for a Government Supervisor/Leader Program

Presented by: Brent Calvin & Louann Waldner, College of the Sequoias

Background

Visalia's City Manager, Steve Salomon, has long felt that City and County agencies should have a more systematic method for training their supervisors and future leaders. Employees are often thrust into the role of supervisor without proper training and expected to know what is expected of them. After conversations between Mr. Salomon and Dr. Scroggins, and subsequent conversations with Tulare's City Manager, it has been proposed that the College of the Sequoias take the lead in developing a Government Supervisor/Leader Program.

Proposal

Initially, the College will work with the Cities of Visalia and Tulare as well as the County of Tulare to perform a needs analysis. Attached is a more detailed description of the need analysis and a potential pilot training developed by COS' Business & Industry Services for front-line supervisors. This would be a fee based/contract training program as opposed to a for-credit college course.

Once the program has been customized to meet the needs of the three entities, Business & Industry Services will schedule the training on the COS campus or another venue agreed by the organizations/agencies involved. The sessions will be facilitated by an experienced professional who is an expert in the training and learning styles of adults and would include guest appearances by leaders in the City, County or beyond.

It is anticipated that the sessions will be three hours in length and could be scheduled for Friday afternoons over a period of 12-16 weeks. The cost of this program will be borne by either the participants or their employer and will run approximately \$250 per participant depending on the duration of the course and where the enrollment limit is set. The College would schedule the program to start at times (Fall, Spring, Summer) most conducive to the needs of the agencies/organizations for which it is designed and as many times as needed during the year.

<u>Vision</u>

This program has the potential to grow into a resource used by many government agencies and other large entities in Tulare County. The College's vision is that it might evolve into the Porter Leadership Academy, named after former Visalia City Mayor and COS Political Science Instructor, S. Thomas Porter.

Situation

Government agencies – like business, non-profit and educational entities everywhere – are experiencing a time of rapid change and increasing complexity. It is critical for individuals placed in the position of managing, supervising or leading others to understand the complexities of managing, motivating, engaging those human resources for maximum performance. Having a plan to deal with the retirements of the "baby boomer" generation is also critical. These retiring boomers not only occupy the upper-level positions, but also are the longest tenured employees with the greatest knowledge of the processes and culture of the agency. Those retirements leave a gap that must be filled by individuals who have not yet had experience in a supervisory role or leadership position with the agency.

COS Overview/Vision

COS's supervisory and leadership training can be designed and customized for any level of supervisor within any industry, business, agency or organization.

The process should begin with a **Needs Analysis**. It is important to understand the goals and objectives of the organization/agency and set a baseline as to the supervisory/leadership experience of the trainees. This needs analysis could be brief or extensive depending on the vision for the Supervisory/Leadership Training Program. To develop a comprehensive program, the need analysis would need to include several wide-ranging conversations to create a common knowledge base of what the major issues might be, what leadership development opportunities are currently available, and what expertise is needed to address the issues. Current agency leaders and staff members can provide valuable input into the program's design. This intent of this "discovery" process is to gain insight such as: 1) What it takes to be successful supervisor in the agency, 2) what it will take to be successful 3-5 years into the future, 3) What current supervisors needed to learn when they were first named to their current positions, 4) What someone new coming into these roles needs to learn.

A First Step for a Government Supervisor/Leader Program: Pilot Effort: Introduction to Supervision/Front-Line Supervisor

The Front-Line Supervisory Program (Introduction to Supervision) could be a pilot training for the City Governments as more extensive needs analysis is done for other levels of leadership. It's focus is on essential, basic skills that first line supervisors need for effectively supervising employees. It is designed for supervisors who are in first line supervisory positions and who have had little to no formal supervisory training. There are no prerequisites, but experience shows that this curriculum is best received by newer supervisors.

Summary: The Tulare County Association of Governments routinely applies for planning and other grants on behalf of member agencies to support transportation related activities. On April 1, 2010, TCAG filed an application with Caltrans for a planning grant for funds to prepare a Visalia/Tulare Community Transit Study to

improve transportation opportunities between the two communities over the next five years. This planning grant will allow for the hiring of a consultant to prepare a study for the cities and the county to identify potential options for additional transit service and funding. Specifically, this study will be focusing on the needs of COS students attending either the Visalia campus or the new campus in the City of Tulare; and students from outlining communities in Tulare County. Staff expects to hear from Caltrans regarding this application to identify transit options sometime during the summer. Visalia staff is prepared to work closely with the TCAG, the City of Tulare, COS representatives, the County of Tulare, and the Managers of the other Tulare County transit agencies, as well as the successful consultant, to gather the appropriate data and conduct the appropriate assessments to complete the study in a timely manner.

Background: The Transit Division has been working with the City of Tulare and the College of Sequoias to prepare for the expansion of the COS campus into Tulare and the anticipated increase in demand for transit service. Caltrans periodically provides funds to do various types of planning studies including transit services. In some cases these funds are transferred to the

City to conduct the study; however, in this case TCAG is the only eligible applicant and will be conducting the study on behalf of the City of Visalia, the City of Tulare and COS.

The provision of a safe, reliable and efficient public transportation service to services such as higher education, training and jobs is vitally important to the economy and quality of life in Tulare County. Visalia/Tulare community efforts are specifically focusing on improving transportation options between communities with many low-income workers, training opportunities, social services, higher education opportunities and other essential destinations.

Since the Study was first conceived, there has been interest expressed in providing reduced cost service to COS students throughout the County. Such an endeavor would involve the coordination and approval of transit services from throughout the County, including the cities of Tulare, Dinuba, Porterville and the County of Tulare. In addition, Visalia would need to consult and coordinate with our contracting agencies, which are the County of Tulare and the cities of Farmerville and Exeter.

A similar effort was initiated in 1998 between the City of Visalia and COS. During that effort a discount pass for \$20 was created for COS students. This was an \$8 discount of which \$4 was paid by COS and \$4 was absorbed by the City. A total of 469 passes were sold during the 1998 calendar year at cost to COS of \$1,804. This was under the \$2,500 limit COS established for the program; however, COS did not wish to continue the program beyond the first year.

The scope of this grant application was expanded to include consideration of the feasibility of providing a reduced cost option for COS students, and COS has expressed a willingness to consider implementing a student fee of \$1-2 per student per semester that would cover some or all of the cost of implementing such a reduction. Preliminary estimates indicate that this fee would generate less than the cost of current bus passes purchased by COS students; therefore, additional funding sources will need to be identified to provide significant long term student discounts. The study will consider all implications financial, operational, and political, which must be considered in order to implement such a program. The grant cannot be used to pay for the subsidy directly, only to determine the options and feasibility for doing so.

Some of the issues that must be addressed in this study include:

- 1. Farebox Recovery: State law requires that state funded transit systems in urbanized areas of 50,000 population or more must collect 20% of their operating cost from fares collected through the farebox. Many communities, including Visalia, struggle to balance the demand for service with meeting the farebox recovery options.
- 2. State Transit Funding: Recent efforts from the State of California have attempted to reduce state support for public transportation. As a result State Transit Assistance, has been reduced and it can be expected that this trend will continue.
- 3. Federal funding for urbanized areas is currently restricted in terms of how much of it can be used for operations (currently only 50%). Current law restricts this further once an urbanized area exceeds 200,000. It is extremely probable that as of 2012 Visalia and Tulare will be combined for federal purposes into one urbanized area. Current law reduces the allowed use of federal funds for operations in such areas to \$0. This has a potential impact on the Visalia Tulare area of \$2.5 million per year.
- 4. Because of the nebulous funding situation in the transit industry, any reduction in bus fare revenue must be guaranteed to be replaced by some new source in order for this program to succeed. The study will attempt to identify the projected cost and potential funding sources to meet that cost.

5. Comprehensive Impact: Because of the large number of agencies involved, the study will need to take into consideration the long-range impacts. It is anticipated that if approved, Porterville Community College may want to consider a similar program, as may the school districts within each jurisdiction. Requests are received from VUSD parents on a regular basis. The program options proposed need to consider a broader student application, and the subsequent potential impact on the various transit programs.

Staff from TCAG, COS, the cities of Visalia and Tulare, the County of Tulare, and the other transit agencies in the County, TCAG, COS will continue to monitor this grant opportunity and prepare to conduct the study as quickly as possible once the funding is awarded. The appropriate Staffs will keep the boards of all agencies updated as new information is available.

Mooney Boulevard Project Update

Caltrans' project manager (Shelley Maggard) has advised us that the project landscaping has been completed and construction crews will begin paving the "surface course" for Mooney on May 10th (section of the project north of Princeton Avenue). Paving will take place primarily at night and will take three weeks to complete. For daytime paving, two lanes remain open.

<u>Tulare, Kaweah, Meadow Avenue Intersections with Mooney Boulevard (Traffic Signal Operation/Work)</u>

These intersection/signal improvements are being performed by Caltrans' contractor. The traffic "loop detectors" were removed during the street improvements to accommodate the street widening and resurfacing. Loop detectors "communicate" with the signals and are activated by vehicles. Currently, these signals are "time based" and do not "sense" the presence (or lack of presence) of vehicles. This "time based" operation can cause an extended signal cycle and cycling even though a vehicle may not be present. Once paving has been completed, new traffic loops will be installed returning the intersection signals to normal operations.

The Caltran's project manager states that the loop detectors will be installed the week of May 24th. Micro-surfacing and striping will begin the week of May 17th. Reprogramming of the traffic signal will be completed by the week of June 24th.

Background - Mooney Boulevard Project

Caltrans is in the last phase of their Mooney Boulevard improvements. The project (which is nearing completion) consists of widening the State Highway between Packwood Creek to the south and State Highway 198 to the North. Caltrans has

widened the roadway from four lanes (two in each direction) to six lanes (three in each direction). This project included improving the intersections at Tulare Avenue, Beech Avenue, and Sunnyside Avenue, with dual left-turns at Tulare Avenue and Beech Avenue and single left-turns at Sunnyside Avenue, larger curb radii, upgraded wheel chair ramps and new bus turnouts. This portion of the project also modified the widths of the medians, lanes, shoulders and sidewalks. The project was awarded at \$10,196,000.

<u>City Project Improvements at the Intersections of Mooney and Walnut and Mooney and Whitendale:</u>

The City is making intersection improvements at these two locations. Improvements include the widening of Whitendale and Walnut Avenues on the east and west sides of Mooney Boulevard so that they will receive new dual left-turn lanes on Mooney Boulevard and increase the capacity of the intersections per the City's Circulation Element. The Walnut intersection will also include the undergrounding of low voltage electrical and communication lines and placing the high voltage lines on 85-foot tall steel poles. The new undergrounding district will also prohibit future overhead lines within the district. The engineers estimate for both projects is about \$4,300,000, including the utility undergrounding.

The design of these two projects has been completed and the necessary right-of-way has been obtained. Construction will begin in early summer and will be completed by November 1st. A detailed/approximate schedule is listed below.

Walnut and Mooney

April 17, 2010 – Early possession of right-of-way obtained May 10, 2010 – Vault and pull-box work out to bid May 28, 2010 - Open bids for above work June 07, 2010 – Council award for work above July 9, 2010 – Completion of above work

*Project schedule is dependent on the completion of utility line/pole and "undergrounding" work to be done by Southern California Edison. If signal and roadway work cannot be completed by November 1st, this phase of the project will be scheduled for early 2011.

On August 28, 2009, City Council Community Based Planning Committee represented by Bob Link and Greg Collins met with the Kaweah Delta Health Care District represented by Board Members Carl Anderson and Jody Graves to discuss community partnership opportunities. One area of potential partnership identified is Health and Wellness programming and services. In October, 2009, City Manager Steve Salomon and Kaweah Delta Health Care District (KDHCD) CEO Lindsay Mann met with Visalia Unified School District (VUSD) Superintendent Stan Carrisoza to discuss a potential partnership between the three organizations.

A subsequent meeting with this group, now involving representatives from additional health related organizations, launched into a discussion of developing a community health and wellness committee. It was determined that obesity along with the epidemic proportions of diabetes is community problem and that organizations should combine resources, as available and appropriate, to further Health and Wellness in Visalia.

It was understood by all organizations that financial resources were not available but each organization could look at opportunities to share resources through communication facilitated by

collaborative partnerships in this area.

the Committee. Sharing information, reducing the duplication of services, cross promoting programs and collaboration on future grant applications are areas that the Committee can assist each agency and benefit the community. It was also recommended that organizations find a way to highlight "existing health and wellness" efforts that are currently available to the public.

On November 16, 2009 the Visalia City Council officially directed the City Manager to pursue a coalition with community partners, including, but not limited to, Kaweah Delta Health Care District and Visalia Unified School District to promote health and wellness in our community. Further the coalition will explore needs and promote existing health and wellness offerings in the community.

As of April 22, 2010, the Healthy Visalia Committee is meeting regularly and gaining momentum. The following organizations are now part of the committee and meet on a monthly basis:

Initial goals of the Committee are as follows:

- Carry out one joint "special event" a year to showcase health and wellness opportunities available for local residents. The Committee is looking at a date in early October, this date will be finalized on May 13, 2010.
- Provide funding for basic Committee actions including web design & maintenance and funding for the festival. Almost each organization has been able to invest \$1000 in start up funds. The City of Visalia currently houses these funds in an account designated for these functions.
- Develop a website wherein all "health related" organizations will be linked. This website
 will also serve as a central location for health & wellness related events to be listed. The
 domain "healthyvisalia.com" has been purchased and design work will be completed by
 the Committee's May 13, 2010 meeting.
- Develop a logo. Visalia Unified School District held a logo contest for the new Healthy Visalia Committee. Several designs were received and the Committee will select a final logo at the May 13, 2010 meeting.
